Journey in Faith: Councils, Commissions, and Committees



The Archdiocese of Dubuque continues its *Journey in Faith*—a process of renewal and planning to strengthen Catholic life across northeast Iowa. As part of the preparation for pastorate life in July 2026, our parish has been meeting weekly to participate in a “prep series” presented by the archdiocese. Each week the prep series focuses on a specific topic. A recent topic was councils, commissions, and committees.

In addition to parish pastoral councils and parish finance councils, there will be pastorate-level commissions in each of these areas. The pastorate pastoral commission and pastorate finance commission will have representation from all parishes within a pastorate.

Parish-level councils will remain focused on items directly related to each parish. Pastorate-level commissions will focus on working together as a pastorate, including the creation and championing of the pastorate implementation plan to be developed this fall. Current parish pastoral council and parish finance council members will learn more at their upcoming meetings.

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 4th Sunday in Lent. At first glance, this might be easy to see as just another healing story. It is so much more than that. Let's unpack this story together!

The first item to come out of the suitcase is to recall that our Gospel is from John. The Gospel of John is unique and oftentimes differs in significant ways from the other three Gospel accounts. In the commentary on the Gospel of John by Francis Martin and William Wright IV, they start by saying, "When we read John, we should be mindful that we are reading a theological interpretation of Jesus' life. The Gospel itself indicates that it views the life of Jesus in retrospect, with illumination provided by the Holy Spirit after Jesus' resurrection. For John, history and theology are deeply entwined, and people can understand the meaning of Jesus only through the interior action of the Holy Spirit. John has composed his account of Jesus' life so that its spiritual significance can be handed on to his audience." To highlight the spiritual significance of the healing works of Jesus, in John's Gospel they are known as signs and not as miracles. "John calls Jesus' miracles 'signs' because they point to and reveal spiritual realities and truths about Jesus. To see the signs properly is to be led to the reality of Jesus that they reveal."

The second item to come out of the suitcase is to name an important spiritual reality that Jesus is revealing when he encounters and then gives sight to the blind man. A key here is to remember the conversation and questions that the disciples pose to Jesus upon meeting the man. The Old Testament often portrays God as a punisher for the sins of the people. The disciples still think that way about God and their questions about the origin of the man's blindness reflect that. Both the blind man and the disciples are operating in "darkness." Jesus, as the Son of God, reveals a radically new way for the disciples to see life's tragedies; not as punishments for sins, past or present, but rather as a visible way for us to encounter and know the great works of God, the Father. Additionally, Jesus as the Son of God, uses materials of the created earth: spit, mud, and water in connection with his divinity. This subtle connection with the Incarnation emphasizes the revelation of Jesus as the light which has broken into our dark world in order to reunite us with God, our Father. The time for salvation is now and it is through the spiritual darkness being swept away; Jesus, brings light to and out of darkness.

The third item to come out of the suitcase is the effect light has upon the darkness. "As the light of the world, Jesus not only brings spiritual illumination and deliverance from dark; he also effects judgement through people's responses to him." We have to realize that both darkness and light take up space whether it is physical, mental, emotional or spiritual. Darkness takes up more space than is necessary and is very hard to remove. Perhaps that is why Mother Olga's Lenten prayer from Hallow has had such an impact on me: Empty me, fill me, use me. Robert Wicks in his book, Simple Changes reminds us, "To change, move, really grow, we need space within ourselves. Habits, worries, emotions, defensiveness, stubbornness and fear all take up room...to find peace and joy, we don't need to add something to our lives. Instead we need to drop something so we can see clearly and live more freely." He continues, "There are all types of hidden addictions, ingrained habits and unexamined beliefs that are guiding us automatically through life." Have you ever said or done something to another person and immediately afterwards wished you could take it back? Most likely, those words or actions came out of a place that is cluttered with this messiness.

The last items to unpack from the suitcase are a mirror and a rubber band. We humans, do not like change. No wonder God called us a stiff-necked people! If we examine the questioning process of the neighbors and the Pharisees with the formerly blind man, we can see the slow, but steady progression of his acceptance of Jesus and his understanding of the source of his healing. His responses to those who question him about the identity of Jesus stretches from "the man called Jesus" to "he is a prophet." And then he takes the another spiritual leap, "The man answered and said to them, 'This is what is so amazing, that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if one is devout and does his will, he listens to him. It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything.'" The final leap comes after Jesus reveals himself as the Son of Man and the formerly blind man fully accepts Jesus into his heart and worships him. He could not have done this without questioning his own beliefs about God and the judgement system that he grew up within. In order to stretch our own spiritual rubber bands, Robert Wicks advocates using a mirror quite frequently. We grow not from judging others, but from examining our own thoughts, emotions, habits and judgements. With a spiritual mirror we

can a) “See our own role in making our life a painful web of grasping demands, insecurities, anger, envy and resentment, and do something about it;” b) “Become more aware of the time we have lost behaving in a way that has been nonproductive and frozen because we have projected blame outward as an excuse for not doing something inward;” and c) “Face the other’s reaction to our new movement toward freedom, love and peace and away from competition, defensiveness and inauthenticity. The reality is that while other people say they want us to grow and change, they often feel quite uncomfortable when we do.”

