Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today's reading from St. Paul's 1st letter to the Corinthians is one of my favorites as it is a timeless message that is true across many stages: religious, work, cultural and family.

I was curious what had happened at Corinth that Paul felt compelled to write this letter. I opened George T. Montague's commentary on First Corinthians and read this: "Imagine that in a dream one night you find yourself in a parish where there are several drunks at the Sunday Mass; where some members are claiming that there is no resurrection of the dead and that Jesus is not really present in the Eucharist; the parishioners

are divided into cliques and factions; the president of the Altar Society is not talking to the head catechist; there is public unchallenged adultery and many marriages are in disarray; a group is dabbling in New Age Spirituality; the liberals, the charismatics, and the traditionalists are all trumpeting their version of the church; and Masses are abbreviated for the sake of Sunday football - one of the many signs the parish has compromised heavily with the surrounding secular culture. A nightmare? Not exactly. You are just experiencing a modern version of the community in Corinth."

I find it a bit disheartening to realize that while many advances are recognizable in our world, it would appear that on the "people" front, not much as changed. And yet, at the same time, it can help us feel connected to the past and help us to know that God's Word is living and relevant no matter how much time has gone by. For instance, today's Responsorial Psalm focuses on the truth that "Your words, Lord, are Spirit and life." Many sources believe that this Psalm was written by King David around 1000 BC and was a reflection by David on the meaning of human life in God's creation. As we further reflect upon the readings for today, I would propose that this theme: the timelessness of God's Word, is what ties them all together.

If we were to go in chronological order, we would start with the Psalm and then move to around 500 BC for the old Testament reading when Nehemiah was king. Ezra, Nehemiah and the Levites were all instructing the people on the law of God. It would seem that this was meant to be a penitential exercise as the people were weeping, presumably in awe of the Lord, but also in realizing their sinfulness. As with the Sacrament of Reconciliation, God does not leave us to wallow in the misery of our failures. He forgives us and like Nehemiah reminds us that "rejoicing in the Lord must be our strength." Then we move to around 30 AD and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. In the synagogue, shortly after his baptism by John, he identifies himself as the subject of this passage from Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord" - a time to experience God's grace and mercy in a significant way. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus frequently highlights the timelessness of the Old Testament and make known that they are being realized through him. Finally, we conclude with St. Paul and his letter to the Corinthians. The first sentence ties the past and the present and looks to the future at the same time. "As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also for Christ." What was started as the one body of Isreal was broken into 12 tribes. These tribes were united and divided many times over the course of the Old Testament. It is in Jesus that we find cohesion again, but not just among the Jewish nation, indeed with all of humanity through baptism in the Spirit: "For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free person, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit."

This message of timelessness and the continued relevance of God's Word is further expanded: "But as it is, God placed the parts, each one of them in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be? But as it is, there are many parts, yet one body." We are to rejoice that God created us not as uniform beings, but as unique individuals with a unique purpose for the realization of his mission on earth. We are called to complement each other and through that unity become Christ's body. Every person, great or small, strong or weak is present in Christ's body. In great detail, Paul uses the image of the human body to paint the picture of Christ's body formed on earth through the gifts of all.

Look at our families, our workplaces, our church, our community and the world. St. Paul's message is present as much today as it was throughout history. We see and experience division, bias and discrimination, but we also witness graced moments of cooperation and the reality of Christ's body.

Let's pray and reflect upon God's timeless Word and Christ's continual call to celebrate our God given uniqueness in the unity of our baptism in the one Spirit.



Jesus Teaches in the Synagogue

When Jesus entered the synagogue in Nazareth, the town in which he grew up, he was handed a scroll of Isaiah and invited to read. He began, "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives..." (v.18).

Jesus had left the desert following his baptism. He was feeling great. He had faced his temptations and was eager to begin his ministry. He went to the synagogue to pray. Imagine his surprise when he was given this particular Scripture to read. The words spoke to his experience. He was aware that the spirit of God was upon him. He felt he had been anointed to bring wonderfully good news wherever he went.

The words from Isaiah must have confirmed for Jesus what he had discerned in the desert: He had a mission that would eventually be shared by all those who truly came to know him. On that day in the synagogue in his hometown of Nazareth, Jesus takes Isaiah's words and proclaims them as his own. He will open the eyes of those who cannot see and work his whole life to free those who are oppressed.

Jesus is aware that many people can see the trees but be blind to the forest. He knows that someone can be held captive and still walk freely in the world. His mission is to open people's eyes to God's love so they can love in the same way. His mission is to freeo those who are oppressed by fear and loneliness as well as greed and prejudice.

Jesus invites all people to be a part of the kingdom of God, and to bring justice to those who are poor, suffering and physically oppressed. He gave his life in faithfulness to this mission, and he offers us the same invitation. Through his life, death and resurrection, Jesus has freed us from oppression if we are willing to open ourselves to the new life he offers.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask family members to talk about one thing they are afraid of. Talk about why they think they have that fear.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What are some of your fears? Do they hold you back? Do they keep you from being the best you can be? Are you willing to let go of those fears by asking for God's help?

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus says he fulfills the words of the prophet Isaiah. He is chosen to bring good news to the poor, sight to the blind, and freedom to captives. Those who follow Jesus are called to continue his work of mercy, love, and acceptance.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned that Jesus has Good News to tell. The class also explored how they can share Good News with others in many ways. Take some time to drive or walk around your neighborhood. Look for signs of Good News in what you see in each house or building you pass. When you get back home, talk about how your family can be Good News for others. Have your child show how he or she can pray using hands. Have your child sign and say a prayer for your family.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned that Jesus grew up in a real town with real neighbors. The class also learned the importance of their own neighborhood. Ask your son or daughter to teach the family to play the "I can be a good neighbor" game. Go with your child to deliver the "Good Neighbor Award" your child wrote in class.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child's class shared what is Good News for them and how they bring Good News to others. Talk about the Good News that Jesus shared with his friends and neighbors—care for the poor, sight to the blind, freedom for those in slavery. Your child also learned about the Liturgy of the Word at Mass. Talk about ways to help one another be attentive to the readings at Mass. Ask your child to share the story "Birdie's Good News" with the family.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Ask your young person to share with the family what he or she learned about the Gospel of Luke. The class also learned what is needed to build community. Talk about ways your family can be prophets, feed the hungry, and bring Good News to the poor. Set up a prayer place in your home. Decorate it with a Bible, candles, and maybe a statue or religious picture. Gather there for a morning and evening prayer during the week.

Visions (Grades 7–8): The class this week explored information about the Gospel writer named Luke. Ask your youngster to share what the class learned. The class also learned that Jesus acted as a Spirit-filled prophet when he read the words of Isaiah in his hometown synagogue. How can your family bring Good News to the poor? Look in your daily newspaper or online for stories about people who need to hear Jesus' words. Talk about their situations.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, make a family litany of people in your family, in your neighborhood, at work, at school, or in the world who need to experience the Good News. Take turns reading the names or the situations. All can respond by saying, "Lord, help us be Good News for (name)."
