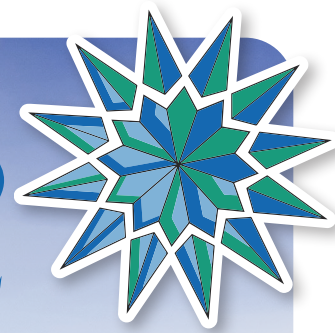
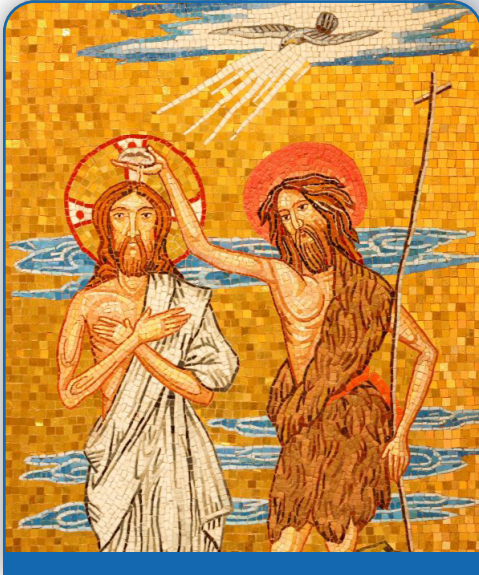

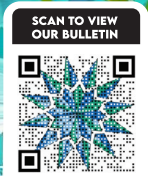

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to our celebration of the Baptism of the Lord. Today's reading is filled with references to prayer. The opening verse sets the stage: "The people were filled with expectation, and all were asking in their hearts whether John might be the Christ." Isn't this how most of us begin our prayer time? Something in life happens (or doesn't happen) and we come to God trying to reconcile (or plead) our human expectations with God's will. We come with questions and hopes. We come with unmet needs and worried minds. The one we seek is God.

Oftentimes we fail to remember that prayer is a personal, two way street. It is meant to be a collaborative relationship between God and us. I often wonder if a visual of our prayer life looks more like the Paul McCartney song lyrics: "Someone's knocking at the door. Someone's ringing the bell. Do me a favor. Open the door and let Him..." because we're too busy to do it ourselves and/or we really don't want to be bothered anyway. This Fall at Discussion and Drinks, we explored the relationship we have with the Eucharist and challenged ourselves to grow and solidify our faith life. Today's Gospel reading identifies one of the key bridges that we use to grow our relationship with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit as we Love God-Serve Others-Form Disciples. That bridge is prayer. Just as there are different kinds and lengths of bridges; the same is true of prayer. Just as there is a defined beginning point and ending point of a bridge; so, too, for most prayers.

Beginning in April, Discussion and Drinks will invite you to embark on a journey together as we explore "When You Pray: A Clear Path to a Deeper Relationship with God." We are told and taught that prayer is important, but many still find it challenging. When to pray, where to pray, what to pray, who should do the talking and the listening...the list of uncertainties is long and often prevents us from even taking that first step. The comforting thing is that when we read about the saints, many of them also experienced a challenging prayer life. Many felt discouraged by this weakness and struggled to overcome it. But struggle they did and in the process learned to rely more on God's grace and less on their own will.

Dr. Edward Sri will sit in the toll booth; directing us on and off various off ramps to explore the idea, the thoughts, and the styles of prayer with Fr. Jacques Phillippe, Fr. Josh Johnson, Fr. Gregory Pine, Sister Josephine Garrett, Fr. Donald Haggerty and Sister Maris Stella. Through small and large steps, we will learn to encounter God, to welcome Him, to have an open and honest conversation (which means that sometimes we listen and not talk!), to trust God and to be transformed through everyday metanoia.

South African author Laurens van der Post, said when talking about the Little Hunger and the Great Hunger of life: "There is ultimately only one thing that makes human beings deeply and profoundly bitter, and that is to have thrust upon them a life without meaning. There is nothing wrong with searching for happiness. But of far more comfort to the soul is something greater than happiness or unhappiness, and that is meaning. Because meaning transfigures all. Once what you are doing has meaning for you, it is irrelevant whether you are happy or unhappy. You are content." And until we find the bridge where God and we can communicate; where we can express our heart's desire, where we can be still and quiet and listen, where we feel safe to connect and act upon God's Word; we will be forever searching for elusive and momentary happiness rather than soul satisfying and everlasting contentment or joy. Matthew Kelly calls these moments of pure connection: Holy Moments; that is, "the moments in which we open ourselves to God. We make ourselves available to Him. We set aside personal preference and self-interest and for one moment we do what we prayerfully believe God is calling us to do."

"These Holy Moments, these tiny collaborations with God" made known to us through prayer, "unleash pure unmitigated joy" that is life transforming personally and for those around us.

In the promo for his opening video, Dr. Sri reminds us that we make choices everyday. God gave us the gift of free will and with it comes the necessary task of making decisions. If we only relied upon our own knowledge to make decisions, we would choose what is best for us and makes us happy. Through the wisdom of the saints and the contributors to this video series, we learn how to move the focus of our decisions off of ourselves and onto willing the good of the other. Prayer is a collaboration. We are not just passive participants. Prayer, then is "grace-filled and best for others-directed action." For all those who wish to make a lasting change in their life, to leave fleeting happiness behind in favor of the quenching satisfaction of contentment and joy, please begin a conversation with God. He is calling. Are we willing to personally answer the door and invite Him in?

