Check Those Expiration Dates



We receive a generous amount of food items from our donors each month. Our eagle-eved volunteers check every single expiration date on every single item, before adding to our pantry shelves. Items that are recently expired (within 12

months) are added to the shelf in our office where clients may select if they choose. Any food over 12 months expired must be transported to be opened and dumped for compost in the Green Prairie Garden at Prairiewoods. Items that have been opened and partially used are also not given out to clients, and must be discarded. (Open containers of spices are an example.) Please assist us in checking your items before donating to our pantry. This helps our volunteers and staff ensure our food boxes contain only current and fresh items for our neighbors in need.



Everyday Metanoia

We continue the Bread of Life discourse this weekend. Last week we introduced and reviewed some Cliff notes from the Eucharistic Revival Conference that was recently held in Indianapolis. We will continue with highlights from some of the other speakers.

Jesus makes some bold statements in today's Gospel. "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." "For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him." During the liturgy, we condense this and the Eucharistic Minister proclaims, "The Body of Christ" and the "Blood of Christ" as we are offered the bread and wine. Chris Stefanick, in his keynote address, said, "When we are offered the Eucharist - the Body of Christ; the Blood of Christ - it demands a response." Our typical response is a hurried and whispered, "Amen." But should this be our response to the awesome gift we are receiving? Chris Stefanick challenged the crowd, and challenges us, to "transform and elevate our response...to start to live a more radical response to the greatest gift of the best news ever." We are offered eternal life each time in the Eucharist and the best we can do is a lack luster 'Amen'? If we were offered a million dollars would our response be a simple thanks? I do not believe so. We would jump up and down, we might cry, we might shout with joy, we would call everyone we know to share this incredible news. And the best we can provide as we receive the gift of life is a quiet 'Amen?'

We have one of the same challenges that the Jewish faith had when Jesus broke into our world - culturally, our faith, our religion, is viewed by many as nothing more than a complicated to-do list that often begins with 'you cannot.' Through the awesome and glorious reception of the gift of the Eucharist, Chris reminded the crowd that "we need to remind and engage [culture] that [our faith] is a great love story - one between Jesus Christ and us and that love story is still here, still present, still a reality today." God loves me. God loves you. God loves us all. This should be our response to the Eucharist - a joyous sharing of this love that we know through the Gospel. Jonathan Roumie, who portrays Jesus in the TV series called The Chosen was another speaker at the conference. I encourage you to listen to his talk on youtube. He shares our Scripture passages for this weekend and next weekend during his talk. The feeling and inflection that he puts into it, makes the Gospel reading come alive. I can image that it was very close to how Jesus spoke: the conviction of Jesus; the frustration he must have felt as the crowd present continued to resist and misunderstand his message; the passion of his words; the agony he must have felt as the Jews guarreled among themselves in dissent and disbelief rather than ask relevant questions to further understand and receive this gift. St. Teresa of Calcutta sums it up beautifully, "Nowhere on Earth are we more welcomed or loved than by Jesus in the Eucharist. When we look at the crucifix, we understand how much Jesus loved us. When we look at the Sacred Host, we understand how much Jesus loves us now."

No where else in our Catholic faith or in our Catholic liturgy do past and future collide and become reordered to be the present. Nathan Mitchell in Real Presence: The Work of the Eucharist says, "The consecrated bread and wine of Eucharist, then become the ultimate icon of love that delivers itself body and soul. It is this love that advances (from both memorialized past and anticipated future) to meet us in the paschal meal."

Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. Come, listen, pray, receive, respond, love and be loved - all at the Eucharistic table of plenty.

Remain in Him

The people continue to question Jesus as he tells them he is the living bread from heaven. Jesus reminds them that the Israelites in the desert who ate the manna from heaven eventually died. Jesus tells his listeners that if they receive him they will have eternal life.

Jesus makes it very clear that his followers are to love everyone indiscriminately. We are to love not only the poor and downtrodden, but also the murderers and the molesters. Impossible as it seems, God never stops loving any of these people, and we are asked to do the same. No wonder Jesus invites us to remain in him as he remains in us. It is the only way to love those who it would seem otherwise impossible to love.

Understand that love in this case does not mean to forget with whom we are dealing or what they have done. It means seeing beyond the exterior and/or their sins. It means seeing even the worst criminals as redeemable because Jesus who came to save us also came to save them. It means remembering that no matter what anyone or we do God does not stop loving us.

The love Jesus is talking about is much more than the romantic feeling we associate with being in love. Jesus' love is more of a strong bond that links us to each other and to every other person God created, whether sinner or saint. We don't have to like everyone, but we do have to respect them because they are our brothers and sisters. Like us, they are God's children.

It seems beyond human nature to love those who are so totally unlovable, like a murderer or molester, and frankly it is—beyond our own fallen human nature at least. That is why we have to live in Jesus' love. The love Jesus offers us, supernatural love, is a love above and beyond natural love. It is available to us when we accept Jesus' invitation to remain in him as he remains in us. It is only through, with and in Jesus' love that all things are possible.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask everyone to talk about the people in their lives who they are having trouble loving. Then say a prayer together asking Jesus to give you his love and strength so that you can love that person as he does.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Who is the person in your life that you need help loving or even liking? Are you ready to give up your dislike enough to turn it over to God and ask for help?

Many have expressed an interest in attending the Ordination of Bishop-elect Bullock. We are excited to offer a pilgrimage from Iowa. We will confirm this bus trip when we have 50 paid registered participants on or before Thursday, August 8. If we exceed capacity for one bus, we will add registrants to a wait list and work to fill a second bus.

Trip includes:

- Charter bus to/from Rapid City, touring around Rapid City and to the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help
- Accommodations for 3 nights, including free hot breakfast
- · Boxed lunch on Saturday & snacks on the bus
- Trip and Spiritual Guides

The tentative itinerary (subject to change):
