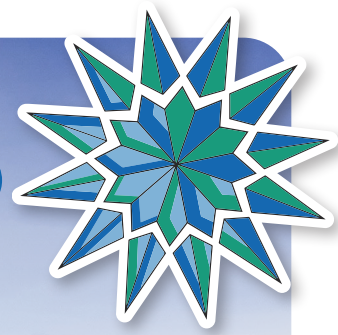

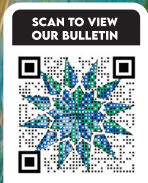

## Vocation Bulletin Blurb



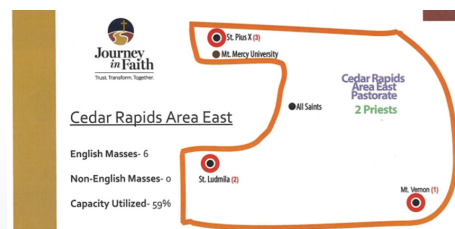
*“Then their eyes were opened and they recognized Him.” (Luke 24:31)*

# Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 4th Sunday of the Easter Season. Our second reading from 1 Peter found a home in my heart the moment I read it. “Beloved: If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in his footsteps.” Ever since the announcement was made and we learned that we will not be having weekend Masses, many of us have been suffering. Some in private; others very publicly. Some with tears; others with anger. Some feeling utter despair; others tinged with hope. All of us wondering what is next and how all of this is going to work. This suffering is hard and very painful. As human beings we often feel like we are the only one experiencing these emotions or the depth of these emotions and that no one can understand what we are going through. And yet, while he is still holding us very close, God reminds us in 1st Peter, that this is one of the many reasons that he became Man here on Earth. Our God is not unaware; nor uncaring. Jesus knew all human emotions as the Son of Man. That is why God can call us to bear hard things with prayer and grace.

I “scrolled” past something on Facebook this morning, but my eye caught just enough, that it piqued my curiosity and I went back. I felt like God was speaking to all of us in this post: “No matter where we stand this morning...whether we’re up, down, or just trying to get through it...We don’t need a new life today...we need a new lens. The same things we are stressing, angry or sad about are the same things that someone else prayer for. So instead of asking ‘Why do I/we have to deal with this?’, ask instead, ‘Who am I becoming through this?’ Because this suffering isn’t here to break you/us...it’s here to reveal you/us.”

There are several places in the Gospel accounts when Jesus tells the apostles and the disciples that they will be tested; thus revealing and molding those characteristics that God uses to illustrate what it means to be a disciple. Jesus never promised us a rose garden with straight paths. He became man in order to feel all that we feel and to go through our same trials. “Christ suffered for us, leaving an example that we should follow in his footsteps.” And this is the example he held out his hand in invitation and asked us to follow him, “When he was insulted, he returned no insult; when he suffered, he did not threaten; instead, he handed himself over to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body upon the cross, so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. For you had gone astray like sheep, but you have now returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.”

Daniel Keating in his commentary on 1st Peter shares these insights, “Peter’s magnificent account of Christ in these verses is really a commentary on Christ’s own words, ‘For the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and give his life as a ransom for many.’ Some scholars have called this Peter’s ‘Servant Christology.’ By this they mean that Peter sees Jesus primarily through the lens of his voluntary suffering that brought about our salvation...This is true but does not go far enough. Peter does not stop with painting a portrait of Christ that we can peer at from a safe distance. He also calls us to follow Christ’s example and walk in his steps, thus laying the foundation for the imitation of Christ as an essential element in Christian spirituality...The message for us is this: if we are to walk in Christ’s steps, we have to persevere through trials and insults - a single grand effort is not enough.”

That is a difficult message for those who feel like the ‘fixer’ in the lives of loved ones and friends. As a fixer, it is usually not through perseverance and trial that we hope to prevail over a situation, but rather, like one riding in on a great white horse, sword lifted up and grand, fixing words or deeds at the ready. God invites us to look at life, not through the lens of a fixer, but through the lens and actions of a healer. This requires us to become a part of the messy, everyday lives of those near and far; those we know well and those we have never known. For when we do this, we, like Jesus, pick up the cross; not the sword. We learn to slowly wade through the ups and downs rather than thrusting a quick and decisive blow with the sword. God wants us to be at and know peace. Peace does not come about through our own efforts, but rather through active discipleship; trusting and walking with God. The decisions made for weekend Mass locations isn’t something we are called to fix. What we are called to is this: Through active prayer and walking with our brothers and sisters in Christ, we are called to be servants to one another - revealing a peace that is only known through trusting and walking with our Lord and Savior.

## Metro Catholic Outreach



### What's In Our Food Boxes?

As you can see by the numbers at the top of each of our weekly newsletters, MCO provides groceries for about 150 families each week, over 500 individuals, not to mention the school bags and homeless provisions we distribute. The vast majority of our clients pick up a few times per year. Only about 20% pick up every week,

Our food boxes, currently valued at over \$130.00, are packed weekly by our faithful volunteers, and are filled with non-perishable staples and many fresh items. A typical food box from MCO consists of peanut butter, canned tuna or chicken, pasta sauce, soup, canned fruit and vegetables, beans, juice, Hamburger or Tuna Helper, boxed or fresh potatoes, rice, pasta, crackers or muffin mix, macaroni and cheese, cake mix, cereal, snack bag, and personal care items. We often include jelly, condiments, spices, beverages, cake frosting, pancake mix, and syrup. Fresh items added on the dock at distribution are typically fruit, milk, frozen meat, fresh vegetables, potatoes, breads, and often cakes, cookies or other bakery items. Through the summer and fall we have an abundance of garden produce also.

