



Food abundance and scarcity

Prize Question: What percentage of the Haitian population does not have a regular secure source of food?

Food. I think about it a few times a day to make decisions. What do I want for dinner, lunch, breakfast? Do I need to go shopping? If so, I have three options within half a mile, and at the store there is an abundance of fresh fruit and vegetables, meats, every kind of canned goods, many types of premade meals, frozen foods of all kinds - a large amount of choice. When it comes to food, something I have never had to experience is the worry that each meal could be the last for a while. I have been lucky that I have always had food to eat and a variety of choices. Unfortunately, our friends in Belle Fontaine, Haiti, have not been so lucky. The people in Belle Fontaine often do not know when their next meal will be or what they will eat. Families struggle to provide food for their children and the elderly.

In the Fall of 2022, the United Nations reported a record 4,700,000 people facing acute hunger, 1,800,000 facing emergency hunger and 20,000 in the catastrophe hunger stage. That means 56% of the population in Haiti does not have a regular, dependable source for food. This lack of food is creating a high incidence of acute malnutrition and a high mortality rate at all ages but especially in the young and the old. It has increased incidents of selling land or eating seeds rather than planting them. Lack of food also increases petty crime, stealing items that can be sold for money or traded for food.

Another reason for lack of food is heavy dependence on imported foods, which have become unreliable. The organizations that have been helping in Haiti with food usually store food shipments in warehouses at the port. Unfortunately, the gangs have been raiding the warehouses and stealing the food. The gangs then sell the food at extortionate prices to the people.

Lack of food is also occurring due to the poor performance of gardens. Most families in Belle Fontaine have gardens that are subject to weather conditions, drought, monsoon rains, earthquakes or hurricanes, all of which affect crop yield. The loss of the fall crop, for instance, means that the crop cannot be stored to have food over the winter; it also means there are no seeds for spring planting.

High consumer prices also contribute to lack of food. They are 30% to 77% higher in Haiti than in other Caribbean countries.

A remedy to food insecurity, especially in rural areas, suggested by the United Nations, is supporting gardens with seed packets. Gardens can provide food for the farmers and give them the ability to take produce to market. Unfortunately, the gardens in Belle Fontaine are not thriving now because of drought, and there may not be seeds for a spring crop. There have been times when we have provided funding for seeds for the farmers at our sister parish.

DO

Attend a daily Mass, adoration, Stations of the Cross or stop by church to pray. Give thanks for the abundance of food in our lives.

- **Open one's heart to God and fellow man.** Give thanks for the abundant access to food you have.
- **Pray daily for world peace.** Pray for peace and safety for the people of Notre Dame de Lourdes.
- Enable to give others strength through our example. Take time to attend a daily Mass or adoration and give thanks in prayer for the abundance of God's gifts.

Thank you for your support of our parish mission in Haiti. We would love to have you join the Haiti committee. We need your talents to continue supporting our sister parish.


Yes, Lord, I Believe

The creed was intended to help articulate the foundational aspects of the Catholic faith against heresy, specifically Gnosticism, which denied Christ's incarnation, divine creation, salvation by faith in Christ and the deity of Christ.

But as the Catholic faith spread throughout the world, gaining many new followers, it required a common language to express the beliefs of the church. The Apostles' Creed serves as a concise summary of Catholics' beliefs and the core aspects of the Scripture and God's teachings. It was a great choice to provide that common language for our church worldwide.

I hope this booklet and song may help the younger members of your family learn this beautiful profession of our Catholic beliefs. And that adults enjoy the opportunity to reflect on this prayer that represents what we as Catholics profess to believe.

Everyday Metanoia



Today is the Third Sunday of Lent and we encounter Jesus at the Temple of Jerusalem. If we do some research we will notice that the Gospel of John places this story at the beginning of his accounts; whereas, Matthew, Mark and Luke position it right after Jesus triumphantly enters the city of Jerusalem, which begins the journey of his Passion, Death and Resurrection. A very curious difference between John and the other three until we factor in a few clues that might help provide some understanding and a challenge for us personally as we continue our Lenten journey.

Scholars identify the Gospel of John as the last one of the four to be written. So the time period that it was written is a clue. We should also factor in a second clue regarding the historical setting of John as provided by Francis Martin and William M Wright, IV in their commentary on The Gospel of John. "Much discussion of the Gospel's historical setting involves speculation about the Johannine community...The starting point for much of this speculation is the odd Greek word asposynagogos, which literally means 'one out of the synagogue'...In the view of many scholars, the term reflects the situation of some Jewish followers of Jesus in relation to their local synagogue, not at the time of Jesus, but later in the 1st century [when the Gospel of John was written]. If so, the appearance of this term only in this Gospel may suggest that some among John's readers had had a tumultuous separation from their local synagogue as a result of their confession of Jesus' messiahship." The third clue to factor in is that all four Gospels fall under the literary genre of Greco-Roman biography or "Life." What importance is this? As Martin and Wright explain, "'Life' is selective in what it narrates about a person. It is not intended to give a comprehensive account of a person's words and deeds." The authors who write within the genre also "shape the material" so as to best portray the life of the subject. The fourth clue is that the Gospel of John puts much significance on the use of opposites and also the use of irony to convey a message.

