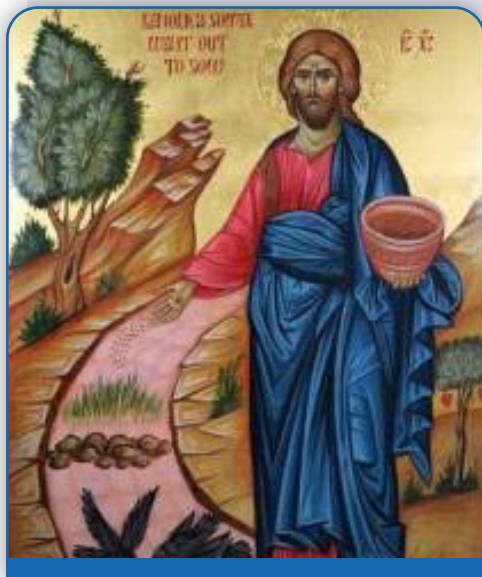

# Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings for today are about the value of keeping God's commandments.

The responsorial psalm is the anchor for all the other readings this Sunday. "Lord, I love your commands." As humans who have been created in the image of God, and also have been given the gift of free will, we rarely like to be told what to do. This assertion of the "self" starts in childhood and never ends. TV, movies, self-help books, podcasts and most especially social media; these all encourage us to worship ourselves and be masters of our own universe. As C.S. Lewis begins *The Screwtape Letters*, Uncle Screwtape starts the first letter to his nephew, Wormwood, noting that "the times" play a crucial role in the tactics they must use to steer their patients away from God. He notes that while argument used to be a good tactic, now "the weekly press and other such weapons have altered that...[Your man] doesn't think of doctrines as primarily true or false, but as academic or practical, outworn or contemporary...Jargon, not argument is your best ally in keeping him from the Church. Don't waste time making him think materialism is true. Make him think it is strong, or stark, or courageous – that is the philosophy of the future. That's the sort of thing he cares about." This is very evident in our world today. We have allowed the Screwtapes and the Wormwoods to disconnect our hearts and our minds through the clever and insidious fanning of our egos using the tactics of our cultural world.

In our American culture, just the word, command, alone is enough to make one bristle and prepare our mental defenses. One of the challenges is that we have lost the true meaning of the Hebrew word, Mits'vah. From the Ancient Hebrew Research Center we learn that Mits'vah is "often translated as 'commandment'. This word comes from the root T-Z-V. In ancient Hebrew thought, it is best understood as a 'directive' designed to point the way, similar to a shepherd directing their flock or a road sign providing guidance. It implies establishing a connection and a relationship." "Lord, I love your commands" understood through this lens is totally different than God issuing edicts from on high. We have a loving relationship with our heavenly Father and in love he guides us towards paths that are good. Accepting and embracing this in our heart totally changes how we receive the stanzas of today's Psalm. God is not a military commander demanding that we follow his rules; rather, he is our Shepherd, the one who always has our relationship with him at the forefront of all his guidance. When we follow the law of the Lord written in our hearts, the 10 Commandments, we honor and glorify God. "Wonderful are your decrees; therefore, I observe them. The revelation of your words sheds light, giving understanding to the simple."

As Solomon prepares to succeed his father, King David, God makes him an incredible offer, "Ask anything of me and I will give it to you." Wow – that's winning the lottery times infinity! Solomon does not ask for worldly things, though. He understands that as king he is a helper to God, there to live and model faithful obedience to the commandments and to guide God's people to do the same. And so Solomon asks for and receives an "understanding heart to judge your people and to distinguish right from wrong." This is a point of weakness for many – we judge others harshly and are beyond lenient with ourselves. The Screwtapes and Wormwoods use this to their advantage.

One of the essays in Bishop Robert Barron's book *Vibrant Paradoxes: The Both/And of Catholicism* supports the argument that C. S. Lewis illustrates through the letters between Screwtape and Wormwood; that is, chaos and sin enter and grow when the cultural separation of heart and mind is present and encouraged. Solomon was well aware of this reality when he asked God that both heart and mind be closely united in himself. Barron writes in the article, 'Does Religion Really Have a Smart People Problem?': "Daniel Dennett, one of the 'four horsemen' of contemporary atheism, proposed in 2003 that those who espouse a naturalist, atheist worldview should call themselves 'the brights,' thereby distinguishing themselves rather

clearly from the dim benighted masses who hold on to supernaturalist convictions.” He goes on to recite Dennett’s statistics and to shine a light on the political world of academia, most especially at Catholic institutions, that led to this self-entitled conclusion of “the brights.” Bishop Barron, through the use of discussion, an understanding of the connection needed between the heart and the mind, and a wise insight into the changing cultural world since the Industrial Revolution convincingly dims Dennett’s spotlight on “the brights” down to a weak, ineffective and sputtering flashlight. As Bishop Barron goes on to say in further essays, the world of the sciences and God do not stand in opposition to one another. They are complementary; they inform one another, and when in proper conversation or in good argument, each enriches the other.

