



“You cannot serve both God and mammon” (Luke 16:13). The steward of today’s gospel parable is dishonest and self-serving, but he used his power to forgive debt and relieve the burden of the poor. This Gospel challenges us to not weigh opportunities on a scale of what benefits us, but rather by what is correct and prudent. Whom do you serve?



Everyday Metanoia



Every time I open the newsfeed on my phone, I hope and pray that the world is in a better place. Unfortunately, this is not true most of the time. All three of our readings today have words of direction from God on how those labeled by individuals and our world as “the lesser” are to be treated. Amos begins and ends with a clear call: “Hear this, you who trample upon the needy and destroy the poor of the land...Never will I forget a thing [you] have done.” Our Gospel reading from Luke reminds us that, “No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and mammon.”

Upheaval in our own lives, our community, and the world at-large is nothing new. Our second reading today is a letter or directive from Paul to Timothy. During Paul’s ministry he experienced all of these challenges: he was personally persecuted and arrested; he had to address and correct those who strayed from the truth of his message in the cities where he established churches; and he knew a changing world as the political climate ebbed and flowed during his lifetime. And yet, where does Paul bring all of this chaos for healing and correction? He brings it to the liturgy so that it can be lifted up to God in prayer. “First of all, then, I ask that supplications, prayers, petitions and thanksgiving be offered for everyone, for kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity. This is good and pleasing to God our savior, who wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth.” In his commentary on First Timothy, George T. Montague, S.M. elaborates upon this saying, “This prayer is not just for one’s family or the local congregation or even for the Church. It is for everyone. Christians considered prayer for one another and for the Church a sacred duty. This was not difficult and sprang spontaneously from the Jewish soul schooled in the value of intercessory prayer. But Jesus had told his disciples to pray for their enemies, and the Church could never forget that he himself had done so as he was dying on the cross.” We follow this prescription for prayer in our liturgies to this day. The Second Vatican Council in Sacrosanctum Concilium, “directs that intercessions be made for the holy Church, for the civil authorities, for those oppressed by various needs, for all mankind, and for the salvation of the entire world.” When we pay attention to what we pray during the Prayers of the Faithful, we will witness that all of these elements are present.

“One cannot serve both God and mammon.” It is concerning that hate-filled rhetoric can be posted by someone on Facebook, or a vitriol shouting match can occur between two different groups, or one person or entire groups can be killed for their beliefs. We are all created in God’s image, but we are also all created uniquely with different thoughts, experiences and opinions. The USCCB has created a document called A Better Kind of Politics: Civilize It. The action points are worth reading and praying about in terms of whom we choose to serve: God or mammon:

Charity

- To affirm through my words and actions the dignity of every person, each made in God’s image. Even those with whom I disagree are made in his image.
- To respectfully listen in order to understand experiences different from my own.

Clarity

- To engage in critical examination to ensure that my perspectives are rooted in truth, that my sources of information are unbiased, and that I do not open myself to manipulation by partisan interests.
- To form my conscience through prayerful reflection, study of scripture and Church teaching, and guidance from reputable experts.
- To reflect on my own values and seek, with others, to identify shared values.
- To be open to the process of dialogue that can require change of perspective - my own and others’ - in service to the inviolable dignity of all and the common good.

Creativity

- To be a bridgebuilder who participates in constructive dialogue based in shared values, a mutual exchange of gifts, and the humility to together seek the good.
- To see differences in perspective as opportunities for creative tension which can yield solutions for the common good.
- To work with others in order to identify creative solutions rooted in our shared values.



RULES, RULES, RULES

Many, many wonderful and generous donations of food and personal care items make their way to our pantry every week from very caring individuals. We all expect our donations to make a difference in someone's life. A family in need with some extra canned goods in their cupboard, an elderly widower with an easy meal to prepare, or a young person who has just lost their job and income.

No matter how well meaning the donations are, there have been times when we just aren't able to use an item that has been donated. As a food pantry that distributes both perishable and non-perishable items, we have to be very cognizant of food safety and food handling regulations.

Our Pantry Manager, Robyn, covered a lot of this in our volunteer meetings last week. For instance, food must be in the original unopened packaging, with a list of ingredients and an expiration date. A bag of buns that has been opened, partially used, and resealed, for example, cannot be given out in our food boxes. The bread is still most likely perfectly good, but we do not know how it has been handled after the package was opened.

