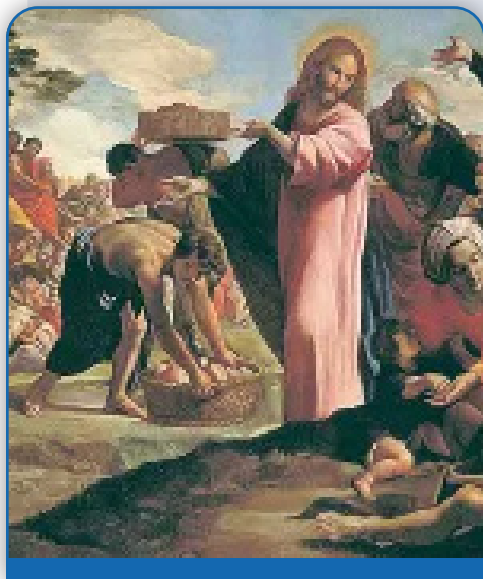

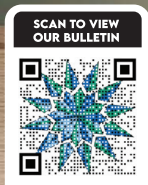

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today's readings invite us to reflect on what feeds and nourishes us.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church provides a firm foundation for our relationship with Sacred Scripture and a good place to begin this reflection.

- “In Sacred Scripture, the Church constantly finds her nourishment and her strength, for she welcomes it not as a human word, but as what it really is, the word of God. In the sacred books, the Father who is in heaven comes lovingly to meet his children and talks with them.” (CCC 104)
- “The inspired books teach the truth. Since therefore all that the inspired authors or sacred writers affirm should be regarded as affirmed by the Holy Spirit, we must acknowledge that the books of Scripture firmly, faithfully, and without error teach that truth which God, for the sake of our salvation, wished to see confided to the Sacred Scriptures.” (CCC 107)
- “Still, the Christian faith is not a ‘religion of the book.’ Christianity is the religion of the ‘Word’ of God, a word which is ‘not a written and mute word, but the Word which is incarnate and living.’ If the Scriptures are not to remain a dead letter, Christ, the eternal Word of the living God, must, through the Holy Spirit, ‘open [our] minds to understand the Scriptures.’” (CCC 108)

There are several good ways to interact with the Word of God. One of those is to ask, where is Jesus in this Scripture passage and where am I?

In our reading from Isaiah, Jesus is found in the nourishment of water, grain, wine, milk and bread. Through these ordinary items of sustenance, Jesus communicates and interacts with us on a spiritual level as well. From the wedding at Cana we know that Jesus turned water into wine. From our Gospel reading today, Jesus multiplied five loaves and two fish so that over five thousand people were able to eat and be satisfied. We are present in these readings as the ones who are hungry, those who are thirsty and those who need to fill the voids within us through the nourishment that only Jesus can provide. Every day and most especially on Sunday, we are invited to the wedding banquet, the Eucharistic celebration at our Sacred liturgies. Jesus is present to us there and offers us the transformation of our sinful humanness into the rich relationship of his friends, and as such sharing a relationship with God as sons and daughters. Isaiah asks a question that we struggle with on a daily basis: “Why spend your money for what is not bread; your wages for what fails to satisfy?”

“We breathe the appetizing aroma of food but never let it reach our lips or fill our bellies.” – Hildegard of Bingen. John Kirvan in his book *God Hunger: Discovering the Mystic in All of Us*, contemplates this wisdom and offers the following: “We are children with our noses against the bakery window. Even though the door stands open and the baker is beckoning, we stay where we are, dissuaded by our lack of passion, our petty fears of the unknown, our preference for who we are, our fear of who we might become. We tease and tempt our souls with passing thoughts of God, with ocean-edge, sunset glimpses of what might be and then walk away convinced that warm feelings are enough, that the scent of food can satisfy our hunger.” I believe this has great bearing on the invitation God offers through Sacred Scripture and our response. At the end of today's passage from Isaiah it is proclaimed, “Come to me heedfully, listen, that you may have life.” In the ancient Hebrew language, the word “heed” is active not passive. It means “to hear or to listen with the intrinsic expectation of responding, implying that true hearing requires action or obedience. Passive listening without a behavioral response does not constitute true hearing; to hear is to do.”

