



# **Everyday Metanoia**



This is the third Sunday of Advent and we continue our preparation for Christmas, where we remember the gift of Jesus Christ as he entered our world for the first time, as we celebrate that he is a part of our lives now, and as we look forward to the day when we will see him again at the end of time. We also know this as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice." It comes to us from our second reading today, Phil 4:4-7: Brothers and sisters: Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near."

Adolf Adam's book on the Liturgical Year reminds us, "An especially striking aspect of the 3rd Sunday in Advent Mass is the use of rose-colored vestments. They replace the sober purple of penance and are a sign of the anticipatory Christmas joy." He notes that the Church developed the structure for the liturgical celebrations of Lent, Holy Week and Easter long before that of Advent and Christmas, so this celebration of Gaudete Sunday was most likely inserted to mirror the Lenten celebration of Laetare Sunday which celebrates the close anticipation of Easter with joy.

Continuing St. Paul's letter for this week, he tells us how we are to be as the Lord draws near: "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Luke's Gospel account has John the Baptist instructing the crowd; giving specific direction for what they are to do in response to his challenge to "produce good fruit." This dialogue exchange between John the Baptist and the crowd reminds me of the exchange between Jesus and the rich young man. Apparently, we as humans have always been uncomfortable with the latitude given in statements like "your kindness should be known to all" and "produce good fruit." We want the checkbox list to be precisely defined. And just like the rich, young man we often walk away from God, sad and forlorn, because we don't want to check that particular box; that which God knows would result in our ultimate surrender to Him.

We try to fit God into our limited human understanding and in the process make God small. In his book, Not God Enough, by J. D. Greear, he says, "We like God small. We prefer a God who is safe, domesticated, who thinks like we think, likes what we like, and whom we can manage, predict, and control. A small God is convenient. Practical. Manageable...But what if this small version of God we've created is holding us back from the greatest experience of our lives--from genuine, confident, world-transforming faith? What if we allowed ourselves to know and have a relationship with the God, who is big enough to handle our questions, doubts, and fears; is not silent; is worthy of worship; wants to take us from boring to bold in our faith; has a purpose and mission for us on earth; is pursuing us right now. The truth: God is big. Bigger than big. Bigger than all the words we use to say big. Only a God of infinite power, wisdom, and majesty can answer our deepest questions and meet our deepest longings. God is not just a slightly better, slightly smarter version of us. God is infinite and glorious, and an encounter with Him won't just change the way we think about our faith. It'll change our entire life."

Ronald Rolheiser also addresses this in his book The Shattered Lantern: "But in the end, moral philosophies, human instinct, and a not-so-disguised self-interest are more important in motivating these activities, (i.e. "your kindness should be known to all" and "produce good fruit"), than are love and gratitude stemming from a personal relationship with God...a living, informing, comforting, challenging person whose reality dwarfs that of our everyday world." The act that Rolheiser identifies as the crucial missing piece is that of contemplation. "Contemplation is about waking up. To be contemplative is to experience an event fully in all its aspects. Biblically this is expressed as coming 'face to face' with God, others and the cosmos. We are in contemplation when we stand before reality and experience it without the limits and distortions that are created by narcissism (our headaches and heartaches), pragmatism (our pressing tasks), and excessive restlessness (our dreams and distractions)."

And this, my friends, brings us full circle to the season of Advent. That space in time when we deliberately remove ourselves from the hustle and bustle and come face-to-face with God. The God who is big enough to empty Himself and break into our world as a little babe in order to restore salvation with humankind; the God who is big enough to shoulder all of our worldly cares and yet walk side-by-side with us each day; and the God who is big enough to meet us at the end of time.

This Monday evening, December 16 will be our final Advent Adoration opportunity beginning at 5:30 PM. Please join me in the chapel and spend one hour getting to know the God who wants to transform your life! Let's pack the Chapel!





From making coffee and lemonade to washing dishes and flashing a helpful smile, they do it all. For that, families are grateful as are those of us in the parish office. The next time you sit next to one of these team at Mass or bump into them at the grocery store, be sure to remind them of how valuable their work is and how appreciated they are for their level of dedication. They say it takes a village. That's very true. In our little village, the luncheon team really is the heart and soul.