Christmas Collection



We are grateful and thankful that many joined us at our Christmas Masses this year! The All Saints Finance Council would like to report that as of 1/6/2025 we have received \$64,733.85 towards the \$115,000.00 goal for Christmas. We know that many traveled over the holidays, and we rejoice to have you back safe and sound with us at the daily and weekend Masses. Please continue to send in the gifts for Christmas and we will update the total by the end of the month. Thank you to all who so generously shared a portion of their financial blessings with us at Christmas!



December Finances



- Generous end-of-the-year giving in December closed the budget giving gap from this same time last year by \$55,780.51. Thank you to those who gave extra, for the first time and who caught up with their giving intention for 2024.
- The donations for the Christmas collection are decreased from this same time as last year by \$50,572.45.
- Overall, All Saints only gained about \$5,000 of cash flow relief in December.
- Expenses were either at or below expectations for December. The two items of significance for December were for a) snow removal and ice melt; and b) additional bank expenses due to the receipt of stock gifts.
- The parish expenses are up by 46% in the operations and maintenance category due to significant increases in the utility market. We carefully program heating and cooling and monitor lighting in order to control those expenses as much as possible.
- The Finance Council and the Parish Staff are closely monitoring our cash flow.

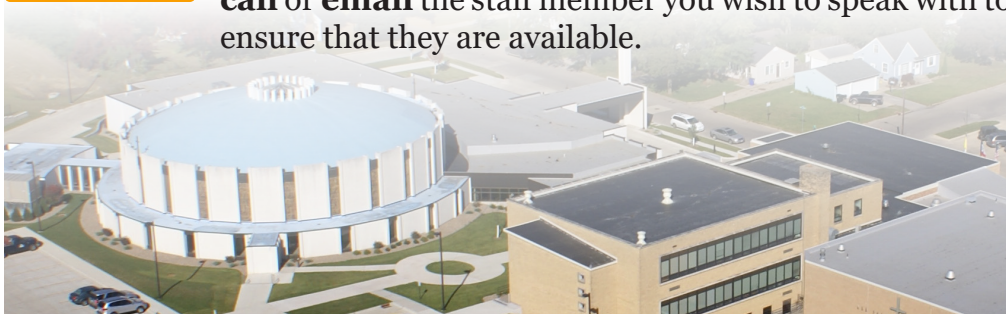

December 29, 2024 • The Holy Family • Luke 2:41-52

The Holy Family

Jesus lived a rather ordinary life with his family. We have only one story from his childhood: Luke's account of Jesus being left behind in Jerusalem. I love this story because it makes the Holy Family seem so human, and it reminds us that even the holiest of families have problems.

Mary and Joseph are coming back from Jerusalem in a large caravan of relatives. After traveling for a full day they realize Jesus is missing. Imagine the scene. They are scared to death. Maybe they even argue a bit about what to do. Perhaps Joseph allows his fear to sound like anger as he questions Mary about when she has last seen Jesus. They turn around and retrace their steps to and through Jerusalem.

For three days they search for Jesus, concerned that he is afraid, alone and lost. Instead, they find Jesus in the temple, sitting comfortably with the teachers. Their relief turns to the very human emotion of frustration, as Mary asks her son, "Why have you done this to us?" Jesus answers like any other twelve-year-old: "I thought you'd know...."

Like all families, the Holy Family probably had times when their communication was less than perfect. Like all strong families, they probably said their "sorries" and learned from their mistakes. I jokingly like to say that we don't hear about Jesus for the next eighteen years because he was grounded, but I'm just projecting a mother's frustration. More seriously, we know this was an important event for Mary, because she kept it forever in her heart.

FAMILY RESPONSE

All families have problems. Handling problems in a positive way, and not letting them dissolve family unity, is a trait of strong families. And so is good communication. Ask family members to talk about positive ways of solving problems.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

All parents hold things in their hearts regarding their children. What are the really special things about your child or children that you do not want to forget?

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 3:15–16, 21–22

The story of Jesus' baptism in Sunday's Gospel shows the mystery of the Blessed Trinity. After John baptizes Jesus in the Jordan, God announces to the crowd that Jesus is his beloved Son, and the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove settled on him. Baptism gives us new life as adopted children of God and gives all the gift of that Holy Spirit. Living the Gospel helps those who follow Jesus be a witness to the world that the Good News is for everyone.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned that the Sacrament of Baptism makes people members of God's family—the Church. Take time to show your child pictures of his or her Baptism. Share the names of the godparents. This is also a good opportunity for you to make sure that your child knows how to make the Sign of the Cross.

Promise (Grades K–1): In class, the children shared the story of Jesus' baptism. Talk to your child about the memories you have of his or her Baptism. Talk about the white garments, the candle, the godparents, the priest or deacon who performed the ceremony, and the pouring of the water. Help your child with all the information needed to complete the back of the Baptism "strip."

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week your child learned that Jesus' baptism by Saint John was the beginning of his work teaching about God's love. Your child also became familiar with the rite of the Sacrament of Baptism. The class also learned that people are baptized in the name of the Holy Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Whenever you make the Sign of the Cross, you are reminded that you are members of God's family, the Church. As a family, try to begin all your activities with the Sign of the Cross.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week your young person learned that Baptism makes them members of the Church. Baptism is also a call for everyone to act justly. Your youngster learned the principles of Catholic social teaching. Ask them to share those with the family. Discuss how the Holy Spirit speaks with us and directs our lives. During any discussions, consider using a Talking Stick like the one from the lesson.

Visions (Grades 7–8): The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord has been an opportunity for your teenager to learn more about two of the Sacraments of Christian Initiation—Baptism and Confirmation. Baptism is also a call to make a difference in all the communities to which we belong. Take some time to share together how important it is for your family to be active members of the Christian community, to worship together, and to be signs to others of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the world.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.
