

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the First Sunday of Lent. I have to admit that perhaps I getting a little older, but still trying to hang onto that youthful vanity. When I started to read the Pablo T. Gadenz's commentary for today's Gospel reading in Luke, I did a double take, for I thought it read 'Spring Training.' What? Jesus went through spring training just like the Cubs are doing right now? Kind of cool! And then I put my readers on and discovered that it really read 'Spiritual Training.' God obviously has a sense of humor! After I finished ruefully laughing at myself, I started to think about this reading, baseball spring training and Lent. They have a lot in common and can help us to enter into this season of our liturgical year with intention, prayer and hope.

After his baptism in the Jordan by John and being filled with the Holy Spirit and led by the Spirit, Jesus enters the desert. Ironically, the Cubs are in desert territory, specifically the Sonoran Desert. And believe it or not, spring training is fairly close to 40 days in length. Training season is a time to strengthen the players and the team. The players learn to listen to and to trust the coach. The coach puts each player through different tests to strengthen existing skills, to eliminate bad habits, and to teach new techniques. When each player approaches training with a commitment to be the best they can be, the entire team becomes a force to be reckoned with during the regular season.

Lent is the liturgical season that the Church provides for us to enter into our own metaphorical desert for 40 days. The sparseness of the desert can be experienced in our interior being, our external environment or both. Like Jesus, we too received the Holy Spirit through our baptism and it was strengthened when we received the Sacrament of Confirmation. The first passage in our reading from Luke today says, "Filled with the holy Spirit, Jesus returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the desert for 40 days..." This is one of those both/and moments that frequently color our faith life through the Catholic Church. We can be filled to the brim with the Holy Spirit, but we also have the gift of free will. If we choose not to cooperate, then the Holy Spirit will not lead us and guide us to strengthen our relationship with our Holy Father.

For those who attended the Discussion and Drinks adult formation evenings last Fall, the three temptations that the devil tried to entice Jesus with are the ones that Bishop Barron referred to as the 'wheel of fortune.' Using Bishop Barron's model, the outside of the wheel is divided into four sections: wealth, pleasure, honor and power. If we place ourselves on the wheel, the cycle of life spins and we are always seeking, achieving or losing one or more of these temptations. Jesus placed himself at the center of the wheel, not on it. With the strength and grace of his heavenly Father and cooperating with the holy Spirit, Jesus was able to say no to worldly desires and yes to the will of God. Pablo Gadenz sums it up well: "By fasting and other acts of self-denial, we learn self-control. By almsgiving we practice detachment from material things and avoid creating false needs for ourselves. By prayer, especially using the Scriptures as Jesus did, we humble ourselves before God, relying on his grace."

Earlier in this reflection, I talked about entering into Lent with intention, prayer and hope. I am not a proponent of giving something up for 40 days with the intention of picking it right back up at the conclusion. Many have endured Lent with family and friends who temporarily did not eat, drink or watch something. Or maybe this sounds like something we have done! Instead of using the opportunity to make themselves a better person, what usually happened is that they became very irritable and almost impossible to be around. Rather than trying to be grandiose and making this the 'Best Lent Ever,' why don't we choose one vice or temptation and make a true effort with it. What is something that we do or say that ultimately harms rather than does good? Much like the 12-step programs, can we name that and choose, one day at a time, to break the chain that holds us to this damaging piece of our life? In choosing to cooperate through intentional times of prayer, almsgiving and fasting the holy Spirit can lead us and strengthen us to resist and say 'no' to a particular temptation and ultimately we can leave that destructive habit in the desert. In so doing, we can then walk into the Easter Season full of hope, joy and love.


Hold on to Hope

- ✤ In the Ministry of the Liturgy he participates in the celebration of the Eucharist and may preside over other liturgies.
- ✤ In the **Ministry of Charity** he is the Church's servant to the world around him, ministering to those in need and urging others to join him in outreach.

Lenten Fasting, Prayer & Almsgiving



What is Lent?: Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also

baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ. Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts - not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

In Lent, the baptized are called to renew their baptismal commitment as others prepare to be baptized through the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults, a period of learning and discernment for individuals who have declared their desire to become Catholics.

Fast and Abstinence: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection. Prayer: During Lent we are called to spend more time in prayer in order to connect more fully with God. At All Saints we have scheduled many opportunities for additional prayer time, including: Mass, Lenten Adoration, Stations of the Cross, our Parish Mission, and the Men's Lenten Breakfast. The Faith Formation Commission will be distributing various Lenten prayer resources this weekend and the next. There are several Catholic apps that can be used for prayer time, including Hallow, Daily Prayer App, and Pray Catholic Prayers. You may also sign up to participate in the BEST LENT EVER (*https://www.dynamiccatholic.com/lent.html*) with Dynamic Catholic.

