

Everyday Metanoia



“Woe to the complacent in Zion!” Whenever Bob Lillibridge, our Director of Adult Formation, and I talk about the gifts of the Holy Spirit, I always say extra prayers for those who have the gift of prophecy; a very holy calling and yet most challenging charism. The USCCB refers to the gift of prophecy as “the ability, through the Holy Spirit, to help others understand God’s will and discern His plans for the present, even if it involves future events.” It is a charism for encouraging, building up and consoling others, rather than predicting the future. “This gift is a manifestation of God’s voice, meant to help Christians live out their faith more fully and to show Jesus to others.” I am not sure that I would describe the words of the prophet, Amos, as consoling, but he is definitely trying to help the Northern Kingdom of Israel to listen to God’s message and repent of their lives filled with social injustice and idolatry. And indeed, even though his words refer to the future, Amos is delivering a message from God that is meant to wake up and shake up the current people and culture. Our Journey in Faith efforts have a feel of prophecy. For many decades, the faithful filling the pews at weekend liturgies in the Archdiocese of Dubuque has been on a downward slide. Different Archbishops have delivered the prophetic words of warning that our actions were going to result in some serious changes, but much like the residents of Isreal, we have ignored and downplayed the message. Just like our ancestors in the Northern Kingdom, many have chosen the path of ego and materialism over love of God and love of neighbor.

Paul continues our reflection in giving personal advice and direction to Timothy who is entrusted with carrying out the work that Paul started in many areas; he’s is Paul’s number one collaborator. Last week, Paul detailed the importance of the liturgy in the life of the Church. This week he expands that in naming the qualities that we all should have and live by as sons and daughters of God: “...pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience and gentleness.” Paul follows up on this with a curious phrase, “Compete well for the faith.” In reading the commentary on First Timothy by George T. Montague, SM, he shares that “combat imagery would appeal to the Hellenistic mind, shaped as it was for a love of competitive sports.” We, too, live in an age and a culture that is shaped by fierce competition between families, friends, neighbors and foes. From sports, grades and the arts in our school years, we continue to pursue the cultural definition of success in accumulating materials possessions and financial wealth as we age. In 2024 the top 1% of the world’s population is reported to own more wealth than the bottom 95% of humanity.

Jesus addresses this disparity in today’s Gospel reading from Luke. Unfortunately, we skip a few verses as we continue the teaching of Jesus from last week: we cannot serve both God and wealth. One of the verses that is omitted says, “The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all these things and sneered at [Jesus].” Jesus, in return, becomes as blunt as one can be in a parable, warning those listening, but most especially the Pharisees, that if they do not love God and love their brothers and sisters more than wealth, pleasure, honor and power, they will end up in the netherworld after death. What really speaks to me in this Gospel is that the rich man wasn’t just indifferent to the poor man; in knowing his name, he purposefully chose to be cruel and flaunt his wealth. The rich man chose the prosperity of money over the prosperity of God’s Word and God’s Law. In his 2024 keynote speech at the National Eucharistic Congress, Bishop Barron addressed this. He talked about the obligation of the children of God (the laity) in regard to poverty and obedience. Poverty for the laity is best lived by having a relationship of detachment with wealth, pleasure, honor and power – all of the things the world tells us that we need and cannot live without. Jesus doesn’t say that these are bad; what he does say is to “seek ye first the Kingdom of God” and not these human wants. If wealth, pleasure, honor and power come to us – great – do good things with them. But don’t seek them; don’t depend on them.

Obedience for the laity calls us to name the “voices” that we listen to. Do we listen to the voices of wealth, pleasure, honor and power or do we listen to the voice of God and the prophetic voices in our lives directing us away from our egos and back to God? As humans we often listen to our own voice as well as those of our secular culture – or as Bishop Barron named it – the ego drama, where we think we decide what to believe and what to do. But when we are baptized into the life and death of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, God claims us for the Theo drama – living a life that praises God and lives for the good of our brothers and sisters, the Lazarus’ and the bottom 95% of humanity in the world.

The Rich Man and Lazarus

Jesus warns us to pay attention to the poor. He tells a parable about a rich man who passes a beggar named Lazarus every day and gives him nothing. When both men die, the beggar goes to Abraham, and the rich man goes to his torment in the netherworld. Jesus is telling us to share the good things we have, and to give from our bounty. "And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table..." (vv. 20-21).