Wow - those are some meaty clues; let's put them together. Why would John be the only one to move the cleansing of the temple account to the beginning? Martin and Wright relay that "John's Gospel is centered on God. From the very first verse, we are given a glimpse of the inner life of God as an eternal communion of life and love between God the Father and his Son, who is also his Word." The early Christians within the Johannine community were already experiencing a heartbreaking and probably family destroying separation from their Jewish roots and community. (Time the Gospel was written clue and Historical Setting clue). It had to have been hurtful and impacted not only their religious lives, but their personal and day-to-day lives also. That which should have been the sacred home for God (the Temple) and a place for peaceful communion with God had been corrupted under the Jewish leaders and had become a market place full of dishonesty and deceit. (Opposite clue and Irony clue)

I believe that John is reflecting and shaping the realities of the time and place in his placement of the Temple story and letting his readers know right from the beginning that confessing Jesus as the Messiah meant sharing in the suffering of the Cross in a very real way. He is also inviting his readers (us!) to know that our faith and belief needs to be realized in authentic worship, which means "walking the talk." Pope Francis expands this even further in that "Christians should not go to church only to 'observe a precept', or to feel right with God, but to 'encounter the Lord' and discover the 'strength to think and act according to the Gospel."

Lent provides us a wonderful gift of time and encounters with God, if we allow it and invite God to transform our lives. Are we ready to walk with Jesus to the cross? Are we ready to accept the burdens of life as our "crosses" in communion with Christ? John invites us to do so.

And so, I invite you to attend Mass this weekend (and then the next and the next...) Make the time for Adoration, Stations of the Cross, and Mass. God transformed the Cross into New Life; are you willing to let Him do the same for you? If you know someone who has been absent, invite them to join you! Praying with you always.

Register For 2024-2025 NOW!

PowerSchool Registration is now available for all Xavier Catholic Schools families. You are welcome and encouraged to start this process at this time; however, date of family registration with Xavier Catholic Schools will determine enrollment priority if the student is at the same priority level as other prospective students in the event of high demand for placement in a specific grade level. Additionally, time of received registration materials will be used in situations where capacity limits enrollment; this process is used when priority levels are not in effect.

Log into PowerSchool at *https://xcs.powerschool.com/public/home. html* On the left, scroll to *Progress/Report Cards*. After clicking on that, your child's report card will come up for you to see. Registration online forms are also on PowerSchool as FORMS.

In order for enrollment to be considered complete, all PowerSchool Enrollment Express forms must be submitted and/or accepted (yellow and green leaves will indicate these statuses).

Education Savings Account (ESA) application window is not yet open. You will be notified when you can apply.

March 3, 2024 • 3rd Sunday of Lent • John 2:13-25

Anger

It is the Passover, and Jesus goes to the temple for quiet and prayer. When he reaches the temple area he sees table after table of merchants and moneychangers. The sight and sounds must have been incredible. Jesus is angry because they are making a mockery of God's sacred space.

Jesus' anger is certainly evident in this story of his cleansing the temple, but this wasn't the first time we see Jesus displaying his feelings. At various times in the Gospels we see Jesus sad, happy, frustrated, afraid and, yes, even angry. He cried, laughed, was honest about his fear and his anger. Jesus was comfortable expressing his feelings, and he expressed them in appropriate ways.

Psychologists tell us that feelings are neither good nor bad, they just are. It is what we do with those feelings that really matters. We need tears and laughter to help us heal not only emotionally, but sometimes even physically. Fear helps to get the adrenaline going when we need to protect ourselves and move fast. Expressing our anger justly is also appropriate in the right settings.

A priest once told me that sometimes children should see their parents angry to help them understand the seriousness of a situation. He cautioned, however, to make sure the response was nonviolent and appropriate to the wrong-doing. Never respond unless you are certain you are in control of your feelings. If need be, take a long walk. Anger must never lead to physically or emotionally abusing a child or anyone else.

Some people need to get help in finding healthy outlets for their anger. The experts agree: Suppressing our feelings can be dangerous. Anger will find its own way out, too often in unhealthy ways. We may end up letting it out at the wrong person, or we may unintentionally hurt another or ourselves. Like everything else that is difficult in life, anger is best mastered when we realize we can't handle it alone, and we ask for God's help.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Read the story of Jesus cleansing the temple, and then ask everyone to talk about what makes him or her angry. Discuss ways of handling anger.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Name the trigger points that cause you to get angry with your children or spouse. Since you cannot control another person's behavior, only your own, what can you do about the situation? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?
