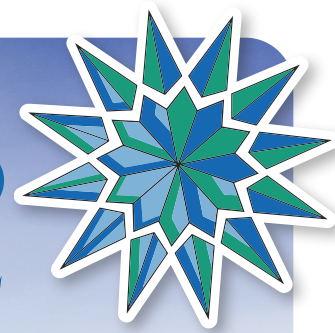
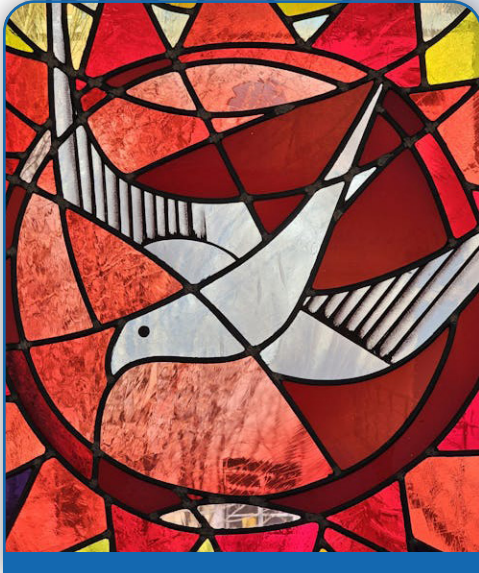

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to Pentecost Sunday. When I was in junior high school, our music teacher started a show choir group which we named, “Unity.” We decided upon that name because we knew that even though we had good voices as individuals, they were also very different, and if we didn’t sing together, as if one, the result would be a chaotic discord and not the pleasing harmony that was our vision. In our reading from 1 Corinthians, Paul speaks of unity, also, but he anchors it in our baptism, when we become physically and sacramentally united or one with Christ. George T. Montague SM, in his commentary on 1 Corinthians explores this further: “Paul thinks of the union of Christians with Christ in realistic, and as it were, physical terms. This becomes evident again here when he says that ‘in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body.’” What is profoundly unique about the unity that Paul preaches is that it is anchored in our participation in the eucharist. For Paul that unity “far transcends a tribal, or ethnic or class unity. Traditional walls have collapsed as all became one, whether ‘Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons.’ Through the new experience, these groups found themselves to be brothers and sisters around the eucharistic table. The person of Jesus had now created a new and universal - catholic - community.” While many have heard the slogan - unity in diversity - the unity created through our sacramental and physical joining with Christ at baptism is far greater and different at the same time. It is different because through our baptism we daily live how the One, Christ, can be many. The resulting unity that is created is far greater than the many becoming one.

The many becoming one is what those who were creating the Tower of Babel desired. The difference is that it wasn’t anchored in a relationship with God, though. Neither was it anchored in love of and service to the Lord; rather, it was fueled by their human egos. The Old Testament contains accounts similar in nature, but it is all an echo of the first watershed moment in time when the serpent tempted Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. It was the beginning of humankind’s sinful desire to become equal to the Lord.

The Gospel of John makes a significant comment on this process of the many becoming one in order to be sacramentally recreated as the One becoming many. John knows that we must always be tied to our Lord and Savior - “Remain in me as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Who ever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing.” (John 15:4-5) Francis Martin and William Wright IV elaborate on this union and unity in their commentary on the Gospel of John: “[this] signifies that Jesus and the disciples are united to each other in a vital union, the Church. Paul emphasizes the unity of the Church as a body with diversity of members and roles. John emphasizes the flow of life and power from Jesus, the vine to his disciples. Jesus is the indispensable source of life and empowerment for his disciples, the one upon whom they must constantly and radically depend.”

