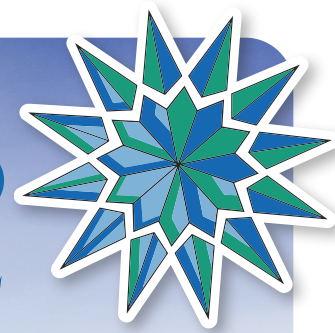

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 6th Sunday of the Easter Season. My brothers and sisters in Christ, our second reading from 1 Peter speaks to the kind of relationship that we are to have with our Triune God. It is not meant to be one known through the recitation of facts, figures and history. While this knowledge can assist us in knowing and understanding our faith in a more comprehensive manner, what God really desires from us, his children, is a personal relationship that is anchored in faith and obedience. When we have a personal relationship, the world often views us with hostility, prejudice and persecution. And even when it is not colored with ill-intent, we often confound and baffle the world.

So what is Peter trying to say about having a real relationship with Christ and how that impacts our relationship with others? Daniel Keating in his commentary on 1 Peter identifies the key message found in this Epistle. Peter is writing to some of the new Christian communities to “prepare them for suffering in imitation of Christ. As members of God’s household, they need to know their new identity in Christ, learn how to relate to others both within and outside the Church, and be ready to undergo affliction for their faith.” But nestled within this cautioned readiness is also the “indescribable and glorious joy that is ours because of our new standing in Christ.” To successfully live within this vacillation of suffering and joy in the Christian life calls for a personal relationship with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. Peter adds, “Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope, but do it with gentleness and reverence, keeping your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who defame your good conduct in Christ may themselves be put to shame.” In a nutshell, we must walk the talk.

Matthew Kelly in his book *Rediscover Jesus* has much to say in support of this. He starts by asking a very bold question. Think of all the people that you know. Some are family; friends; acquaintances; associations through other friends, family, work or school; and some are strangers. Where does Jesus fit into the spectrum of people that you know? Also important is the question, how well do you know the story of Jesus Christ? Once again, facts and figures are not enough. Kelly advocates, “The story of Jesus Christ loses its power when ”we either know so little of it or “we become so familiar with it that we stop hearing it as part of our own story. When we remove ourselves from the story of Jesus Christ we become immune to the life-changing message of the Gospel and become slaves to the world...At every level in society, from the beggar on the street to the leaders of nations, we are all looking for something to solve the crisis of our lives and of our times.” Matthew concludes this section with a keen observation and an invitation, “It is time to stop looking for something and start looking for someone - Jesus of Nazareth. Are you ready?”

So, you say, what if I am ready to reengage with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit? I don’t know where to start or what to do. We go back to Jesus and the Gospel of Matthew for our answer. When Jesus was walking with the disciples one day, he asked them two questions. The first is important, but the second is our springboard into a new and dynamic relationship with Jesus. The first is, “Who do people say I am?” The second question pierces our heart in asking, “But who do you say that I am?” There are many in our culture and our society that have accepted that Jesus lived, but they have reduced Jesus to just being one of many nice guys found in history and have watered down the Christian message to “simply being a nice person.”

If Jesus was just a nice person, then why was he persecuted and crucified? If Christians are just nice people, then why have so many been martyred over the centuries? Why are Christians so persecuted in our own time and culture if we are “nice people?” Jesus didn’t come into our human world to show us how to be nice, he came to show us how to be radically different in our human world so as to reveal, show and live the love of God. Matthew Kelly explains the dual nature of this radicality. “Jesus’ teachings were radical in content and method. But they also provide unique insight into the mind of God...Each parable or teaching, each encounter Jesus has with a person highlights what God cares about and what he doesn’t. The life and teachings of Jesus Christ help us to understand God’s priorities, so that we can get our own priorities right. The content of his teachings was radical because it focused on conversion of the heart rather than external behaviors. The method of his teachings was radical because his primary teaching tool was the parable. He used stories and metaphors that ordinary people could understand.” These same metaphors and stories still speak to us today, 2,000 years later. Now that is radical! Pope Benedict said, “Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction.” This is God, who never ceases to encounter his children, most especially when he entered our human world as Jesus Christ and who after returning to the Father, sent us the Holy Spirit to be with us always.

How are we to be radically different in thought, knowledge and actions? The Gospel of John reveals the simplicity and the challenge Jesus sets before us: “Whoever has my commandments and observes them is the one who loves me. And whoever loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and reveal myself to him.” God’s hand is outstretched and patiently waiting and hoping for you - will you take his hand?

An Advocate for Life

Jesus continues his last discourse with his disciples. He tells them (and us) if they love him and observe his commandments, the Father will give them another advocate, the Spirit of truth. Jesus tells them he will be leaving them soon but they will not be left orphaned.

The catechism tells us that God is truth. In fact, God is the only absolute truth. All other truth is relative. Truth is limited and conditioned by all sorts of things, including physicality, relativity, time, and culture. Three people can witness an accident and truthfully testify to seemingly contradictory statements. Their truth can be dictated by the where, when, and how of their relationship to the incident. It can be colored by personal viewpoints (prejudice, associations with other life experiences) or by personal limitations (eyesight, height). Only God is absolute truth, because only God is limitless.

We know that even church truths change. We all remember that Galileo was considered a heretic because he proposed that the sun did not revolve around the earth. If the church is open to admitting limitations in its belief system, we should be as well. As new ideas of faith or church or even God challenge us, we need to constantly pray to remain in the truth, reminding ourselves that the one and only absolute is God.

Life's journey is about learning and growing, constantly filtering the truth as we see it through the witness of the church and our own ever-expanding experiences. In John 18:37, Jesus tells us that he came into the world "to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." It is in allowing Christ to live in us and bowing to our own limitations that the Spirit of truth can reign in our hearts.

FAMILY RESPONSE

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 14:15-21

Jesus tells us that he will send an advocate, the Holy Spirit, to guide us and show us the truth. He also promised that the Spirit of God will always be with us. The advocate is at our side helping, guiding, comforting, counseling, acting as intercessor, and defending us.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned about the Holy Spirit who lives in all of us. They also spoke of your church as a family. Talk about how your family contributes the the life of your parish family. Are there more ways to do that? Pray on it as a family.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child learned that they don't need to worry because Jesus has sent the Holy Spirit. The Spirit helps us to serve, forgive, to love, and to bring peace to others. Talk about how your family does all four of those things and pray for the Holy Spirit to continue to bless your family.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child's class talked about ways that the Holy Spirit helps and guides all of us. The class also learned what happens when we receive the Holy Spirit in the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. In the Gospel, Jesus said to love him by doing what he has told you. Pray to do just that and make plans to live your lives as Jesus wants.

Venture (Grades 4-6): Ask your son or daughter about Saint Pier Giorgio and his Tipi Loschi friends. What does he or she admire about this saint. Have your youngster tell you what Jesus meant by sending us an advocate.

Pray as a family for the Holy Spirit to guide you in living holy lives. Have your young person set the scene for the first Pentecost and talk about what that must have been like for Jesus' Apostles like Peter. Consider making a wall of prayer with those shared in this week's lesson.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Begin by talking about this week's lesson by praying the prayer on page 1 from Cardinal John Dearden, then discuss its meaning for your family. Have your young person describe God's Divine Nature among three Persons united as One. Read what Peter had the courage to say on the first Pentecost, and what is says to your family so many years later. Talk about your plans to serve God over the summer.

Awaken (Teens/Adults): Discover a new level of spiritual growth for parents with *Awaken*, the new adult level of the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies*, developed to deepen your faith journey alongside your children. Scan the QR code to learn more.
