

Everyday Metanoia



Today's Gospel reading focuses in on one word - "Ephphatha" which we learn means, "be opened." We can reflect upon this on three levels - the physical, the work of metanoia and the mission of Jesus Christ.

On the physical level, Christ healed the deaf man with a speech impediment. If this were to happen today, we would call it a miracle. The definition of a miracle is "a surprising and welcome event that is not explicable by natural or scientific laws and is therefore considered to be the work of a divine I was doing some research on miracles, I was surprised to learn that every year, thousands of people

agency." As I was doing some research on miracles, I was surprised to learn that every year, thousands of people tell the Catholic Church of potential miracles. I was also unaware that because miracles play such an important role in the Catholic faith, a Vatican-appointed Miracle Commission composed of scientific experts and theologians works to determine whether these claims are authentic and genuine. The qualifications for a miracle classification have specific requirements and therefore, some events and healings, while not a miracle, are recognized as an awesome sign of God's love and intervention. How might the world change if instead of reading about the lives of wayward celebrities and politicians in our newsfeed, we could read about people who were choosing to make God the focus of their lives and actions? Like the news of Jesus' healing power, would these accounts of the power of God's healing grace in the lives of people bring crowds to the doors of our churches? It's understandable that we feel insignificant to make that level of change in the world, but the Power of One can have ripple effects that we could never dream of. Starting today, what if each of us stopped gossiping and maligning others and instead focused on sharing the graces in our lives or the lives of others that we have witnessed through the love and intervention of our Lord? What if we all listened more than we talked and helped others to name the graces in their own lives? I think that we would have our prayers for vocations answered, the seating in our churches would have to be increased and the everyday graces of God wouldn't be so "surprising."

The actions suggested above are a part of the process of metanoia, that being the change in one's life resulting from spiritual conversion and repentance. In both the Old and the New Testament we hear a phrase saying that those who have eyes should see and those who have ears should listen. This, too, is our heavenly Father calling for "Ephphatha." We, who can be hard of heart and a stiff necked people, are called to be more open, to be a people who see and hear the works of God in our lives. Pope Francis recently said, "We too, who have received the ephphatha of the Spirit in Baptism, are called to be open. "Be open", Jesus says to every believer and to his Church: be open because the Gospel message needs you to witness it and proclaim it! And this makes us also think about the attitude of Christians: Christians must be open to the Word of God and service to others. Christians who are closed up always end up badly because they are not Christians. They are ideologists of closure. A Christian must be open to the proclamation of the Word, and to welcoming brothers and sisters. And this is why ephphatha, this "be open" is an invitation to us all to open ourselves." Being open to the will and work of God is the everyday conversion that is a necessary part of being a disciple.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI connected this call to "be open" to the mission of Jesus Christ: "But we all know that closure of man, his isolation, does not solely depend on the sense organs. There is an inner closing, which covers the deepest core of the person, what the Bible calls the "heart". That is what Jesus came to "open" to liberate, to enable us to fully live our relationship with God and with others. That is why I said that this little word, "Ephphatha - Be opened," sums up Christ's entire mission. He became man so that man, made inwardly deaf and dumb by sin, would become able to hear the voice of God, the voice of love speaking to his heart, and learn to speak in the language of love, to communicate with God and with others. It is for this reason, the word and the gesture of "Ephphatha" are included in the Rite of Baptism as one of the signs that explain its meaning." Come to Mass this weekend (and the next and the next!) Invite someone you haven't seen in a while. In a renewed way, let's each open ourselves to the joyous and healing graces of God. Ephphatha!

National Catholic Youth Conference



Considering the National Catholic Youth Conference in 2025?

The National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) happens every year, but the Archdiocese typically takes part in odd years. NCYC 2025 is coming fast. The dates for NCYC '25 are November 20-23.

There are three ways for teens to experience NCYC.