With God, there is connection and interconnection between all. And it begins and ends with the Law of God, written first as the Torah on stone tablets and later reaffirmed as written and living in our hearts by Jesus Christ. Honoring and living with this as the center of our lives is the kingdom of heaven that Jesus portrays in the Gospel of Matthew today. Whether we liken it to a treasure buried in a field, fine pearls or an abundant collection of fish, when we find the kingdom of heaven through living God’s commands, we are filled with great joy. And how do we express that joy to God and with one another? We do so through the gift of language, whether it be written, spoken or silently lived. In the book *Christ in the Psalms* author Patrick Henry Reardon states, “Language is the gift of God. Its primary function...is the formation of thought in accord with reality...and the world’s deepest created reality...is the Torah, the eternal Law of God, on which the inner being of all created reality is based. [This] reflects the very being of God, and the final purpose of language is to lead man’s thoughts to the knowledge of God.”

Lord, I love your commands! Praying with you always!

## Putting the Good in Baskets

*Jesus talks about the value of the kingdom by comparing it to treasure buried in a field, or a pearl of great price. When someone finds something of such value, he or she is willing to sell all he or she has to possess it. The kingdom is also like a net thrown into the sea to collect fish of every kind.*

Jesus' parables are about claiming what is of value and discarding what is not. We spend a lifetime choosing what is important to us—not just the physical things we own, but also those personal characteristics we call values. The foundation for this choosing begins in the home in our earliest years.

Unless a family consistently articulates its values, its members will assume the values of the culture around them. This can be a pretty scary thought today when we consider how society's values are portrayed on television, social media, and in movies. The truth is, if we want our children to grow up with Christian values, we need to name those values for them, talk about them, as well as live them. If we want our youngsters to identify themselves as Catholics (not just Christians), we have to articulate that, too.

We need to talk about what it means to be Catholic. For example, make the Sign of the Cross reminds your children that this is how Catholics often begin prayers. Celebrate your favorite saint's day. Let youngsters know that saints are your heroes and heroines. They remind us of God's holiness.

Let them know that Catholics, like most families, have their own set of dos and don'ts. For example, along with the Ten Commandments and Beatitudes, we go to Mass every Sunday. We receive the sacraments, and during Lent we fast and abstain from meat on Fridays. Our Catholic family rules and customs distinguish us from other families (TV families included), and give us a reason to act differently from more prevalent, but not-so-Christian values.

Make sure one of the don'ts firmly implanted in your family's values is "people don't have to be perfect." We don't want youngsters ever to think that mishaps or even big mistakes can separate them permanently from their family, and that includes their Catholic family.

## FAMILY RESPONSE

Ask everyone to name his or her favorite saint. Search online for information about them including their feast days. Mark the days on the calendar, and let each person pick a favorite food or activity for each day.

## PERSONAL RESPONSE

Which Catholic value do you most appreciate? How can you help your children develop that value? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

Volunteers should package their own kolaches, unless instructed otherwise by the leads.





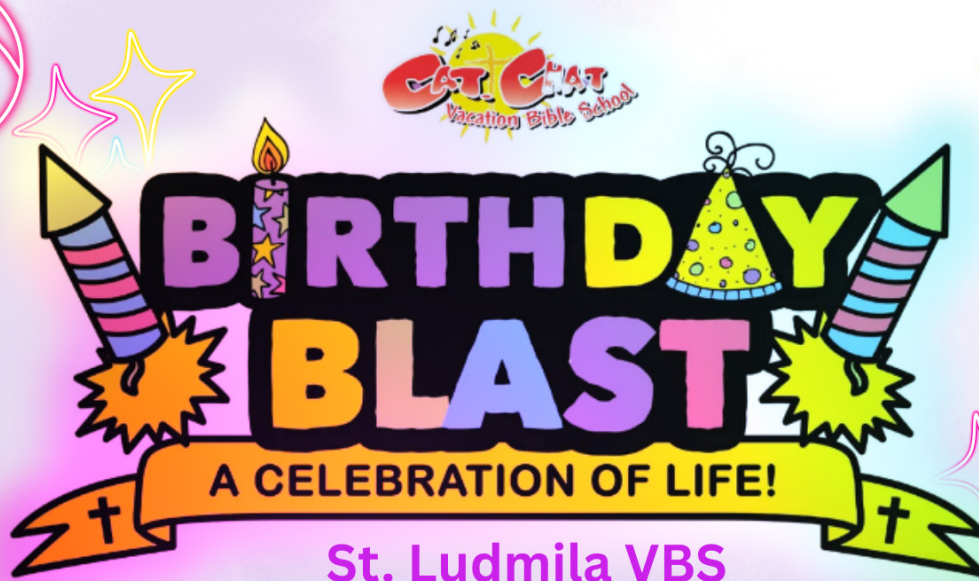

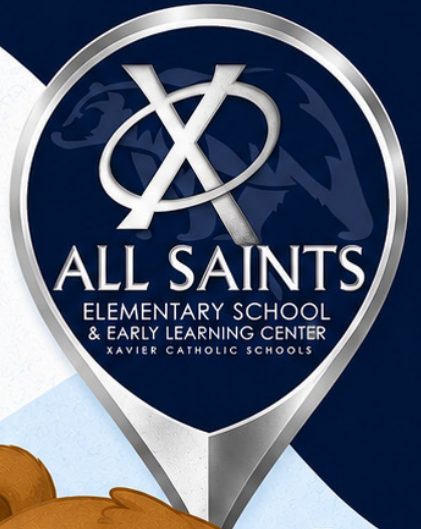
