Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to Ordinary Time in our liturgical cycle. We have 7 weeks of following Jesus on the journey of his ministry until he sets a final path to Jerusalem for Lent. Today's reading shares the story of Jesus' first public miracle - changing the water into wine at a wedding in Cana. There are many fascinating pieces to this story, but the one that caught my attention this week is Mary's statement to the servers: "Do whatever he tells you."

As a mother, this statement intrigues me because it starts with Mary being a typical Mom - she observes a situation that she feels her son could do something about to help, and so she makes him aware of it in a very motherly, concise manner. "They have no wine," is packed with way more than 4 words. Yes, the wedding feast has run out of wine, but Mary is also telling Jesus that she doesn't want the couple to be embarrassed by this, that she knows he can do something to fix the situation, and most importantly, that she expects him to listen to her and do as she asks. It is unfortunate that audio recordings are not available for I am positive that if one was, we would have learned even more from Mary's tone and verbal nuances - she was a good Jewish mother after all! Jesus counters her request, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." Both Mary and Jesus are well connected to God and so it is interesting that Mary feels that it is time for Jesus to begin his public ministry and Jesus does not share that sense of calling or urgency. Wonderfully, and as an example for us to follow, she does not argue with Jesus; rather she simply instructs the servers to "do whatever he tells you."

This statement holds the key to our life. Do whatever he (God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit) tells you. The challenge is that one must listen and have the faith and the courage to respond in the affirmative. We call this conversational and listening process - prayer. Pope Francis says, "Like the disciples [and the servers in today's Gospel reading], we are called to listen to the voice of Jesus, to deepen in our contemplation and to be capable of living and announcing the love of God incarnate in Him, particularly through service in favor of those most in need and also through Eucharist and reparative (i.e. asking for forgiveness, promising to change, and asking God to have mercy) prayer.

Prayer can take many forms, beginning with short memorized prayers as a child all the way to sitting with the Lord and actively sharing your thoughts and concerns, listening for His Word and then acting upon it. Doing this consistently and allowing God to transform us through the process is the gift of metanoia. In his introduction to the Pilgrimage of Prayer, Edward Sri says, "Jesus wants to take us on an interior journey with him through our prayer life. He doesn't just want us to say our prayers and complete a good Christian task each day to check off a box. He doesn't want us to learn some important facts about him in prayer. Prayer is not primarily about reading, learning, or using a certain method correctly. It's not just about the head. God ultimately wants to reach our hearts. He want to get under the surface of our routine life and touch the deep caverns of our soul. It's about learning how to cooperate with God during prayer and allowing him to act more fully in our lives."

These words can inspire fear in even the strongest. As human beings, we like to think that life is only great if we are the one in control of the steering wheel. Others may have the view that God would not want to bother with someone like "them", someone who seems to make choices that land them in one disaster after another. And still others have encased their heart with a fence so tall and thick that no one could get in. The human in many of us would respond, "why bother?" or "for what purpose?" Edward Sri encourages us to look to the saints for our answer. "Through the stories of the saints we learn that they were human beings who struggled as we do - men and women who struggled in prayer, faced difficult problems, battled many temptations and even made mistakes. But each time they fell, they repented and got up again, entrusted themselves to God's mercy and learned to rely ever more on God's grace to help them do what they could never do on their own." This learning to seek repentance, to rely more upon God's grace than our own will, to develop a heart that seeks love before all else - this is the fruit of learning how to cooperate with God during prayer and to allow him to act more fully in our lives. This is the life possible with prayer. "Do whatever he tells you." Will you join me in this journey; this pilgrimage of prayer?

Service to Others Metro Catholic Outreach



Thinking about volunteering in 2025?

Metro Catholic Outreach feeds over 140 local families per week, as well as helping with the needs of dozens of our city's homeless folks. We supply provisions to school children with weekend food insecurity, and we provide some rent or utilities assistance to households that need a boost out of tough situations.