Almsgiving: The foundational call of Christians to charity is a frequent theme of the Gospels. During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on "almsgiving," which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity. As one of the three pillars of Lenten practice, almsgiving is "a witness to fraternal charity" and "a work of justice pleasing to God." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2462). During Lent our Haiti Committee will provide educational and relational bulletin articles to help us appreciate the challenges and joys of our brothers and sisters in Haiti. One of the most intentional gifts that we can provide for the children in our Sister Parish of Notre Dame de Lourdes is to assist in the cost of their education along with financing the wages for their teachers. We encourage parishioners to set aside funds everyday in the realization of our many blessings. This monetary donation should be brought to the Holy Thursday Mass.



Family Ministry

March 9, 2025 • 1st Sunday of Lent • Luke 4:1-13

Jesus Is Tempted in the Desert

The story of Jesus being tempted in the desert is familiar to Christians because it is read from the pulpit every year on the First Sunday of Lent. Jesus leaves the crowds to go into the desert to fast from food and to pray for forty days. At the end of this period, Jesus is tempted by the devil to use his power for self-gratification and personal gain.

Most folks will tell you it takes practice to say no to temptation. Consider Adam and Eve when they lived in paradise. They never had to practice saying no because they had everything they wanted. The first time they were tempted, they failed the test.

In this reading, we find Jesus in the desert tempted three times by the devil. He was physically weak, hungry and thirsty, and still he did not give in to temptation. He said no, not out of some superhuman power but from good old-fashioned willpower. Since Jesus is fully human, we can presume this was not his first encounter with temptation. Jesus had spent a lifetime building up his willpower by saying no to the easy way out, no to having fun at the expense of others, no to putting his needs or wants first.

How can we practice saying no to temptation? One way is by flexing the muscle of self-denial. Self-denial, or what we used to call, "giving stuff up," has been a part of Christian discipleship since Jesus walked with the first apostles: "...[G]o, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor..." (Matthew 19:21).

Lent may be the traditional time to practice self-denial, but it doesn't have to be the only time. You can practice saying no to your sweet tooth or the urge to buy one more thing on eBay. You can choose to drink water as your only beverage for a few days. You can even skip a couple of meals one day to experience what it feels like to go to bed hungry.

By practicing self-denial once in a while, we learn self-discipline, an important virtue for Christians. Often learning how to say no to small temptations can be very helpful when we find ourselves facing larger ones.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Decide as a household on something you can give up for the next week: candy, soda, potato chips. Have water at meals, or try fasting between lunch and dinner. Take the money you save and give it to the poor.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Giving up potato chips or chocolate can take a great amount of willpower. Giving up complaining about your boss, work or mother-in-law can take even more. Who or what is your favorite topic of complaint? Write it down,and then see if you can get through the next two weeks without mentioning it to anyone else.



Gospel Weeklies

March 9, 2025 1st Sunday of Lent

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 4:1-13

This Sunday's Gospel is the familiar temptation of Jesus by the Devil. Satan tempts Jesus who was led into the desert by the Holy Spirit for forty days. Jesus fasted the entire time, but he did not yield to the false power and glory promised by the Devil. Use this passage to give you and your family strength to face the temptations of every day life.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): This week your child learned that Lent is a time to make good choices. The class learned to care, pray, share, and help during Lent as a way to show love as we get ready for Jesus' sacrifice and Resurrection. Ask your child what a pretzel reminds them of, and practice the action of thinking about God.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week your child learned about how Jesus chose to follow God the Father, which is part of the lesson from this week's Gospel. Talk with your child about how to show love during Lent, and be sure to check out your child's Lenten prayer book.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child's class learned how the Holy Spirit gives us strength against temptation during Lent. Ask your child to retell the story from this week's lesson titled, "The Temptation." Ask how your child felt when the Devil kept tempting Jesus in this week's Gospel. Share times when you have felt tempted. Pray as a family to be able to avoid temptation.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week your youngster learned that Lent is a time to pray.

Ask your young person what happens in this week's story titled, "Tempted!" Jesus faced temptation in the desert, but ask your young person who filled Jesus and helped him resist Satan. Discuss how the Holy Spirit speaks with us and directs our lives. Ask your young person how studying The Lord's Prayer during Lent will help them prepare for Easter.

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Visions (Grades 7–8): Your youngster learned that Lent is also a time of sharing. Ask your young person what he or she plans to share or give up during Lent. Maybe the family could join in a project together. Have a discussion about the Gospel when Jesus says to not put God to the test. Talk about the history of Israel, and consider making a place and time to pray together as a family during Lent. This is a great week to talk with your youngster about the temptations he or she faces. Have your youngster explain Saint Ignatius Loyola's way to pray and reflect every day called the Examen. Give it a try this Lent.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

Pray Together

Prayer is emphasized in all the lessons this week. In addition to praying to avoid temptations as Jesus did in the Gospel reading, pray that the Holy Spirit can help your family prepare for Jesus' great sacrifice and Resurrection. Take advantage of prayers from the lessons and adapt them for use at home.
