

## **Everyday Metanoia**



Welcome to the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. We began the three-part teaching on the Beatitudes last week and will conclude next week. So...what does this week's installment bring to us?

This week Jesus shares descriptive examples of what it means to accept the work of being one of his disciples. Even though there was a crowd of people surrounding Jesus, he spoke very plainly to the disciples so there could be no misunderstanding of his teaching; of his expectation.

In 2022, Pope Francis explored this same Gospel with his audience. His words, reflection and challenge could serve as a catalyst to make some changes on our journey of discipleship; that being to sweep away our ego, our attachment to the world and our lack of mercy; making needed room for love and charity.

"Indeed, the Beatitudes define the identity of the disciple of Jesus. They may sound strange, almost incomprehensible to those who are not disciples; whereas, if we ask ourselves what a disciple of Jesus is like, the answer is precisely the Beatitudes. 'Blessed are you poor, for yours is the Kingdom of God'. Blessed are you poor. Jesus says two things to his people: that they are blessed and they are poor; indeed, that they are blessed because they are poor.

In what sense? In the sense that disciples of Jesus do not find their joy in money, power, or other material goods; but in the gifts, they receive every day from God: life, creation, brothers and sisters, and so on. These are gifts of life. They are content to share even the goods they possess because they live according to the logic of God. And what is the logic of God? Gratuitousness. The disciple has learned to live in gratuitousness. This poverty is also an attitude towards the meaning of life because Jesus' disciples do not think about possessing it, about already knowing everything, but rather they know they must learn every day. And this is poverty: the awareness of having to learn every day. The disciple of Jesus, since he or she has this attitude, is a humble, open person, far from prejudice and inflexibility... Instead, those who are too attached to their own ideas and their own securities, find it difficult to truly follow Jesus. They follow him a little, only in those things in which 'I agree with him and he agrees with me', but then, as far as the rest is concerned, it goes no further. And this is not a disciple. Perhaps they listen to him, but they do not follow him. And so, they fall into sadness. They become sad because the accounts do not add up because reality escapes their mentality and they find they are dissatisfied. Disciples, on the other hand, know how to question themselves, how to humbly seek God every day, and this allows them to delve into reality, grasping its richness and complexity. In other words, the disciple accepts the paradox of the Beatitudes: they declare that those who are poor, who lack many goods and recognize this, are blessed, that is, happy. Humanly speaking, we are inclined to think in another way: happy are those who are rich, with many goods, who receive plaudits and are the envy of many, who have all the certainties. But this is a worldly mindset, it is not the way of thinking of the Beatitudes! Jesus, on the contrary, declares worldly success to be a failure, since it is based on a selfishness that inflates and then leaves the heart empty. Faced with the paradox of the Beatitudes, disciples allow themselves to be challenged, aware that it is not God who must enter into our logic, but we into his. This requires a journey, sometimes wearisome, but always accompanied by joy. Because the disciple of Jesus is joyful, with the joy that comes from Jesus. Because, let us remember, the first word Jesus says is: blessed, beati, which gives us the name of the Beatitudes. This is the synonym of being disciples of Jesus. The Lord, by freeing us from the slavery of self-centeredness, breaks our locks, dissolves our hardness, and opens up to us true happiness, which is often found where we do not expect it to be. It is he who guides our life, not us, with our preconceptions and our demands. Disciples, in the end, are those who let themselves be led by Jesus, who open their hearts to Jesus, who listen to him and follow his path."

Richard Rohr in his book, Jesus' Alternative Plan: The Sermon on the Mount, sums it up: "Jesus didn't want his community to have a social ethic, he wanted it to be a social ethic. Their very way of relating was to be an affront to the system of dominance and power; it was to name reality in a new way. They were to live in a new symbolic universe." As we go through the next few weeks before Lent, let's look at ourselves, our families, our workplace, our world in a new way. Rather than asking what would Jesus do in this situation, let's start asking how would Jesus be love in this situation. Before our actions change, our attitudes and heart have to come first. Thoughts to take to pray.




## Save the Date



#### Jesus Tells Us to Love Our Enemies

Jesus continues to speak to the crowd, giving them perhaps his most difficult teaching. He tells them to give to everyone who asks and expect nothing in return. He instructs his listeners to love everyone, and reminds them that even sinners love those who love them. "...Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you" (v.27).

This is the bottom line of what it means to be a Christian—loving even those who don't love you. However, it's important to understand what love really is. For example, you can love someone and not like him. Loving and liking are two different things. Love is a bond, sometimes accompanied by a warm and glorious feeling of devotion, even passion. But much of the time, love is just a strong sense of connection. The test for real love is when that wonderful, warm feeling is absent and the connection remains.