To read the Word of God and let it pass by as fleeting words or to settle upon us like a blanket is passive listening. It will never fill the ache, the void, the hunger within us. We are the only ones that separate ourselves from the love of Christ. This week instead of scrolling through the news, social media or games, let's challenge ourselves to read a chapter from the Bible each day and interact with God's living Word by asking “where is Jesus” and “where am I.” God is inviting us to action through these identifications. Heed his word; eat the banquet and allow Him to feed and nourish.

“Let me recognize that the hunger I feel is a hunger of my soul that only you can satisfy. Let me not dull that hunger with a thousand sweet substitutes for the nourishment that only you can give.” – John Kirvan

Meeting the Needs (and Wants) of the Many

Jesus leaves his friends to find some quiet time for prayer, but the people follow him. Once again he finds himself surrounded by a crowd. When evening comes, Jesus' disciples tell him to send the people home. There is not enough food for all of them. Instead, Jesus takes the few loaves and fishes available, blesses them, and feeds the thousands.

One of the messages we can take from this Gospel is that God's love will take care of our every need. When I think about this reading, it doesn't surprise me that God is called Father (or Mother for that matter). A parent's love is an awesome thing. I remember when my children were infants; their every need was anticipated. I would do anything humanly possible to take care of them and keep them close.

When they got older and began confusing wants with needs, life became more difficult. For example, to our fourteen-year-old, buying the latest sneakers that everyone was wearing was clearly a need. As bill payer in a family with five growing children, expensive sneakers were definitely a want. When our children's wants weren't met, life sometimes wasn't easy. Their anger at not receiving what they wanted would often separate us.

Too often, my own reaction to their feelings or moods only exacerbated the situation. It was only when I could remember that I was the grown-up and stay calm and firm in a just decision that we could sometimes negotiate a happy ending. (Shoes were certainly a need, so we would set a reasonable amount to put toward sneakers. If my son wanted to buy the more expensive brand, he could earn the money to make up the difference.)

It's hard to say no to our children; after all we want them to be happy. But we are circling a bottomless pit if we give into their every want, and we are teaching them a dangerous lesson if we reinforce the notion that things can make them happy. Our responsibility is to teach them the difference between wants and needs, and then, like God, the all-loving parent, provide as best we can, all that they truly need.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Talk about needs and wants. Ask everyone to give two examples of each.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

What is your greatest need right now? How can you go about getting what you need? If you are not able to get what you need, how will you do without it? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

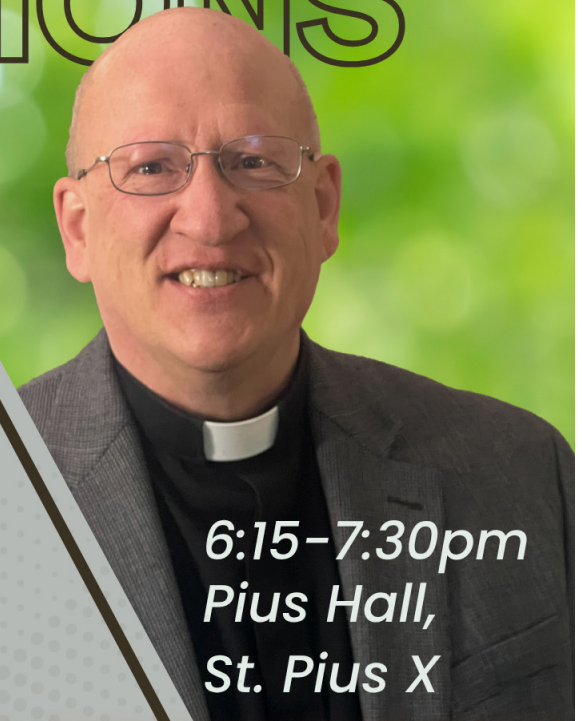

Kolach Bake News!