Empty me. Lord, please help me to examine and question my own reactions, responses, judgements and habits. I want to remove all that does not help me to serve and love you. Fill me. Lord, on my knees I ask you to fill me with your light and love. Use me. Lord, move me to share your living word, the joy of releasing the darkness and the love that your light brings.

Living Out Loud

The Pharisees continue to try to find something they can convict Jesus of. They question the blind man that Jesus healed. Hoping to trap him into saying something to incriminate Jesus, they persecute the man with words. The blind man continued to tell the truth.

There are all sorts of ways of being persecuted. The Pharisees laughed at and ridiculed the blind man for speaking the truth. A few years later, Stephen became the first Christian martyr for speaking his truth. I admire these men for their courage, particularly when I consider my own lack of it.

I don't think I would ever disavow being a Catholic, but at the same time I wonder why sometimes it looks like I'm trying to keep it a secret. I remember sitting in a restaurant recently and seeing an elderly couple bless themselves and say grace before eating their meal. I was impressed, and had to wonder why I feel so uncomfortable making the Sign of the Cross in a crowded restaurant. I know that in the United States nobody's going to stone me for my faith.

However, persecution can come in a variety of forms and degrees, from the ultimate price of martyrdom to the subtle disrespect of being laughed at. There may seem to be no comparison between the two, but the discomfort of being left out or talked about still hurts. Sometimes it takes courage to live one's faith openly.

We may live in a free society, but folks see religion as a private matter. If we pray out loud, mention the Bible, or talk about what the priest said on Sunday, our coworkers may be inclined to negatively consider us religious fanatics. Blessed are those who witness to their faith anyway.

The best place to practice living your faith out loud is at home. Pray together with your family before meals and at bedtime, take turns reading the Bible to each other, talk about Sunday's Gospel and homily. Let your children see you witness your faith to the outside world, even if it is just by making the Sign of the Cross in a crowded restaurant.

Talk about how each family member can let the light of faith shine. How can all of you as a family live your faith out loud?

How comfortable are you sharing your faith at home or outside the home? How do you feel about this? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 9:1-41

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus opens the eyes of a man blind from birth. It is the man born blind who sees Jesus for who he really is. The man's neighbors, parents, and teachers have sight but are blind to who Jesus is. In many parishes, those preparing for Baptism receive the Creed this week, and many of this week's lessons help young people know the Creed.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Young children are proud of their ability to recognize shapes and objects and call them by name. Ask your child to name different colors and shapes in your house. Teaching them the names of the different flowers, birds, and animals around them is a concrete way to help children see the wonders of God's Creation.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week your child learned to appreciate the sense of sight. Ask your child to share with the family the story of the man who was born blind. Talk about what a gift it is to see the wonders of God's world. Consider taking a walk around your neighborhood or area and notice all the things we can see and believe. Then talk about the many things we can't see, but we still believe, such as love.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Ask your child to show you the puppets he or she made in class. You may want to use the puppets to act out the Gospel story of the man born blind. Ask your child what a creed is. Talk together about what it means to believe and why it is important that we say the Creed at every Sunday Mass. Consider going outside to find signs of Spring like the story the class read this week.

Venture (Grades 4-6): In class, your young person read a comic telling the story of the blind man whose sight was healed by Jesus. Have your youngster point out the part of the story that he or she found most comforting or challenging. Ask your young person to share something learned about either the Nicene or the Apostle's Creed with your family. As a family, discuss how your faith has grown with each of you, and how you hope your faith will keep growing. Consider a discussion about King David from the week's lesson.

Visions (Grades 7-9): The Gospel of the man born blind gave your young person's class an opportunity to learn what it means to really see. Ask your son or daughter to tell the whole family about Louie—a legally blind teenager who works to help other people see. Talk about all the different ways of "seeing." Although we often say, "Seeing is believing," talk together about how "believing is seeing." You might want to end your family chat by reciting the Apostles' Creed (found on the last page of your child's lesson). Talk about how David was chosen King of Israel.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.



Pray Together

Have each member of the family write a short prayer that is only 140 characters or less. The prayer should be about how important it is to really see or to ask God to help you overcome your blindness. Younger children will need some help with their prayers. After all the prayers are written, let each person share his or her prayer with the family.