Who is eligible to pick up all these nutritious groceries? Anyone who contacts us needing food! We do not require IDs or any income information. If someone calls us needing food, we provide food. Our clients do need to call us early in the week to schedule for Tuesday evening, Wednesday afternoon, or Thursday morning distribution times. Most weeks we fill up about 150 spots quickly.

Are you interested in helping get food to our neighbors in need? We always need volunteers to answer the phones scheduling families for their pick-up times, help sort donations and pack food, and help on the dock greeting clients and loading groceries. # Family Ministry

April 26, 2026 • 4th Sunday of Easter • John 10:1-10

## Calling His Sheep by Name

*Jesus talks about how the shepherd recognizes his sheep by name. He is the gatekeeper for his sheep. He is the one who leads them out and brings them back in safely. Jesus tells us he is our shepherd, the gatekeeper.*

We know that Jesus came to save us. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us that we find our salvation in him. He is the gatekeeper. He is the way. He is the new life offered to us. Sometimes we minimize what being saved means. We rejoice in being freed from sin without recognizing what that means or where that forgiveness must lead. Receiving Christ's forgiveness is just the start; salvation is a lifelong, threefold process.

First, being freed from sin means accepting God's forgiveness and love. With that love we can begin to heal from a lifetime of hurts and injustices. We can let go of our fear, our anger, our feeling of "being less than," the anguish of feeling alone, or the need to fill our emptiness with things or people. We can accept our limitations and still see our own goodness and gifts.

Second, through this forgiveness and healing we can begin to accept and truly love ourselves and God who is in us. This is what leads us to fullness of life. We do not let others' ideas of who we are limit us. We can become all we were created to be.

Finally, as we live out our goodness and share our gifts, we become more open to the world around us. We begin to see God everywhere (even in the old grumps at work and the panhandlers on the street). We begin to grow in communion with our Creator, with all people, and all creation. Life can't be bigger than that!

This is the abundant life Jesus talked about. Share with your family this paradox: Christ's salvation is the gift of his love, a gift that is received even more abundantly when it is given away.

## FAMILY RESPONSE

Here's another chance to affirm each other—ask family members to decide on an occupation they think other family members might be good at. Make sure they give their reasons.

## PERSONAL RESPONSE

Is there someone you have difficulty forgiving? Where are you in the threefold process of forgiveness? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

## The Gospel at Home

### This Week's Gospel: John 10:1-10

Sunday's Gospel describes Jesus as a Good Shepherd, who has come so that his followers might have life to the fullest. Shepherds lead, protect, and provide for their sheep. Shepherds know their sheep and the sheep know the shepherd's voice. In Jesus' time, shepherds slept at the entrance to the sheepfold like a gate that keeps the sheep in. Jesus is the gateway to the Christian community. Baptism makes us members of that community.

### Exploring the Gospel Message

**Seeds (Preschool):** Children love the image of the Good Shepherd and his care for the animals. The image can help your child notice God's care in the family that surrounds them with love and provides food, shelter, and a safe and happy place to be. Discuss some things that you all care for as a family. Considering displaying the cutout activity of the shepherd and his sheep that your child made during the week's lesson.

**Promise (Grades K-1):** Your child played a game to discover how to care for others and who cares for him or her. Ask your child to tell the family why Jesus called himself the Good Shepherd. Make a list of ways your family can show love and care for others. Play a round of The Caring Game and ask your son or daughter to show the family the picture he or she created of the Good Shepherd.

**Good News (Grades 2-3):** Your child learned the difference between "no" Jesus and "know" Jesus. They helped solve problems that led to ways Jesus would have taught. Talk about how you settle problems as a family. Ask your child to tell the story of "The Lost Hamster," from this week's lesson. Talk, too, about Jesus as the Good Shepherd and decide on ways your family can share the Good News with others.

**Venture (Grades 4-6):** Jesus called himself the Good Shepherd. Talk together about the lessons of the Good Shepherd Gospel, and how Jesus calls us each by name. Discuss what the 23rd Psalm means to you and your family. Have your child tell the family about "The Butterfly Lady." Talk about how Jesus is the gateway to the Church.

**Visions (Grades 7-9):** In class, your youngster explored the metaphor of Jesus as the sheep gate for entry into God's family. The class read about Father Stanley Rother, a missionary and martyr, who gave his life for the people he loved. The young people also discussed the popularity of Psalm 23, in which David sees the Lord as his shepherd. Does your family experience God as your loving shepherd and do you see Jesus as your Good Shepherd? Talk about ways your family can bring the message of the Good Shepherd to others. Plan a summer project that provides help to those in need.

**Awaken (Teens/Adults):** Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.

### Pray Together

Pray together Psalm 23, the Good Shepherd Psalm. Ask God to care for your family and keep you safe. Promise one another that you will always try to "dwell in the house of the Lord" all your days.