Pastor's Corner



Thank you for your continued prayer and support as we continue to discover the various aspects of this Journey In Faith Pastoral Planning. I have enjoyed meeting a number of parishioners in the various meetings I have attended over the past couple of weeks. May the Holy Spirit continue to guide and direct us!

Our first weekend together we had 2,663 people join us for Mass at our various sites! I pray that participation continues. I met with the liturgy people and each week we continue to tweak things as we go along. If you have any compliments or constructive criticism to share, please send me an email for our consideration! We are on this journey together!

Over the past few years we have been hearing about Eucharistic Revivals. As Catholics, do we truly believe the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus? I was able to attend the Eucharistic Congress held in Indianapolis a couple of years ago. This summer Sam Lange, one of our youths from the Pastorate, is coordinating five Eucharistic Pilgrimages throughout the state of Iowa. The first two will be Saturday, August 15th at Blessed Sacrament Church in Waterloo and at St. Joseph Church in Earling, Iowa. The prayers and reflections begin at 9:00 AM at both locations. Weather permitting, a Eucharistic Procession will be included. There will also be one held on September 19th at St. Patrick, Iowa City beginning at 9:30 AM and on September 20th at the Grotto in West Bend, Iowa at 10:00 AM.

The culmination of this project will be when representatives from all four dioceses throughout the state of Iowa gather at the Christ Our Life Conference, September 26th and 27th in Des Moines, Iowa. You are welcome to attend the conference in person or there is a watch party being planned within our Pastorate. Watch for more details.

Sam Lange and his family attend St. Ludmila Parish. Sam currently serves on the National Catholic Youth Commission. He will represent the Midwest and our Pastorate at NCYC this November in California.

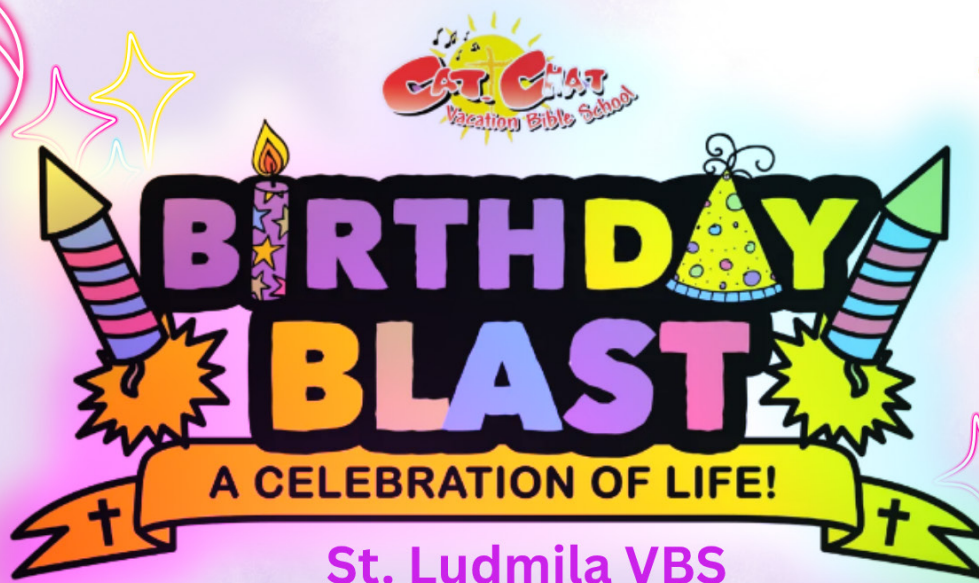
OCIA
