As a newly inducted member of the board for the Cedar Rapids Freedom Festival, I'm very aware of how valuable volunteer time is. Having to inspect and collect these items takes time. That time is valuable. Having to throw these items away creates an unnecessary expense—an expense that diverts resources from the main mission of Metro Catholic Outreach—feeding those in need. All Saints parishioners have a passion for giving to MCO in the form of food, time, and money. All of those resources are wasted when items have to be discarded. Let's help *them* make the most of what *we* give.

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. “Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.” What would your response be if someone came up to you on the street or in the grocery store and spoke this invitation to you? Probably a lift of the eyebrows, a double check to make sure no cameras were recording this as a prank and then high tailing it in the other direction as quickly as possible. And yet, through our baptism, Jesus claimed us for this life mission. We may not realize it, but the words spoken at the end of Mass, are meant to not only remind us of this, but also to issue the invitation anew each time. At the dismissal, the priest or the deacon invites the faithful to go in the peace of Christ through one of four options.

Let’s take a look at the three of the four options and reflect on what it is empowering us to do.

The first option is: Go forth, the Mass is ended. This is not telling us to head back home and resume life as if nothing has happened. Something has happened. God spoke through the Word and we were nourished and fortified for the mission revealed through the Word by the Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We have been changed during the liturgy and as altered sons and daughters, we are sent forth from each Mass with a renewed purpose to be fishers of God’s children. In a collection of reflections on the topic of Spirituality for Lay Leaders titled *Called and Chosen*, Michael Downey adds this to the conversation, “In his Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation on the Vocation and the Mission of the Lay Faithful in the Church and in the World, *Christifideles Laici*, John Paul grounds in baptism the participation of all in the Church in the mission of Christ. He looks to the particular role of the lay person in the realization of the mission, emphasizing the distinctive character of lay life that is to be a sign of the reign of God in the world...It is the laity, who, in seeking the reign of God by engaging in temporal affairs and ordering them according to the plan of God, are the presence of God’s reign in the world.”

The second option is: Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord. In the same book, *Called and Chosen*, contributor Richard M. Liddy reveals the nuances of this dismissal. “As Christians, we believe that the visibly sent Son of God bequeathed to us through his Body a vision that is beyond us, that is, God’s vision for our lives and the world. At the same time, that vision is in continuity with our native desire for being and for value, the truly good. Because he was not only God, but also one of us, Jesus was able to communicate to us the way to the Father.” That communicated mission is found in the books of the Bible and more specifically in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. “To realize, appreciate and respond to this visible mission of the Son, there is within our hearts the invisible mission of the Holy Spirit, who teaches us the meaning of Jesus’ life and words.” God in his infinite wisdom reveals all of this to humanity through signs and symbols, hints and unexplained moments of clarity and vision. Through a life lived that proclaims the Gospel in word and deed, we participate in the unending revelation of God as we continue to build God’s kingdom here on earth.

The third and last one we will explore is: Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life. So what about this dismissal makes it unique from the other two? At the root of it is our common baptism. But as we move up the stem of everyday life and work in the world, what nurtures and brings fruition or flowering to a person who is conformed to the person of Christ so that through our ordinary life we bring others into communion with God? For our answer, we look to Mary. Michael Downey explains, “Consider Mary, the woman with the pondering heart. She heard the Word and responded to the Spirit without knowing how everything would work out, unsure how all the pieces fit together. She simply lived with the realization that all comes from God and is to be returned to God. Thereby she shared in the mission of the Word and the Spirit. And pondering was no small part of it. Pondering...is a sense of mulling over, considering, weighing, of trying to balance things that seem to be at odds with one another. In so doing, transformation takes place. By pondering, something gestates into new life.”

So as one who has been baptized into the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we as lay persons, have a unique invitation by God to be fishers of men and women in the world we live. As we engage in family activities, work and play God constantly invites us into His mission and vision. We respond in how we live our daily, ordinary lives. In pondering the Word and trusting in God, we are able to be in the world, but not of this world. This is revealed to the world as peace, hope and joy even in the most trying of situations. Those who do not have it are attracted to the order this demonstrates in an often chaotic world.