This is the love Jesus is talking about—a loving bond that demands respect and tolerance. We are expected to recognize the connection that exists not just within our own families but also within the family of humankind, and to honor its demands. If someone chooses not to love us back, we do not allow her actions to dictate ours. We don't give others that power over us.

In your household when one brother smacks another, you don't persuade him to hit back. When one child is disrespectful of another's toys, you certainly don't encourage reciprocal action. All people are part of the family of humankind, and God, as a parent, offers the same advice you would give your children.

Teach your children by example. That's what God did. Jesus stood up for what he believed. He never cowered. But when things got too hot, he walked away, and usually found a quiet spot to pray and regroup. When he was ultimately overpowered and put to death, he still triumphed. That's the message of the Resurrection: The love God asks of us will always see us through. It is even more powerful than death.

#### **FAMILY RESPONSE**

Ask family members to talk about someone they have trouble liking. Do not allow any belittling. Try to talk about the person in a respectful way. Finally, find at least two things that are nice about that person.

How do you usually treat people you do not like? How do you respond when someone is unkind to you? How would you like to respond?

## The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: Luke 6:27-38

Jesus continues his teaching following the Beatitudes. He tells us to love our enemies, pray for those who hurt us, and give of ourselves to anyone who asks. We learn the great Golden Rule: Do to others as you would have them do to you. Offer a prayer of praise as we cannot hear these words often enough.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

Seeds (Preschool): This week, your child learned that Jesus simply wants us to love and forgive others. Ask your child how he or she shares, exercises, learns, pretends, helps, laughs, and plays with others. Share with your child your own ideas on how to do these things. Be sure to check out the "My Friends and Me" booklet that your child made in class this week.

**Promise** (Grades K–1): Jesus taught us to be kind. Your child learned about the Golden Rule to treat others as we want to be treated. Ask your child about times this week when he or she was kind to others. Share when you felt someone was kind to you. Accept your child's Kindness Coupons with love. Thank the Lord for your child, so they can hear your love for them.

**Good News** (Grades 2–3): Your child learned this week about Jesus' law of love, which means being kind to others and even loving your enemies. Ask your child why Brendan Groehl's story was a good one for this week's lesson on kindness. Talk about the class activity to make the four story problems better or worse.

**Venture** (Grades 4–6): Talk with your young person about where he or she sees injustice in the world. Ask your youngster why the story of Mother Mary Lange was a good one for this week's lesson on justice. Have a family discussion on why it is so contrary to society to love our enemies as Jesus taught. Pray for people who have hurt you or who oppress others in the world. Pray, too, that your family remains loving to everyone.

Visions (Grades 7–8): How were Medgar and Myrlie Evers able to learn not to hate people who hurt them? Your youngster read the sad story of Medgar Evers this week. Pray that people have learned from Medgar's sacrifice. Pray, too, that we can learn to love our enemies as Jesus taught. Discuss how peace begins with each of us, and how far that peace might go if we are successful. Play a round of the "Push, Pass, or Peace" game from this week's lesson.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

#### **Pray Together**

Pray that you and your family can be instruments of peace in the world. Be sure to mention this idea during mealtime or other daily prayers. Pray for the Holy Spirit to give us the strength to be kind when others are not, and to seek forgiveness when we fail to do so.

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#### Jubilee Year 2025 Honors Armed Forces, Police, and Security Officials in February

During each month of the Jubilee Year, the Church celebrates numerous groups of laypeople and religious. Armed forces, police, and security officials are being honored in February alongside artists and deacons.

The following article contains interviews with three members of law enforcement, both active and retired, who are parishioners in the Archdiocese of Dubuque.

#### Chief Deputy Jill Knipper Parish: Sts. Peter & Paul, Petersburg

Jill Knipper is Chief Deputy of the Delaware County Sheriff's Office, and has worked in law enforcement for 21 years. She is married with three children, and is a parishioner at Sts. Peter & Paul



in Petersburg where she volunteers at various parish events and serves as a

Eucharistic Minister.

Jill first felt called to a career in law enforcement because of how it provides a wide variety of opportunities to keep her local community safe and happy where they work, live, and raise families.

She says that her Catholic faith has always been something that is at the center of her decision-making.

"I try to start each day with a positive outlook knowing that God will show up for me in many ways throughout the day, whether those ways be big or small," Jill reflects.

"I think my faith has helped me be more understanding and willing to give a chance to people who many think may not deserve that chance. My faith has guided me through tough situations and has been a driving force when there are things on my mind or situations that need my attention."

Weekly church attendance helps ground her in a world that can be everchanging. Law enforcement is never the same career from day to day. It has her constantly thinking on her feet and adjusting to different situations that she may not have planned for, but knows that she has trained for.