- **1. Be a part of the Archdiocesan Delegation.** Parish leaders (paid or volunteer) register their group with the Archdiocese. Package price of approximately \$850 per person covers travel, lodging, registration, some meals, and on-sight support. To join the Archdiocesan Delegation, we ask for group leaders to open a group account with the Archdiocese and submit a no-obligation group size estimate before December of 2024. Look for future announcements in the Official Bulletin and The InFo.
- **2. Organize a parish or collaborative/regional group.** Work with other adults in your parish or other parishes near you to form your own group. Buy your own tickets. Book your own hotel rooms. Arrange your own transportation and meals. The Office of Youth Ministry will provide some tips and tricks to make it easier for you, but you will be independent of the Archdiocesan delegation.
- **3. Family option.** Families can buy their own tickets and make travel plans without having to go through a parish. Sometimes, if your group is small, that is the easiest. A mom or dad with their own children can zip in and out a lot easier and likely save on costs.

Catechetical Sunday (September 14 & 15)



"Lord, when did we see you hungry" Matthew 25:37

Our theme for 2024 reflects our call to missionary discipleship. As St John Paul II reminded us: The universal call to holiness is closely linked to the universal call to mission. Every member of the faithful is called to holiness and to mission. We are called to be eucharist by word and action to our brothers and sisters in Christ. Our times cry out for this kind of holiness, one inflamed by the ardent determination to bring as many of our brothers and sisters as possible to Christ.

What is Catechetical Sunday?

The Church established Catechetical Sunday, which is always celebrated on the third Sunday in September, to recognize and celebrate the gift that catechists give to their parish community by volunteering their time for the faith formation of children. We come together as a church community to acknowledge the dedication of those who serve as catechists in our parish family.

The day also reminds all Catholics to consider ways we are witnesses for Jesus Christ. All Catholics have the opportunity to rededicate themselves to the mission of passing on the faith, and being a witness to the Gospel as a community of faith.

Who are Catechists?

The word catechesis is from a Greek word meaning "to echo." All those who teach the Catholic faith and share the Church's teachings, by word and by the way they live their lives, are catechists. The catechist's goal is always to set hearts aflame for Christ.

We celebrate and pray for all who come forward for this ministry. They are people who are willing to share their own faith and have the courage to listen to the faith stories of others, without judgment but with a sense of wonder and awe.

In May 2021, Pope Francis established the lay ministry of catechist in the Catholic Church, officially declaring that catechists are to be recognized as lay ministers in the Catholic Church and are due the training and support they need to be successful in their ministry.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that parents have the mission of teaching their children to pray and to discover their vocation as children of God. (CCC 2226) Therefore, moms, dads, stepparents, grandparents, foster parents, godparents, and all who form the faith of children at home, in the domestic church, are the first and most important catechists of their children.

Tell No One

Jesus returns to Galilee to preach. People with all sorts of ailments were brought to him. When a deaf man with a speech impediment is brought, Jesus takes him away from the crowd to heal him. As he has done before, Jesus tells the crowd not to tell anyone.

Some people speculate that Jesus told people not to tell anyone about his miracles because he knew the best way to spread news is to tell folks it's a secret. They believe Jesus worked miracles to prove he was divine. Personally, I think Jesus meant what he said. He didn't want people just to follow him because he was a miracle-worker. He wanted them to focus on his message.

I believe the real reason Jesus healed a person was because of his compassion. He not only talked about love and forgiveness, he lived it. Jesus proclaimed his message of truth and love in everything he did, even to his death. Jesus wasn't out to prove anything. It was his great love touched by another person's faith that worked miracles.

There is a great lesson in this for all of us. We need to make sure our actions back up our words. This is especially true when dealing with children. Telling youngsters God is important without witnessing how God fits into our own lives can leave children questioning our words.

Children need to hear us talk about our faith, but they also need to see us praying, reading Scripture and giving our time in service. People believed Jesus because he was so authentic. His actions witnessed the truth of his message. Perhaps if we do the same, our love will touch the faith of another person, and we may witness some small miracles of our own.