Stay. Don’t leave after communion. Each part of the liturgy is a piece of the whole picture. We are missing a piece when we skip the dismissal. May God bless your prayer time this week! Come Holy Spirit!

January 25, 2026 • 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time • Matthew 4:12-23

Repent

After John the Baptist is beheaded, Jesus retreats to Galilee, closer to home. Remember, John was Jesus' cousin; they probably grew up together. When John was murdered, it must have affected Jesus deeply. Finally, he leaves Nazareth and moves closer to the Sea of Galilee, to a town called Capernaum. He begins his public preaching and gathers his apostles.

Jesus begins his public ministry by announcing the coming of the kingdom. He tells us it's time to repent. Remember, the kingdom of God is not just the heaven we hope to get to after we die. The kingdom of God is also with us here, right now. The kingdom is any place or time where God's love is present and active.

Jesus was able to claim the kingdom was at hand because he brought the kingdom. Any place or time Jesus was present, there was the kingdom. As Christians, we are asked to be Christ today and bring the kingdom to our own time and place. That means we take Jesus' words to heart. We look at ways we can change for the better. We need to adjust how we act or how we react.

Think about what needs to change in your everyday family life for the kingdom to reign in your home. Begin with the surface things. Is the pace too fast? Is the noise level too high? Is there a constant attitude of "I'll get you back!"? We know that no amount of coaxing or nagging will change someone else if he or she isn't ready to change. And so as the grown-up in the household, change will have to begin with you.

Remember, with God's help, we can change how we act and respond. With God's help, we can become our best selves. And with God's help, the changes in you will bring out the best in others.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 4:12-23

The Gospel places the beginning of Jesus' ministry in Galilee, where he spent his time teaching, proclaiming God's Kingdom, and healing the sick. Galilee is situated between the Mediterranean Sea and the Sea of Galilee, and many people who lived there were fishermen. Jesus invited his new friends to leave their nets and follow him. He promised them that they would now be fishing for people instead of fish.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child has learned to appreciate what it means to make friends. Make sure that your child has a clear understanding of ways he or she can be of help to friends and family members. Talk about how being a good friend and member of the family is a good way of following Jesus.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child explored Jesus' work of making friends and calling people together. Jesus calls all of us to make friends, too. Talk to your child about the importance of friends and the need for friendly, loving actions toward other people. Remind one another that such actions bond together the Christian community and the human family.

Good News (Grades 2-3): In class, your child learned a little about the geography of where Jesus grew up and lived. Ask your child to share the map and tell the family about how Jesus called people to follow him. Discuss times when family members have been called to do something or to be somewhere. What are some ways your family answers Jesus' call to follow him?

Venture (Grades 4-6): Your young person's class learned that Jesus began his mission in his

home territory of Galilee. Invite your son or daughter to share some details about Galilee with the family. Talk about how Jesus called Peter, Andrew, James, and John to follow him. Why did these people drop everything to follow Jesus? Share how Jesus calls your family and how you try to follow him. Talk about ways you can help one another be better followers of Jesus. Ask your young person about the discovery of Saint Peter's house.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your youngster's class learned about the characteristics of Galilee's land and people from the time of Jesus. Understanding where Jesus lived helped the class see Jesus in his historical setting. Invite your young person to share with the family what archaeology can teach about Jesus' message. Ask them to share at least one example of God calling one of his prophets or disciples in the Bible.

Pray Together

Even the youngest children can understand the need for silence. Invite all the members of your families to share a few moments of silent prayer. A good time to do this is just before a family meal, but it can be anytime the whole family is together. You can all hold hands. An adult can remind the family that Jesus calls all of you to follow him. Then spend anywhere from thirty seconds to a minute in silent prayer. (Remember that a minute of silence can feel pretty long to a young child.)