The same thing applies to personal care products. A partially used bottle of shampoo, aspirin, or even hand sanitizer cannot be passed on to our clients. You get the picture. We are still taking socks and underwear for our homeless clients. NEW socks, and underwear only please!



Even garden produce can be suspect, as we have no idea how long it has been off the vine and waiting in a hot car or an open truck bed. We received some potatoes a few weeks ago that were so hot when they were brought in, they were mushy with bugs by the next day.

Here are some general guidelines to keep in mind:

- Dented/rusty cans can compromise the integrity of the contents
- Even non-perishable items exposed to extreme heat or cold cannot be given to clients
- Expired items can not be given out in our food boxes
- Any refrigerated/frozen items we can distribute must come directly from the supplier, as the maintained temperature must be verified
- Fresh produce must come here directly from the garden, and not stored for unknown time in unknown conditions before donating
- Anything dirty = contaminated

Metro Catholic Outreach Calling All Volunteers

Jesus Talks About Problem Solving

Jesus tells his disciples a parable about being wise and trustworthy, telling them that if they cannot be trusted in small matters they cannot be trusted in larger matters. Jesus concludes by telling them they cannot serve two masters. "You cannot serve God and wealth" (v. 13).

It is such a simple statement of truth, "We cannot serve both God and money." No Christian of faith could possibly disagree. But if we rephrase the question and ask, "How important is money to you?" the issue gets a little cloudier.

Money is an important part of our lives. There is no question that we need money to put food on the family table, clothes on our bodies and a roof over our heads. Earning money to provide these things is definitely in the service of God. Even providing luxuries for ourselves and our families is okay, as long as we are also providing for people in need. But when money becomes an end in itself, buying becomes a way of life or having this year's model becomes a necessity, we are in trouble.

It is so easy to get caught up in the false notion that things can make us happy, even though we know that the pleasure they offer is temporary. Forever happiness—day-into-the-dark-of-night happiness—is found in God's love and in our relationships with family and friends.

Every once in a while it's important to check out our priorities, and reevaluate our life style. There are at least two ways of doing this: taking a good look around our homes and paying attention to what we find ourselves talking about. Both can tell us a great deal about what is important to us and who we are really serving.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 16:1-13

This week we hear a challenging parable about a rich man who is cheated by his steward. After squandering his master's property, the steward makes amends with his master's debtors by lowering their debts. The steward hopes that this goodwill offering will help repair friendships with those in the community he has lied to. The master commends the steward for acting wisely. Jesus reiterates that we should strive to be trustworthy in both big ways and small so that we develop honest habits.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): In this week's class, your child learned about the different ways people serve at Church. Talk to your child about some of the people who help at Mass, and what he or she can do to help. The class discussed how they can follow Jesus every day. Ask your child to share some ways that he or she can follow Jesus. Practice making the Sign of the Cross together as you start and end prayers together this week.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week's class focused on the Mass. The children read a story about a girl named Lucy and her family's trip to Mass. The children shared their stories of going to Mass, and acted out some of the parts of the Mass together. Talk to your child about how he or she can show love for God. Ask your child to show you the Mass booklet he or she made in class, and make plans to bring it with you to Mass next week.

Good News (Grades 2-3): The children discussed how Pope Francis encouraged us to take care of our planet and to show mercy to others. Pope Francis has been a great example of someone who shows mercy to the poor. Pray for our new leader Leo XIV. Ask your child what it means to show mercy. Share ways that you can both try to be faithful to God in big and small ways this week.

Venture (Grades 4-6): The young people learned the importance of honesty, especially in cases when they are pressured by others to do something wrong. The class read a choose-your-own adventure story featuring Sophie who faces a dilemma when Maddie and some popular girls urge her to shoplift. Talk to your youngster about the different outcomes of the story, and the consequences of Sophie's decisions to live with the guilt or tell the truth. Discuss the importance of honesty and integrity for building a strong and trusting community, as Jesus wants us to do in our church and beyond.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your youngster discussed Pope Francis's mission to care for Creation and all its members. Your young person learned how Pope Francis shared many goals with Saint Francis of Assisi, including showing love and mercy to the poor. The class presented a play of today's Gospel story of the steward who cheats with his master's money, and learned about the prophet Amos, who spoke out against people who took advantage of the poor. Ask your young person how he or she was inspired by Pope Francis, and pray together for our new Pope Leo XIV.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

After your conversation, sit quietly for a few moments as you reflect on what each member of your family has shared. Close your time together in prayer by taking turns offering the names of the people who serve your parish and help your family. Thank God for these people's presence in your lives.