We do this with a staff of only three — an Executive Director, a part-time Pantry Manager, and a part-time Volunteer Manager.

It is the 193 volunteers who really make things happen! Some folks volunteer once or twice per month, some volunteer every week or more. Others stop in when they can, or drop off much needed donations. Many of our volunteers come to us from our local Catholic parishes, but we also have countless volunteers from other area churches, or no church affiliation at all.

Our shifts are only two to three hours long, and the easy work is varied and interesting. Many friendships have formed in the small groups of six to eight who volunteer together. Sorting incoming donations, checking expiration dates, shelving food, putting together food boxes, greeting clients, loading groceries into cars, transporting donations from corporate donors, are just some of the tasks performed by our faithful pantry volunteers.

Our office volunteers answer phones, schedule families for their food pickups, greet clients coming in for assistance, organize clothing donations, assemble and distribute homeless bags.

Whatever your skill level, we can use your help in feeding and assisting local people who need us!

Jesus' First Miracle: The Wedding Feast at Cana

Jesus and his friends attend a wedding in the town of Cana. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine" (v. 3). At his mother's request Jesus turns water into wine, thus sparing the host the humiliation of running out of wine. This is Jesus' first miracle—a miracle that went unnoticed except for Jesus' friends, his mother and the servers.

Even Jesus needed a gentle push from his mother to embark on his mission. When she mentions the problem of the wine, Jesus tells her it isn't his time yet. Mary, ignoring his protest, instructs the servers to do whatever he tells them. She knows her son. After all, she raised him, and she taught him the virtue of compassion.

I don't often think of Jesus as a child, but when I do I have to remind myself that he was a regular little boy. We know he never sinned, but if he was human he must have made mistakes. Like all good parents, Jesus' mother and father had to teach him to face his problems, deal with them and, if possible, fix them. It's obvious from this story of the wedding at Cana that they also taught him to be aware of other people's problems too.

Compassion, caring about others, is an essential quality for Christians. Help your children notice the little things: to see when their sibling or friend needs help. Open their eyes to the details of life. Help them develop empathy for those who are hurting, including the unspoken hurts of frustration, embarrassment, humiliation or defeat. Teach them to ask themselves: How would I feel? What can I do? Answer those questions with them when they are young.

Jesus' first miracle happened at a party because his mother pointed out that someone was in need. There was no big fanfare, no huge audience. Jesus responded, as he knew he should, as his parents had taught him. And his public ministry was launched.

The Jubilee Year Begins

On Sunday, December 29, Archbishop Thomas Zinkula celebrated Mass at the Cathedral of St. Raphael to mark the opening of the Jubilee Year in harmony with dioceses worldwide. The Archbishop presided at the celebration, which began with a procession led by the Metropolitan Cross and included the blessing of water and the sprinkling of the assembly.

The Cathedral parish is currently undergoing renovations, but this isn't stopping the celebration of Jubilee events. Fr. Dennis

Quint, Pastor at both the Cathedral and St. Patrick in Dubuque, is celebrating a Jubilee Prayer Service for Health Care Workers at St. Patrick on Saturday, April 5, at 10:00 a.m. "There will be time for adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and Confessions as well as part of our Lenten observance," said Fr. Quint.

Parish leaders are planning a multi-tiered approach to welcoming parishioners, local Catholics, and the faithful throughout the archdiocese to the Cathedral when the renovation is complete.

The Archbishop of Dubuque is the Metropolitan of the Province of Dubuque, which includes the dioceses of Davenport, Des Moines, and Sioux City.

Renewal and Calling: The Propaedeutic Stage in Light of the Jubilee Year

The Jubilee Year has historically been a time of renewal. The Jubilee serves as a reminder that God is close to his people and provides for them, calling them to grow closer to Him and provide for one another.

Three seminarians have entered into their own phase of spiritual growth and reflection this year, in the Propaedeutic

Stage of their seminary formation.

