





Everyday Metanoia

I laughed as I read today's Gospel reading - I felt like God was delivering one of His reminders to me - "I am in charge, daughter!" I've shared that I struggle with wanting to control things in my life and those around me. God patiently bears with me until a moment happens and he either gently or sometimes not so gently reminds me who is God and who is not.

Jesus always chose his parable stories to match those gathered to hear him. Pope Francis commented on Jesus' use of parables: "parables – are inspired precisely by ordinary life and reveal the attentive and deep gaze of Jesus, who observes reality and, through small everyday images, opens the windows on the mystery of God and on the succession of human events. Jesus spoke in a way that was easy to understand; he spoke with images of reality, of everyday life," the Holy Father said. "In this way, he teaches us that even everyday things, which at times all seem the same and which we carry on with distraction or effort, are inhabited by God's hidden presence; that is, they have meaning."

Fishing, farming, housekeeping, vineyards - Jesus had a way of sharing the Word of God in a way that was relatable to the crowd. Both parables that Jesus shares in today's Gospel are about seeds so we can assume that he was instructing a community who was familiar with crops. While I am not versed in crops, I do enjoy growing and tending flowers and shrubs. The derecho wiped out almost all of the landscaping at my house. I was so disheartened and discouraged that I let it go until this year. As I sized up the project and surveyed the area, I discovered that through no effort on my part, a few things had survived...along with a multitude of weeds.

Mary Healy's commentary on the Gospel of Mark reflects on this passage which focuses on the "seed's intrinsic power to grow of its own accord. The sower liberally scatters his seed, then goes on with the routine of his daily life. Slowly, imperceptibly, the seed begins to sprout." As science has advanced, we understand more about the growing process, but the reality is that much of it still remains a mystery, just like our human life. Healy continues, "The farmer can water, weed and fertilize the ground...but he cannot make the ripe grain appear a day before its appointed time."

"Of its own account the land yields fruit, first the blade, then ear, then the full grain in the ear." I am being reminded of this everyday as I plan, weed, amend the soil, plant, water and fertilize at our house. As much as I might want it, the blooms will occur in God's time and not when I will it to happen. The same is true with the kingdom of God. Healy says, "God brings about its growth, which is at times imperceptible. We can cooperate, but we cannot control or hasten the arrival of the kingdom by our efforts any more than the farmer can harvest his grain in January" (at least in the Midwest!) Just like the crops (or my flowers) it is not the outer growth and showy blooms that God is looking for. Nice as they are, even the most beautiful flower or ear of corn will quickly wither and die if the stalk and the interior of it is not strong and well formed. We are made ready for the kingdom of God when we cooperate with the will of God and through his generosity, love and grace. Our own efforts are not fruitless, forming ourselves as disciples of Christ brings about God's desired inner growth for us in holiness and virtue; but, we do not bring about the reality of the kingdom - only God can do that. Pope Francis continues to encourage us to seek and do the will of God. "With this parable Jesus wants to instill us with confidence. In so many of life's situations, indeed, it may happen that we get discouraged because we see the weakness of good as compared to the apparent power of evil. And we may allow ourselves to be paralyzed by doubt when we find we are working hard but the results are not achieved, and things seem never to change. The Gospel asks us to take a fresh look at ourselves and at reality; it asks us to have bigger eyes, that are able to see further, especially beyond appearances, in order to discover the presence of God who as humble love is always at work in the soil of our life and that of history. This is our confidence, this is what gives us the strength to go forward every day, patiently, sowing the good that will bear fruit."

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Listen to God's Word, pray and let Him shower you with graces.





Being the Mustard Seed

Jesus continues to talk to the people in parables. He uses everyday things to help them remember the point of his teaching. He tells the crowd that the kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed that grows into a huge bush that can serve as a nesting place for the birds in the sky.

When I think about that tiny mustard seed and the kingdom of God, I think about the rippling effect one small act of kindness can have. When a person offers a smile or a simple courtesy, it can sometimes change the course of another's day.

I am not a morning person, and with very little effort I have managed to raise a whole family of morning grumps. I remember the days when all seven of us were playing "beat the clock" at 6:30 AM. At best, our "good mornings" were grumbled as we tried to keep out of each other's way. Some mornings our house felt like the proverbial powder keg, just one missing sock away from disaster. On those mornings, one person's outburst over an empty milk carton could sour everyone's day.

I developed my mustard seed theory by watching how that powder keg could be defused—a shared cinnamon bun, some help searching for missing keys, or a ride offered to school. One person's act of kindness could affect everyone. Since I am not my best at daybreak, it took a conscious effort for me to be that person.

I discovered that when I started the day with prayer I could often find a quiet peace inside myself that helped me respond rather than react. It was wonderful to watch how sometimes that mustard seed experience of peace could even grow to fill a household. I picture the kingdom of God as an eternal experience of that peace—an experience we can sometimes taste even on grumpy mornings.


FAMILY RESPONSE
