

Service to Others Metro Catholic Outreach



Who can pick up a food box? Did you know that anyone who requests a food box can pick up groceries on our distribution days? Anyone in need can call our office and get on the Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday schedule. All we ask is their name, household size, and phone number. No IDs, no income qualifiers, no other details needed. They only need to call ahead to reserve a box.

We continue to add many new families each month, and we now have about 8,000 households in our registry. While many of our clients come somewhat regularly, at last count, less than 23% pick up a food box more than once per month. For many, MCO is the first place that is called for help. The items in our food boxes of non-perishable items and toiletries add up to at least \$70 per box. In addition, fresh items are added to each box at distribution - milk, meat, produce, bread, sometimes eggs. Our clients come from every neighborhood, social class, income bracket, ethnicity. Every person has a story of need at some point in their lives, and thanks to our parishes and caring parishioners, those experiencing food insecurity can receive immediate assistance from MCO. We also make numerous referrals each week to other local organizations for further resources.

THANK YOU to our donors, parishioners and friends, for your continual donations of food, toiletries, cash, time, talent, and more. YOU are making a huge impact on area families.

Got Truck? We have some very faithful delivery volunteers with big trucks who are available to pick up our food orders and donations from HACAP and other local businesses in the Cedar Rapids metro area. Their service is crucial to keeping our large food pantry stocked every week. Some of our volunteer drivers pick up once or twice per month, some every week, others are on our sub list to be called as needed. We are in need of a couple more drivers with trucks, either as regulars or as substitutes. Please call or email our office and let us know if you'd like to help out.

Everyday Metanoia



Today's excerpt from St. Paul's second letter to the Corinthians quickly caught my attention as I was preparing for the weekend liturgy. As I re-read it a few times, words like "gracious", "rich", "poor", "poverty" and "relief" all caught my attention, but the one that truly intrigued me the most was "equality."

Perhaps I am conditioned by growing up and living in a first world country, as I thought that equality

meant a division that resulted in shared portions; like 50-50 or 25-25-25-25. But the more I struggled and wrestled with this passage, I came to understand that the word equality means something so much more according to God.

I grew up in a fairly progressive household: my mom worked in an office when quite a few of my classmate's moms did not. My dad washed the dishes (no dishwasher!) way more than my mom did. My parents usually encouraged me to learn skills that were valuable for life, not based on if you were a male or a female. One of the first times that I encountered a challenge to my understanding of equality was when my future husband and I attended a Pre-Cana session as part of our marriage preparation. At one point in the day a seasoned couple talked to the group about the division of labor in a household. They made it very clear that equality was not the standard that they advised using; rather they encouraged us to talk as a couple to divide the work necessary according to whomever was better at it or liked it better. I started to fidget in my seat a little. My husband's upbringing was very different from mine. His parents bravely immigrated to the United States from Eastern Europe during the war. Neither spoke much English, but they were determined to make a better life for themselves and their family. Doing so meant that my husband's dad worked long, hard hours doing manual labor while his wife (my sweet mother-in law) stayed home and did all of the chores while raising the children. For the first time in our courtship, I began to understand what several couples had been telling us all weekend: marriage is work.

Fast forward many years and I have learned to view marriage and many other areas of life through the lens of stewardship rather than what I would consider "fair." Now Paul is addressing the Corinthians about the equality of money, not marriage, but the principles and work of stewardship have the same bearing - that being the standard of self-giving love. In his commentary on 2 Corinthians, Thomas D. Stegman, SJ says, "Paul then provides the Corinthians with the example of self-giving love par excellence, the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ…Christ's wealth signifies his glorious, heavenly existence. The reference to him becoming poor points, in the first place, to the incarnation, to his 'coming in human likeness.' In addition it alludes to his earthly way of living, marked by humility and by obedience to the Father's will, expressed most dramatically in his self-offering on the cross. It is through Christ's poverty, through his becoming a human being and through his revelation of God's love for us, that we 'become rich.'"

After defining the standard of self-giving love to the Corinthians, Paul then lays out the three principles of how we are to respond to the gracious act of God's self-giving love by: sharing our resources; doing so willingly; and giving in proportion to our means. That same self-giving love is what we profess before God in the sacrament of marriage. In the course of the day, through that sacramental promise, I am called to share my resources of time, talent and treasure with my spouse. As much as I humanly would like to divide household responsibilities according to my definition of "fair", that is not what God calls us to do in response to his daily gifts of grace. That is not an easy thing for me to carry out some days, especially when the weight on my side of the balance scale seems to be getting heavier and heavier. Through daily prayer, God helps me to erase the "score card" in my mind and to focus instead on sharing the gifts of my love through mundane acts of household responsibilities and to do so willingly and cheerfully. When we make liturgy and prayer an integral part of our life, the challenge of equality that God calls us to becomes a living part of our being that creates an abundance from which we can share - willingly and cheerfully.

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Let God fill the cup of your life with abundance and joy!

Family Ministry

June 30, 2024 • 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time • Mark 5:21-43

Be Not Afraid

Jesus and the disciples have reached the other side of the sea and find another crowd waiting for them. In this Gospel reading Mark records two more miracles, a woman who has been hemorrhaging for twelve years is cured as well as the daughter of a synagogue official. Both are healed because of their faith.

Once more Jesus tells us, "Don't be afraid; only believe." Why can't I get it? I believe, and truly trust God, but I still worry. How can Jesus possibly expect any parent to live without anxiety? I know that with five grown children and seven grandchildren there always seems to be someone to worry about.

Perhaps the fear Jesus is talking about goes beyond the very human feeling of apprehension or anxiety we experience on a regular basis. After all, fear gets the adrenaline going, and we often need that surge to react appropriately. (Picture yourself and a lion in close proximity.) I'd like to suggest that the fear Jesus is talking about is just the opposite kind of fear—a fear that is debilitating—fear that leaves us hopeless and despondent.

Even the very human Jesus was afraid. Remember his prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane? Luke tells us Jesus sweat blood when he asked his Father to remove the cross that faced him. Now that's fear—quite appropriate human fear. But Jesus did not allow his fear to disable him. When Jesus was afraid he prayed. He told his Father exactly what he wanted and then handed it over to him— "Not my will but yours be done."

When Jesus prayed in the garden, his burden wasn't taken away, but obviously he received all he needed to get thorough it. Since he was fully human, I expect Jesus was probably still afraid when facing death, but he was able to face his accusers and executioners with dignity and courage. What a great lesson on how to handle our worries and anxieties.