In 2023, the Holy See and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops added an introductory "Propaedeutic Stage" to priestly formation. This year is a dedicated period to focus intensely on spiritual and human development by cultivating the skills they need to live in community and lay the foundations of spiritual life. Prayer is at the heart of this period.

Sean Hamilton, Matt Mitchell, and Cory Rude are the first in the Archdiocese of Dubuque to take part in this new stage of formation.

Fr. Mark Murphy, Archdiocesan Vocations Director, explains, "This initial year in seminary formation is meant to be a time of further discernment as a man moves from whatever he was doing previously (work

or school) into seminary life with a focus on developing the spiritual and human dimensions of a person."

Sean Hamilton - Propaedeutic Stage Home Parish: St. Ludmila in Cedar Rapids

The past three months have been some of the best of my life! Being a seminarian involves a lot of classes and prayer, but what has been the most interesting and challenging for me has been all the things that happen outside of the chapel and classroom. I'd like to comment on a few aspects of this formation stage that I have found very helpful in my discernment towards the priesthood.

First, the creation of another year of formation that is primarily focused on the human and spiritual growth within a man is invaluable. The wisdom of the Church desired this stage for men to encounter deeper stirrings of the heart and soul without the distraction of demanding academics. This is a blessing. In the context of seminary, many deep issues

arise regarding a man's past, his woundedness, and how he believes God sees him. This year grants space for these deep issues to be looked at, accepted, and improved in the tender gaze of God. Second, separation from the world is a huge part of this year. Participating in technology fasts, entering into silence, and growing in obedience have allowed me to fall in love with God once more and to fully abandon my cares to Him. Finally, this Propaedeutic Stage has given me space and time to further my understanding of philosophical and theological material. We have taken deep dives into topics such as Theology of the Body, Lectio Divina, and Philosophy. The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 2:1-11

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus begins his public ministry at a wedding feast at Cana in Galilee. He saves the groom some embarrassing moments by providing a fresh supply of wine. Jesus demonstrates that he brings people together in joy and that he uses human events to convey his message that the Kingdom of God is at hand.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child's feelings of love, security, and trust stem from experiences in your family. This week in class the lesson helped your child understand that he or she belongs to a family and to appreciate the love and concern there. Take time this week to talk together about the experiences you all share, and be especially aware of what your young child needs from you. Have your child show you the drawing from page 4 of the lesson.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week your child explored the ways he or she makes a difference to family and friends. Your child learned about Jesus' blessing a young bride and groom with his presence. This is a good week to share how your family shows the love and care that Jesus expressed by saving the wedding couple from embarrassment. Have your child tell you the story, "Michael Brings Joy," from this week's lesson.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week your child learned about the Seven Sacraments. Encourage your child to share what each of the sacraments means. As a family, share experiences of receiving the sacraments or how the sacraments are part of your life as a family. Your child may be preparing for First Communion; plan ways for the whole family to join in the preparation.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your young person's class learned how the sacraments offer Jesus' loving and healing actions. Starting with the Gospel of the Wedding at Cana, the class saw how Jesus used a sign to make a difference in people's lives and to form a community. What are the welcoming, healing, and loving signs your family shares with others? Ask your youngster to teach the "Sacramental Life" game to the family, and play it together.

Visions (Grades 7–8): This week's lesson used the Gospel of the Wedding at Cana to teach about all the sacraments. Your youngster talked about the ways that the sacraments make our faith visible. Ask your youngster to share the symbols, words, and gestures of the sacraments with the family. Talk together about what the sacraments mean for your family. How can you help one another participate regularly in Eucharist and Reconciliation? How have the other sacraments made an impact on your family?

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

Pray Together

Try to join in a morning or evening prayer together each day for a week. The prayer does not have to be formal, structured, or long. Say a special prayer in your own words for all the weddings that will occur this week that God may bless the couples and keep them faithful, safe, and loving.
