

## **Everyday Metanoia**



The timing of the Gospel reading for this Sunday when paired with our recent political election season could not be better. John 18:33b-37 highlights the difference between our earthly understanding of kings and kingdoms and that of God, our heavenly Father. In their commentary on the Gospel of John, Francis Martin and William M. Wright IV say, "Previously, Jesus has been hailed as 'king' by various Jewish persons who saw him as the promised messiah, the one whom God would raise up to overthrow the Gentile overlords and rule over a restored monarchy in Israel...For the Romans, the emperor held supreme power. Anyone claiming on his own to be king would be a rival to the emperor and thus an affront or threat to Roman imperial rule." When talking

about kings and kingdoms, Pilate could only reference and understand this in terms of earthly political realities; he had no relationship with God, only gods. He did not and could not understand what Jesus was saying.

Our own earthly political season leading up to the November election was painted with many similarities. In these times of deep divisions among peoples of different race, religion, beliefs, cultures and life values, in many ways it, too, seems like many are looking for a "savior." How unfortunate that many have walked away from Jesus, who was, is, and will be again. He, alone, is our savior, who was crucified, died and rose from the dead in order to restore our salvation with God. Several passages from the Gospel of John lead to this moment when Jesus tries to have Pilate understand that while God's kingdom is in this world; it is not of this world. But, what does this mean and how does it impact us? I think that the Sending Rite is a good place to start. During the liturgy, we are gathered, repent of our sins, nourished by God's Word, fed and strengthened by Jesus' Body and Blood and then sent forth - back out into the world to share God's love and Word with our brothers and sisters. We are the representatives of God's Kingdom here on earth and as believers we are called to be and live differently than the world. Our values, priorities and power source do not reflect worldly standards. So while we are in the world, we can only change the world to be God's Kingdom here on earth by taking our priorities from God's Word and his living example to the world, as know to us through Jesus Christ, by righteous living and valuing love of others over worldly goods and pursuits (wealth, happiness, honor and power.)

Martin and Wright expand upon this in saying, "The only way that we can bear faithful, loving witness in the world is through his power working in us, and his power comes to us through our communion with him. If we allow God to impress his truth and love on our hearts through practices of holy living, prayer and the sacraments, he will transform our lives so that we can be instruments of Christ the King in the world. As we do so the Spirit will prove the world wrong and the victory of God's kingdom over the world's injustice, aggression and thirst for dominating power will become manifest."

If we are going to be in this world, but live and share love and values not of this world, I believe we need to rediscover the art of contemplation and discernment. Jesus modeled this for us while living his earthly life. He frequently went up the mountain, into the desert or out into the sea to hear God's voice and to seek His will. Without contemplation and discernment we take God out of the picture and instead focus on our own wants, needs and desires, even if we are trying to "do good." Thomas Merton in his book, The Inner Experience: Notes on Contemplation calls this active communion between God and ourselves the "awakening of the inner self." He continues, "In seeking to awaken the inner self we must try to learn how this relationship is entirely new and how it gives us a completely different view. Instead of seeing the external world in its bewildering complexity, separateness, and multiplicity; instead of seeing objects as things to be manipulated for pleasure or profit; instead of placing ourselves over against objects in a posture of desire, defiance, suspicion, greed or fear, the inner self sees the world from a deeper and more spiritual viewpoint...It simply "sees" and does not take refuge behind a screen of conceptual prejudices and verbal distortions." We must always remember that we do not do this in order to separate ourselves from "the other." We are in this world, but through our baptism and communion with God, we are to be and live through contemplation and discernment as beings not of this world.

The season of Advent begins next week. The Faith Formation Commission has secured several resources for us to enter into this time of waiting and preparation for the birth of Jesus. These materials for all age groups are an opportunity to enter into or to grow into a deeper relationship with God. It is a time to "see" ourselves and the world through the eyes of the One who broke into our world and gave us a gift not of this world.

As we celebrate the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, I invite all of us to take to prayer this week the questions: to whom, in what and where am I looking in my search for a 'savior?' Perhaps this is the season to give ourselves permission to search for the still, small sound of an infant's cry in the midst of the noise and chaos of the world. See you at Mass!

### What is a Lector?



A Lector is a liturgical minister who proclaims the Word of God during Mass. Lectors carry the Book of the Gospels in the procession to the altar at the beginning of Mass.

