

# **Everyday Metanoia**



Welcome to the Third Sunday of Lent. The parable of the fig tree in today's Gospel is about repentance. It is hard to believe, but next Sunday will already be the half way point in our Lenten journey. For three weeks now, God has been searching our hearts for repentance and love for Him and for our brothers and sisters. Is the fig tree of our life bearing fruit? If not, Jesus (the gardener in the parable) is inviting us to look deeply into our hearts and to fertilize it as needed through reconciliation, prayer, more frequent reception of the Eucharist, fasting from the destructive habits and patterns in our lives, and loving our brothers and sisters by taking care of them.

Pope Francis elaborates on this parable, highlighting that it is also calling us to action: "...it speaks to us of God's mercy and of our conversion. [In today's Gospel] the gardener expresses his dissatisfaction for the tree that did not bear fruit and asks for the gardener to eradicate it so that it won't exhaust the soil. The gardener asks the master to be patient and pleads for an extra year, during which he promises to cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it to stimulate the tree's productivity. The master represents God the Father and the gardener represents Jesus, while the fig tree is the symbol of an indifferent and arid humanity. Jesus intercedes with the Father on behalf of humanity and begs Him to wait and give humanity more time, so that in it may bear the fruits of love and justice. The fig tree represents a sterile existence, incapable of giving, of doing good: it is the symbol of a person who lives only for himself or herself, satiated and satisfied, happy with his or her own comfort, incapable of opening his or her eyes and heart to those brothers and sisters who live in suffering, poverty, discomfort. This attitude of selfishness and spiritual sterility is contrasted by the great love of the gardener for the fig tree: he has patience, he knows how to wait, and he devotes his time and his work to it. He promises his master he will take special care of that unhappy tree. This story tells of God's mercy, despite the sterility that sometimes marks our existence. God has patience and offers us the possibility of changing and making progress on the path to good. But this does not mean there is no urgency for conversion. The possibility of conversion is not unlimited. That's why it is necessary to seize it immediately; otherwise it may be lost forever. We can rely greatly on God's mercy, but we must not abuse it. We must not justify spiritual laziness, but increase our commitment to respond promptly to this mercy with sincerity of heart. The time of Lent [is when] the Lord invites us to conversion. Each of us must feel challenged by this call, correcting something in our lives, in our way of thinking, acting and living our relationships with our brothers and sisters. At the same time we must imitate the patience of God who has confidence in the ability of all to rise up and resume [our] journey. He does not extinguish the weak flame, but accompanies and cares for those who are weak so that they may strengthen themselves and bring their contribution of love to the community."

During Lent, the Confirmation students are using a resource called 40 Conversations with God. The conversation for today is one we might all benefit from: "Lazarus was lying at the rich man's doorstep. How could he not notice Lazarus right there? Wait. Who is at the door in my world, Jesus? Who is the person who is homeless in the park? The grandparent who is forgotten at the local nursing home? The family trying to get away from the war or terror in their home country? The person who is waiting to die on death row? The child who is starving? The exhausted essential worker? The student who is looked at with suspicion because of the color of their skin? The family member I misunderstood? The friend I haven't spoken to since middle school? Who do I need to notice today, Jesus? Don't let me pass by them. Show me what to do."

Yes, Jesus, please help us to see, and to hear, and to take action. We want our lives to bear fruit for you and for our brothers and sisters. Lord, we believe. Help us in our unbelief. Turn our selfishness into self-less love for others.

Just as Jesus said, "I come not to be served, but to serve," (Matthew 20:28) so, too, a deacon is called to this fundamental mission of the Church.

The ministry of a permanent deacon is a threefold:

- † In the **Ministry of the Word** he participates as evangelizer and teacher.
- ♥ In the **Ministry of the Liturgy** he participates in the celebration of the Eucharist and may preside over other liturgies.
- † In the **Ministry of Charity** he is the Church's servant to the world around him, ministering to those in need and urging others to join him in outreach.



# Family Ministry

March 23, 2025 • 3rd Sunday of Lent • Luke 13:1-9

## Do It Sooner Rather than Later

Jesus speaks out against the idea that some people who were killed by Pilate and others who died in an accident in his time died because they were sinners. At the same time, he encourages people to repent in whatever ways they need to. He also tells a parable teaching that we don't have unlimited time to begin bearing good fruit. Like a fruit tree that will eventually be cut down if it doesn't bear fruit, we also must not keep putting off for later what we can do now.