# **Family Ministry**

December 15, 2024 • 3rd Sunday of Advent • Luke 3:10-18

### John the Baptist Baptizes with Water

John the Baptist prepares the way for Jesus by telling people to repent. He baptizes them with water as a sign of their repentance. When people begin to think that John might be the Messiah, he makes it very clear that they are wrong. He tells them that one mightier than he is coming. "He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (v. 16).

When John the Baptist's followers are ready to turn away from their dishonesty and selfishness, he baptizes them with water, a cleansing ritual that signifies their wish to repent.

But repentance is not enough to bring freedom and salvation. It takes the Holy Spirit and the new life Jesus offers us through his life, death and resurrection.

Repenting, or saying we are sorry, is the first step to freedom and salvation. The second step is to focus on changing our behavior. If we say we are sorry and have no intention of changing our actions, we can't be forgiven. Even God cannot free us from sin if we insist on holding on to it. Sometimes we are really sorry for our actions but can't muster the courage to change. In that case, we need to ask God for the desire to change. Even this small inclination to mend our ways is enough to loosen sin's grip and allow the Holy Spirit to slip in.

The third step is to admit we need help. We humbly acknowledge that we need God's help to love the way God wants us to love. We face our limitations and even our powerlessness, and ask the Spirit to fill us with strength and new life. We trust that with God's help we can overcome our sins or our most compelling bad habits and become the person God calls us to be.

### **FAMILY RESPONSE**

Adult family members may want to practice a simple Act of Contrition using the three steps above. (*Say you are sorry. Promise to change. Ask for God's help to do better.*) Say this prayer with your children before bedtime.

### PERSONAL RESPONSE

What about yourself would you like to change? What keeps you from changing? Are you ready to ask for God's help to change?



# The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: Luke 3:10-18

In this Advent Gospel, John the Baptist answers some specific questions about preparing for the coming of the Messiah. He urges the sharing of food and clothing. He asked tax collectors to be fair and soldiers to be satisfied with their wages. Most of all, John pointed to the one who is to come and who would baptize them with the Holy Spirit. What does your family do to prepare for Christ's coming?

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

**Seeds** (Preschool): John the Baptist asked people to do the best they can. Even the youngest children can understand that. They can do loving actions even if their hearts are not in it. Help your child share with others and be patient this week. Look together at the lesson's story titled, "Getting Ready for Ruby." Discuss how Ruby's family prepares for the new baby.

Promise (Grades K–1): The lesson of the Gospel this week is about sharing what you have with others. Your child learned the importance of not being selfish and sharing what he or she has. Ask your child to show you the "Happy Birthday" booklet from this week's lesson and talk about ways your family prepares for the coming of the Savior.

**Good News** (Grades 2–3): This Sunday is often referred to as Rejoice Sunday—from the words of Saint Paul that your child learned in class and that complete the first reading at Mass. Ask your child to share with the family the story "Who Has The Answer?" The story brings the Gospel advice of John the Baptist down to a child's level. Do a little review of how your Christmas preparations are going.

**Venture** (Grades 4–6): Your youngster's class talked about the giving and receiving of gifts at Christmas time. They also learned about John the Baptist's call for people to share what they have and to care for others. Ask your son or daughter to share with your family the story, "The Christmas Coat." Talk about ways your family can share with people in need during this holy season. Ask your young person to tell the family about the city of Jerusalem and about Saint Lucy.

Visions (Grades 7–8): As part of preparation for Christ's coming, your youngster's class explored the effects homelessness has on people and learned how some teenagers experienced those effects for themselves. Ask your son or daughter to tell the family about "A Night in Cardboard Box City." The class also listened to the advice of John the Baptist and talked about the need for a strong moral compass. Have a conversation about what guides your family to make good moral decisions.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

#### **Pray Together**

As you say your Advent Wreath prayer together this week, include prayers for all the people who need to hear the advice of John the Baptist. As each member mentions someone who needs the message, the whole family can respond: "Lord, help us be signs of your presence in the world!"
