Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 4th Sunday of Easter. Today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles allows us to see both the joys and the perils of being one of the early Christian disciples through the eyes of Paul and Barnabas. As modern Christian disciples the journey continues with similar moments of rejoicing in God's goodness in the midst of the many crosses we bear in our daily lives. Amidst all the changes throughout the ages, we are still called to much of the same work as Paul and Barnabas: speaking the truth in God's name, sharing the Good News of our salvation through Jesus Christ, and welcoming and calling upon the power of the Holy Spirit. The early disciples and the saints all shared one common trait - an intimate relationship with our Triune God. We are called to that same level of intimacy today.

But how do enter into, grow and maintain a relationship with God? We do this through prayer. At our next session of Discussion and Drinks on May 14 we will continue to grow our understanding of prayer that we began last week. We will meet from 6:00 - 7:30 PM in the Social Hall - please join us!

Just like our lives evolve and are transformed through prayer, the life of a parish does the same. After Fr. Jack's retirement on July 8, All Saints will no longer have a single pastor model of leadership. We will be inviting our Triune God to work through all of us as His stewards and disciples on earth in 2025 through a Parish Life Coordinator and a Sacramental Priest associate model of leadership. To help us understand these roles, I have listed the responsibilities for each:

Fr. Eric will be the Sacramental Priest associate for All Saints and will split his time 50-50 between All Saints and the Metropolitan Tribunal. Quoting from the document, "Clarifying the Positions of Parish Life Coordinator and Sacramental Priest Associate," his role as the Sacramental Priest for All Saints will include:

- presiding and preaching at celebrations of the Eucharist
- celebrating baptisms, weddings, anointing of the sick and Reconciliation services
- presiding at parish funerals
- serving as a pastoral counselor and a spiritual resource

As the Parish Life Coordinator, I will be the visible leader of the parish, coordinating efforts of the parish staff and working with committees, as well as the Archdiocese. As the leader of All Saints I am charged to:

- work with the parish community to articulate the vision and mission of All Saints Parish
- work with all the councils and committees of the parish to discern the spiritual and pastoral needs and develop programs that meet those needs
- recruit, train, manage and supervise the parish staff and volunteers
- manage the facilities, stewardship, accounting and budget of the parish
- be the pastoral presence at parish events
- foster discipleship and promote the stewardship of time, talent and treasure
- arrange for the pastoral care of the sick and elderly
- plan funerals and vigils
- any other duties as assigned by the Archbishop

I have been serving All Saints through various positions for over 25 years and I am inspired by the growth and stewardship that is visible in our parish. Together we will continue to build and live out our mission statement to Love God-Serve Others-Form Disciples.

Eucharistic Pilgrimage (Ames - Dubuque)



Revival is Coming!!!

The Archdiocese of Dubuque is honored to host a leg of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, which makes its way from Indianapolis to Los Angeles from mid-May to the Feast of Corpus Christi. Eight Perpetual Pilgrims, four young men and four young women, will accompany the Blessed Sacrament on this nearly cross-country journey and will be our guests from May 23-27, 2025.



This event will correspond with the Presbyteral Ordination weekend at the Cathedral of St. Raphael. It will also be the first major public event at the newly renovated Cathedral of St. Raphael, the mother church of the Archdiocese!

There will be many opportunities for Eucharistic encounters as the Blessed Sacrament visits a beautiful cross-section of our Archdiocese. On Friday evening, May 23rd, we will receive Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament from the Diocese of Davenport on the banks of the Mississippi River. Over the subsequent days, the faithful are encouraged to accompany Jesus to the far western edge of our Archdiocese when He and the Perpetual Pilgrims depart Tuesday morning, May 27th, from Ames to the Diocese of Des Moines.

3. It is a public witness to the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist and an opportunity to evangelize.
4. In a certain way, a Eucharistic procession is a means of embodying synodality. Here we have the local church—priests, deacons, laypeople, and (hopefully) religious—gathered with our archbishop to walk together with the Lord.