"Just as we are taught to fall back on the trainings and teachings of Jesus, we as law enforcement are taught the same - to fall back on our teachings and trainings."

Law enforcement is well supported and appreciated in her community, which is a two way street.

Jill speaks about how compassion, forgiveness and justice are three things that can be looked at differently by all people. Law enforcement is looked at differently by all people, and so they go hand in hand in her book.

"Law enforcement allows me to have and use compassion for others on a daily basis just based on the variety of populations I have an opportunity to work with in a day. The goal of law enforcement is to bring justice to the communities we serve and again that looks different for many, but seems simple when you look at the teaching we hear about in Mass weekly. I know that my faith has deepened and my relationship with God has changed in many ways since becoming a law enforcement officer, and I am sure this will continue to deepen and change as I continue my career."

#### Corporal Travis Kramer Parish: Resurrection, Dubuque

Corporal Travis

Department, with over
25 years of experience
in law enforcement.
Travis is married with



three children, and is a parishioner at Resurrection Parish. There he has served on a number of committees, co-chaired the parish festival, and served on the Pastoral Council.

Travis attended Loras College, where he graduated with a BA in International Business. During his senior year there, his best friend was a member of the Dubuque Auxiliary Police and invited him to also join. Travis ended up enjoying it, and decided to pursue a career in law enforcement after graduation.

His Catholic faith and the lessons about how to treat others often comes into play in his work.

"Law enforcement officers deal with people across the full spectrum of life, but often during times of tragedy and need. Being Catholic guides me to treat others with respect and compassion, serve those in need of assistance, and treat others equally, as Jesus taught us to," he says.

During times of difficulty, Travis turns to a saint that he feels especially connected to - St. Michael the Archangel.

"I carry blessed Saint Michael medals with me at work, one in my pants pocket and another in front of the ballistic panels of my vest," Travis explains.

"I pray to him and Jesus before and after every shift, thanking them for their protection of me and my fellow officers, and asking to help us be a light of Christ to others."

The faith community, like a majority of the Dubuque community, has been supportive of Travis and the other members of local law enforcement. That support is shown through prayer intentions, kind words, and even treats

and cards written to officers from Wahlert Catholic High School students.

Catholic teachings have also helped him to deal with difficult situations on a routine basis.

"Working with victims and their families requires compassion, while treating offenders with fairness. Reading and learning about these situations is one thing, but by living them over and over I have developed a much deeper understanding of Catholic teachings about compassion, forgiveness, and justice."

#### Deacon Michael Klappholz Parish: All Saints, Cedar Rapids

Deacon Mike Klappholz was a Cedar Rapids Police Officer for over 33 years, the last nine of which he served as Chief of Police before his retirement. He is married with two



children, and is a proud grandfather to four grandchildren. He is a longtime member of and deacon at All Saints Parish in Cedar Rapids, where he has served on archdiocesan committees and is currently the Chaplain for the Catholic Committee on Scouting.

His first memory of expressing interest in law enforcement was during his senior year of high school at his Eagle Scout Ceremony. There, the Cedar Rapids Police Chief at the time, George Matias, was the guest speaker.

After his freshman year of college, Deacon Mike enlisted in the Iowa Army National Guard and spent the summer at basic training. He decided to major in Criminal Justice, and after graduation joined the Cedar Rapids Police Department (CRPD) as a rookie and began his career in law enforcement.

At the time of his retirement, he was Police Chief of CRPD and a Colonel in the Iowa National Guard. The day before his retirement ceremony, he began Formation to become a deacon.


His Catholic faith has had a profound impact on his career, in addition to his life overall. Many of his friends and interests came into his life due to his parish and his faith, not to mention his pastor's guidance over the decades.

"From my first days as a Cedar Rapids Police Officer, All Saints has been with me on my journey. Upon my appointment as a rookie in the Police Academy, the parish newsletter had an article featuring another new officer and me," he remembers. "Over the year, whenever someone or something was needed, many times the person stepping forward was from our Catholic faith."

Deacon Mike also makes the connection between being a police officer and a deacon. "In both roles, we at times are called to assist others during difficult situations in people's lives. This can certainly call for compassion, forgiveness, and justice."

The lesson that Deacon Mike would give to someone who is considering a career in law enforcement is the same one that he would give to anyone contemplating their calling in life.

"As a retired police officer and chief, I have observed and witnessed officers perform heroic actions under very stressful and difficult circumstances, and at times, put their arm on someone's shoulder and cry with them. It takes a special person to be a good police officer (the same goes for a priest and even a deacon). The challenge is determining what God is calling us to do and, more importantly, what to be. Only through prayer and reflection is knowing this possible."


# Looking for an experience