So how as disciples in this modern age do we keep ourselves tied and anchored to the One in order to be Jesus in this diverse world? I am reading a book called *Tiny Shifts* by Elisha Goldstein, PhD. While the intent is to guide the reader to recognize “how emotional health transforms stress, relationships and longevity,” I have been borrowing the techniques to transform my spiritual health, also. The premise is that we are bombarded with so many messages today, that we “listen” on various levels or planes. We consciously hear messages and we unconsciously absorb others. This process creates communication loops that frequently overwhelm our human senses and disconnects us from the present. For Christians it also serves to sever the “vine from the branch.” We start to worry that God isn’t listening to us or taking care of our requests (or demands!) in a timely manner. The result - our ego reaches for the steering wheel. Goldstein proposes a 4 step process to disconnect from the unhealthy loop and to reengage with the present reality. “The first step is to Recognize the loop is happening” - for me, that means knowing that the vine has been severed from the branch. “The next step is to Release the mental and physical tension or resistance” - for me, this is to call out the ego, which then disengages my resistance to God’s will. “The third step is to Refocus our attention toward something that is supportive” - for me, this means prayer, reading Scripture and/or sitting in quiet with the Lord. “The final step is to Reinforce the healthier shifts so our brain remembers it for the next time” - for me, that is incorporating more times to be with God, to listen to His Word, and to seek to do His Will. That means making our spiritual life just as much a priority as our physical, mental and emotional well-being. The author maintains that when we practice these 4 Rs we spend more time in the present moment and are therefore healthier and happier people. I have found that when I use these techniques in my spiritual life as well, I am grounded in the love of God and the love of neighbor more. This allows me to name myself as Created in the image of God, to strengthen my tie to the branch and through the gifts of the Holy Spirit, to be a disciple for Christ with my unique brothers and sisters here on earth.

From Principal Starr

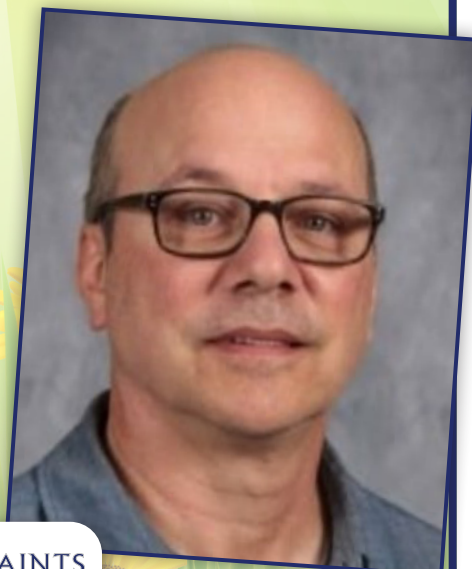
Another school year has come and gone. I have a few important pieces of information to share. We have two teachers departing All Saints at the end of this school year: Alison Prentice and Rob Caputo

Proud to Be Catholic

Once more we hear the story of the Risen Christ's appearing to the disciples and breathing the Spirit into them. We can read the story of the Pentecost in Acts 2:1–12. It is the first reading for Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is considered the birthday of the church.

There is a great concern in our church today about Catholic literacy. What does it mean to be Catholic? I grew up on the south side of Chicago. Next door lived the Hallers; they were Lutherans. Across the street lived the Rosenthals; they were Jewish. Basically, everyone on our block was “something.” All families went to church or synagogue on the weekend, and if they didn’t, they surely didn’t tell anyone. I knew I was Catholic, just like I knew I was Polish-American. It was a part of my identity.

Unfortunately for children today, Catholic identity is not always a given. As parents, we have to be more deliberate in helping them claim that identity. We have to talk to our children about our Catholic faith, particularly those beliefs that distinguish us from other religious denominations. And we have to help them experience the rites and rituals, the sounds and smells and the gracious giving that mark us as Catholic.

What do we believe? We believe in Jesus Christ, God with us. We believe we are the body of Christ in the world today, called to reconcile and heal all people and the earth itself. We believe in God’s goodness in all of creation.

We believe in the sacraments, seven concrete signs that God is with us, inviting us to live in his grace. We believe in Christ’s real presence in the Eucharist. We believe in the community of saints, living and dead. And we believe in promoting justice and peace for all our brothers and sisters.

We are a church of rituals. Bring those rituals home to your family. Burn incense; light candles. Fast and abstain from meat during Lent. Make the Sign of the Cross often together. Serve those in need. And constantly tell your children this is what it means to be Catholic. Use the word Catholic often. Help your youngsters feel proud of their faith, proud to be called Catholic.