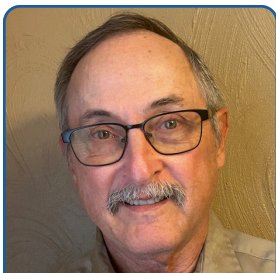


Pastoral Council and Faith Formation Commission Election Results

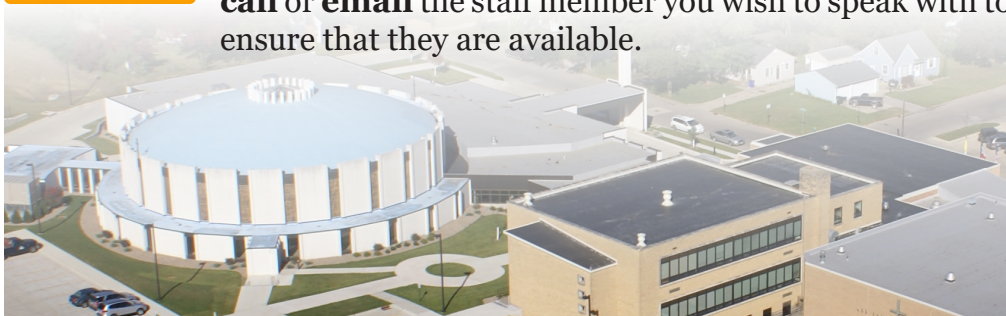

May 11, 2025 • 4th Sunday of Easter • John 10:27-30

Jesus Declares His Union With the Father

In this short reading, Jesus talks about his commitment to those who follow him. They will have eternal life and never perish. No one can take them from Jesus because they rest in the Father's hands; they rest in Jesus' hands. Jesus explains that this is possible because, "The Father and I are one" (v. 30).

John's Gospel was the last Gospel written. It is probably the most theological Gospel because Jesus' disciples had more time to consider and discuss their experience of being with Jesus. It is in John's Gospel that we hear Jesus tell his disciples he will send the Spirit to do just that sort of discerning. John's Gospel speaks most often of unity among the Father, Son and Spirit.

Believing in a Triune God is the absolute bedrock of our Christian faith. God is one, but God is also three persons. It is, and will remain, a mystery as long as we are part of this finite world. Father, Son and Spirit are not sequential. There wasn't God the Father and Creator first, followed by Jesus the Son and finally, the Spirit. Jesus, the Spirit and the Father have been one from the beginning. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).

When it comes to understanding God, we are all children. Our brains are limited to finite time and space, and God is beyond all that. Once in a while, we allow God to break through and we experience the awesomeness of the divine. This is where we discover clues to the mystery of God.

It is through God's self-revelation to a people who lived centuries before us that we see the mystery begin to unfold. They tell us about their experiences of God through stories and metaphors, through history, songs, poetry and letters. We call this library of God's self-revelation the Bible. It is important to remember, however, that the ultimate and final revelation of our Triune God is Jesus. Always balance the other books of the Bible with the Gospels.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Talk about what a mystery is, and remind each other that God will always be a mystery. Then name the things you know about God.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Read John 1:1-14, and ponder the mystery of our Triune God. Let go of your need to know everything, and trust that God is with you and in you. Sit quietly with certainty. Reflect on the experience.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 10:27-30

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus portrays himself as the Good Shepherd. This metaphor demonstrates the warm and loving care a shepherd has for the sheep and also shows that it is this warm loving care that Jesus has for us all. The image of the Good Shepherd is one of the central images of Jesus Christ, who keeps us from danger and seeks us out when we are lost.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned about the Good Shepherd, who cares for his sheep and surrounds them with love. Talk with your child about the care your family members give to each other. Display the Good Shepherd poster from your child's lesson booklet. Write the names of family members on the sheep, and paste them on the poster.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child learned that Jesus promised in Sunday's Gospel that no one shall take his sheep from him. He is a Good Shepherd. Ask your child to teach the family how to play the game, "Safe or Scatter," and play it together. Talk about ways each of you helps to care for members of your family.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This week's Gospel tells us that Jesus cares for us all like a shepherd cares for the sheep. The class learned that we all belong to Jesus, and one sign that shows we belong to Jesus is the Sign of the Cross. Make sure that your home displays the crucifix. Kneeling before the crucifix is a good spot for a family night prayer, too. Ask your child to help the family remember to say a prayer of thanks before each meal this week. Ask your child about how the Sign of the Cross also applies to the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Venture (Grades 4-6): This week's Gospel of the Good Shepherd helped your youngster's class understand that good leaders know their followers and are responsible for others. Ask your young person to tell how leaders in the Church are shepherds. Let your son or daughter teach the family the "Who Makes Church Happen Today?" game, and play the game together. Be sure to have your youngster tell about King Christian as well as what happened in the city of Assisi, Italy, during World War II.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your son or daughter learned how environmental issues affect us all. The class learned that just as Jesus is the Good Shepherd who cares for people, people have the duty to care for and "shepherd" creation. Talk about ways your family can care for creation, too. Ask your youngster to share what the class learned about the journeys of Saint Paul that spread the Good News throughout the Greek world. Be sure to ask your youngster to describe the Doctor of the Church the class learned about this week.

Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, pray together a few verses of Psalm 23: "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I lack. In green pastures he makes me lie down; to still waters he leads me; he restores my soul. Indeed, goodness and mercy will pursue me all the days of my life; I will dwell in the house of the Lord for endless days" (1-2, 6). You can find the full text of this psalm in your family Bible or in most missalette.