These verses can sound a bit threatening: "repent or perish." In fact, they come in the middle of several chapters in which Jesus is communicating a great urgency for his listeners to take action and begin doing the work of building the Kingdom of God. Several parables before and after today's reading have the same theme. "You know what to do. I'm giving you a heads-up, so don't wait. You never know how much time you have left to live so get started now before it's too late."

What is it Jesus wants us to do before we die? He has spent the first half of Luke's Gospel telling us: feed the hungry, heal the sick, welcome the outcast and the stranger, love your neighbor as yourself, pray for what you need, celebrate goodness and beauty, etc. It's so easy for us to be lulled into thinking we'll always have more time, but anyone who has ever lost a loved one knows we are never promised tomorrow. God asks us to bear fruit now. Hug your children today when they go off to school and before they go to sleep (even if you're frustrated with them!). Circle back to the difficult conversation with your partner that needs to be resolved rather than stewing about it for another day. Call your estranged relative, neighbor or friend today lest neither of you be around tomorrow to make amends then. Slow down and listen to the child or the lonely person who is desperate for your time and attention today rather than be productive in one more thing you won't care about if you were to die tomorrow.

Jesus knows we can't do everything we want to do in our limited waking hours. He also knows that just as trees need water, manure, and pruning to bear good fruit, we need our own versions of nourishment to keep doing good work. He's not asking us to bring about God's kingdom by ourselves. He's just urging us to do what is ours now rather than discover in the future that we've missed our chance.





# The Gospel at Home

## This Week's Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

When people told Jesus about a group of Galileans killed by Pilate, he told the people that unless they repent, they will all likewise perish. To help them understand, he tells them a parable about giving a fig tree more time to grow fruit. If not, the tree would be cut down. Jesus teaches that God gives us every opportunity to grow closer to him.

## **Exploring the Gospel Message**

Seeds (Preschool): The class this week learned that Jesus wants us to grow. Your child explored how plants and animals grow. Talk about how your child has grown already. Share a story from when you were young that will show how you grew up. How does your family help plants and pets grow around your home? Reflect on how we can grow closer to God.

**Promise** (Grades K–1): Ask your child to answer the question: What helps us grow? This week, the class also answered the question: Who gets a second chance? Your child can share the story about a first-grade teacher who brought her baby to meet her students. Take a walk around your neighborhood and make a note of all the things that are growing. Say a prayer of thanks for all the living things that grow around us.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Who gets a second chance? That was the question explored in the *Good News* class this week. Ask your child to share the story about brother and sister, Martin and Maria. Why did the animals ask for a second chance? Ask your child how God is like a gardener. If they need help look at the Gospel reading again. Be sure to talk about reconciliation and why it is so important. Talk as a family about how the Sacrament of Reconciliation works. Thank the Lord for giving us the sacrament and for granting us second chances.

**Venture** (Grades 4–6): Where is the land where Moses walked? Your youngster's class talked

about how God spoke to Moses in the desert. In the Gospel reading this week, Jesus explains in a parable that there is time to change. Discuss the parable with your youngster. Ask, too, why Sam was sorry and whether Brigida forgave Sam in this week's story. The class also studied the Lord's Prayer. Consider adding it to daily prayer times. Ask, too, what Saint Paul did during his lifetime.

Visions (Grades 7–9): The class considered six situations where someone may deserve a second chance. Ask how your youngster decided each of them. Talk about times when you've had a second chance, and how much that meant. Find out the name of the Superhero from a story in class. How does the Superhero save the day? Jesus wants us to turn our hearts to him. Discuss how we need to keep trying because he never gives up on us. What is the name of this kind of change of heart? Your youngster should know. Finally, ask what is the name of God that is shared with Moses. How does that make sense?

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with Awaken, the new adult level of the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

### **Pray Together**

Lent is a great time to incorporate the Rosary into prayer time if you don't already do that. Start at the crucifix by making the Sign of the Cross. Pray the Apostle's Creed, then the Lord's Prayer first, then three Hail Marys on the next three beads. The fifth bead is the Glory Be to the Father. Then there are sets of ten beads with one in between each set. You recite one Lord's Prayer, ten Hail Marys, and one Glory Be. At the same time, recall one of the four sets of five mysteries from Jesus life. There are the Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful, and Glorious mysteries.