I learned about giving from one's bounty when my youngest son, Peter, was four. I was sorting through his T-shirts one day, putting aside some of the older and faded ones for the parish clothing drive. When he asked what I was doing, I told him they were for some poor children. He went to his bottom drawer and pulled out three relatively new shirts and brought them to me, telling me he was sure the children would like those better.

That afternoon, I realized the difference between Christian charity and simply donating to the poor. I began to understand that with true charity there are no "haves" and "have-nots." Christian charity involves a sharing of equals, who are all members of God's family. This subtle difference of attitude was made clear to me when my four-year-old just wanted to share with another little boy.

Why not make an effort as a family to give from your bounty? Talk to your children about being a part of God's family. Ask them to choose some of their toys or other articles to share with brothers and sisters they may never meet. Model this spirit of giving by sharing some things that you still value. You might also choose to have a soup-and-crackers meal. By leaving the table still hungry, you can choose to experience a bit of the hunger many people have no chance to avoid.

True acts of Christian charity bridge the gap between the "haves" and the "have-nots." They are steps to building a world where everyone has enough. It's a great lesson for all of us to learn: sharing with our brothers and sisters and learning to give from our best rather than our surplus.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask family members to think of one good deed they can do in the coming week. Share your ideas. Next week, remember to ask how each person did.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

Parents practice acts of charity all the time. What acts of kindness have you done lately for your family or for an individual family member? Congratulate yourself for your unselfishness.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

This Sunday's Gospel challenges us to be selfless and care for others who need help. Jesus tells a story of a poor beggar named Lazarus who lived outside the gates of a Rich Man's house. Lazarus' requests for help were ignored for years. Lazarus finally found comfort in Heaven once he had died. The Rich Man passed away and suffered in Hell. The Rich Man begged Abraham for mercy, just as Lazarus had once begged the Rich Man. Abraham reprimanded the Rich Man for his actions during his lifetime and for not heeding the warnings in Scripture. Jesus reminds us that we have been provided with all of the resources in our lives to understand God's desire for us to serve one another. Take time this week to reflect on steps your family can take to become more aware of the ways you can share God's love with other people.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): The children learned the importance of helping people who need assistance. Class members also discussed how they can help their friends when things go wrong and which adults they can depend on for help. They read the story of the Rich Man who would not share with the Poor Man. Talk with your child about the importance of sharing and helping others feel welcome. Ask your child about some things he or she can do to help people, especially members of your family.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child's class talked about the importance of sharing with others. Ask your child to tell you about how and where we can share food with those who don't have enough. How did he or she feel when the Rich Man didn't share his food with the Poor Man? What could the Rich Man have done to help Lazarus? The class concluded by learning that we share our world with all of God's Creation. Make a plan with your child to do something good for another person, or the planet, this week.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This week's lesson taught the importance of being aware of other

people's needs. The class learned about Saint Francis of Assisi's encounter with a leper. The class also presented a play of the Rich Man and the Beggar. What were the consequences of the Rich Man's lack of awareness about Lazarus's needs? How could the Rich Man have benefitted from being aware of God's word? Ask your child to tell you what he or she is good at. Discuss how your child can use his or her gifts to help others who may be gifted in different ways.

Venture (Grades 4-6): The class read the story titled, "Learning to Like It." Some of the people at the soup kitchen made the main character, Rachel, uncomfortable. Ask your young person how Rachel overcame her fear. The young people then read the Gospel reading of the Rich Man and Lazarus. How could the Rich Man have treated Lazarus when they were both alive? What does Jesus want us to learn from this Gospel story?

Visions (Grades 7-9): Ask your youngster to recount the story of Marcus and Jalen. Discuss what clues did Marcus miss that indicated his friend was hungry. How could Marcus have handled the situation better? Compare the story of Marcus and Jalen to the Gospel passage of the Rich Man and Lazarus. Talk to your young person about how we can avoid becoming complacent. What can we do to open our eyes and be more aware of the needs of others?

Have each family member use his or her own words to pray for those who feel left out by their friends, families, and communities. Brainstorm ways your family can work toward helping those who will benefit from your love.