Their responsibilities include proclaiming the first and/or second readings from Sacred Scripture. They may lead the Psalm between readings and the Prayers of the Faithful when a deacon is not present.

Lectors are expected to be practicing Catholics with a deep love for God's Sacred Word and are comfortable speaking in public.

#### How much time does this ministry take?

As long as is necessary to prepare to deliver their assigned reading(s) with a clear voice, slowly with confidence, varying their pace and able to make eye contact with the congregation.


#### **From Principal Starr**

# **Family Ministry**

November 24, 2024 • Our Lord Jesus Christ the King • John: 18:33-37

#### **Proclaiming the Kingdom**

On this feast of Christ the King we read John's account of Jesus before Pilate. The Roman leader is the only one who can condemn Jesus to death; the priests and scribes do not have that power. So they bring Jesus to Pilate and accuse him of treason.

On this last Sunday of the church year we celebrate Christ the King. It is an appropriate way to commemorate all that Jesus is and all that he did. It is a celebration of the kingdom of God proclaimed and lived by Jesus, our brother and savior. The best way to celebrate this great feast is by following Jesus' example and living our lives proclaiming the kingdom.

Often when we talk about God's kingdom we focus on heaven, our afterlife. We have learned from childhood that if we are good, obey the commandments and live in God's light, when we die we will go to heaven. In heaven we will spend eternity with God and all his saints and angels. All of this is true of course, but it is a very limited view of the kingdom of God.

God's kingdom is much more than a place where we spend forever. God's kingdom is also present today, here and anywhere, any time God's will can be found. Jesus lived the kingdom because he lived in absolute truth and love. He reconciled and healed; he preached the good news and loved as only God can love. Like Jesus, Christians are expected to be kingdom builders too.

As parents, we are called to do our best to build the kingdom of God in our own homes. We are asked to reconcile and heal, speak only the truth and love as God loves. It seems an impossible task, and it would be if it weren't for our faith in Jesus. The secret is to ask God to fill us with his love and his strength so that every cell and fiber of our being will respond and react as Jesus would. If we live with this intention, God's kingdom is sure to come.

# Gospel Weeklies

November 24, 2024 Solemnity of Christ the King

## The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: John 18:33b-37

The Gospel for this great feast is the story of Jesus before Pilate. In this Gospel, Jesus explains that his Kingdom is not of this world. Jesus came into the world to give witness to the truth. The Gospel and the feast give all an invitation to build up God's Kingdom in their homes, at work, at school, in their parishes, and in their communities.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

**Seeds** (Preschool): The subject of Christ the King is a bit difficult for very young children. So, this week's lesson focused on how Jesus is a leader for us all. Talk about the picture on the front of the Seeds booklet. Be sure to display your child's "We Follow Jesus" mobile. Ask your child his or her favorite things to share. Say a family prayer thanking Jesus for everything he has given us.

**Promise** (Grades K–1): Your child learned that Jesus is our leader, and he wants to make disciples of us all. Ask your child to name a couple of ways that God takes care of everyone. Your child also knows to refer to Jesus as King. Jesus is also the Lord of Heaven and earth, and your child will have a picture to show you about it. Say a prayer of praise for the Lord of Heaven and earth.

**Good News** (Grades 2–3): This week, your child's class explored the image of Jesus Christ as king of the world. The class also learned that it takes different kinds of leadership to make a community. Talk about what your family looks for in leaders—at work, in school, in the community. Ask your child to teach the family the "We Can Serve God's Kingdom" game, and play it together. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): In class for this Feast of Christ the King, the group learned some of the qualities shared by good leaders. The class also played a game that teaches what God's Kingdom is like. Play the game together. Be sure to have the family Bible handy to help you with some of the answers. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story of Saint Jeanne Jugan and the Little Sisters of the Poor.

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Guide

**Visions** (Grades 7–8): In class this week, your youngster identified ways that family members lead. He or she also learned to recognize the kind of king Jesus is. Ask your son or daughter how Jesus leads with love, care, and mercy. The class also had a discussion about bullying. Ask your teen to share with the family the various roles that occur in bullying situations. Talk about why bullying is the exact opposite of the kind of kingdom Jesus proclaimed. Ask what talents your teen shared in this week's activity about applyng for work that helps others.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

#### **Pray Together**

The very word that describes the Mass, *Eucharist*, means, "to give thanks." Say a family prayer every evening this week that gives thanks for one family blessing each night. Finish the prayer by saying the Our Father together.
