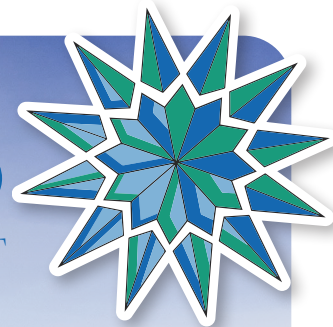

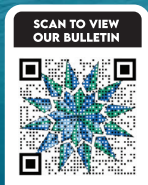

Everyday Metanoia



Welcome to the 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today's readings challenge us to reflect upon how we come to know God. Our alleluia verse provides an intersection where the readings today enter into conversation with one another: "I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for his word."

As we have been discovering, the English translation can often lack the full meaning of a Hebrew word. "Qavah" is the classical biblical term for waiting, but the Hebrew verb is not passive like we have come to know in our current culture. Waiting in the Hebrew translation is done with active hope, eager expectation or longing. From another source we learn that "the verb qavah portrays deliberate, tension-filled waiting that binds the heart to the expected intervention of the LORD."

"I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for his word." The Catechism of the Catholic Church helps us to understand our human desire to know God through this tension filled waiting that binds the heart and the LORD.

CCC 31 - "Created in God's image and called to know and love him, the person who seeks God discovers certain ways of coming to know him. These are also called proofs for the existence of God, not in the sense of proofs in the natural sciences, but rather in the sense of 'converging and convincing arguments,' which allow us to attain certainty about the truth. These 'ways' of approaching God from creation have a twofold point of departure: the physical world and the human person."

In our Old Testament reading from 1 Kings, Elijah seeks God in the physical world. Through his active waiting he searches for God not as "seek and find," but rather as "watch, listen and discern." Our culture has conditioned us to look for reality and meaning through the largeness of life. Bigger is better. Supersize me. God is in the blue whale, the largest mammal in the world; but He is just as much in the Etruscan shrew and the bumblebee bat, two of the smallest mammals in the world. It's easier to focus our attention and energies on that which is big and loud; like the wind, the earthquake and the fire. In the news, we are drawn to wars, political conflicts, public sensationalism and the tragedies of life. Elijah met the LORD in a tiny whisper. We are invited to seek, wait and find God in the smiles we share with strangers in a parking lot, in random acts of kindness, and in quiet service to our brothers and sisters throughout the world. But how do we know for certain that we are encountering the LORD, whether it be in the large or the small?

CCC 35 - "Man's faculties make him capable of coming to a knowledge of the existence of a personal God. But for man to be able to enter into real intimacy with him, God willed both to reveal himself to man and to give him the grace of being able to welcome this revelation in faith. The proofs of God's existence, however, can predispose one to faith and help one to see that faith is not opposed to reason."

The intersection of our senses, our mind and our heart is where we meet the LORD. Our Gospel gives us the perfect illustration of this. The disciples "see" a ghost walking toward them on the water. They "hear" as Jesus calls out to them. Peter (of course!) demands "proof." And while he complies with Jesus' command to "come," his mind does not initially embrace the truth and he so begins to sink. It is only when he grabs ahold of the hand of Jesus that his senses, his mind and his heart converge and he knows the LORD.

Where have we been looking for God lately? Saint Teresa of Calcutta said it best: "Do small things with great love." Most of us don't live our lives on the world platform. We live, make an impact and effect change in our homes, neighborhoods and local communities. On this stage it is the deep kindness in daily life that matters more than grand gestures. Presence, compassion, tenderness, generosity, love, forgiveness...these are the tiny whispering sounds where we meet the LORD. "I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for his word."

2025-26 Fiscal Year Ends

As our fiscal year ended in June, we have some amazing totals* to share from 7/1/25 through 6/30/26:

- **5,035** individual households picked up food boxes—**18,186** individuals. (About 20% of households pick up more than once a month)
- **10,277** boxes of groceries were distributed, each individually packed by our faithful volunteers
- **1,255** school bags with weekend provisions went home to **602** households in the Catholic schools system
- **10,095** bags of food and supplies were distributed to folks living outside
- Of **418,934** pounds of food distributed, **66,881** pounds was food donated from parishioners and walk-in donors. The remaining **352,073** pounds was purchased or donated from retailers or wholesalers.
- **\$80,740.50** was paid to landlords or utility companies, helping 137 families stay in their homes.

Thanks to ALL our donors of food and cash to feed and help all these local folks in need of our assistance. Our clients are always so grateful when they pick up food or we pay a bill that keeps their water or power on!

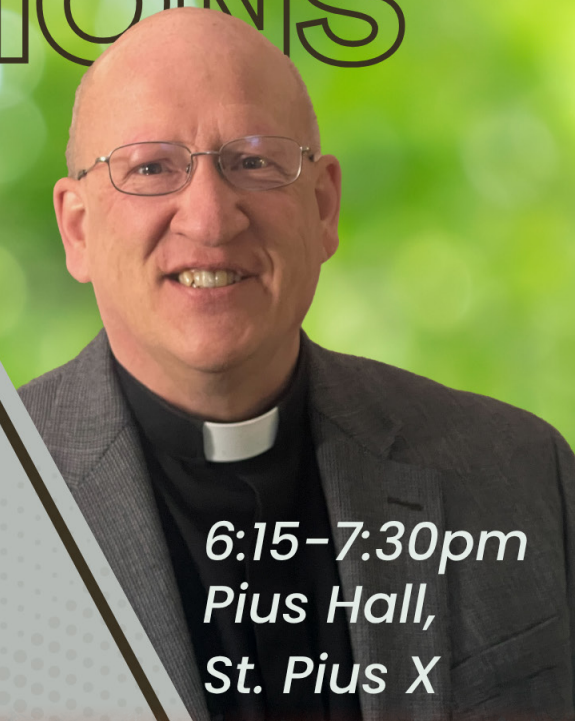

Liturgy Within the Cedar Rapids Area East Pastorate



It is important that we share common liturgical practices throughout the Pastorate so that the Mass may be celebrated with unity and full participation by the congregation, liturgical ministers, and clergy.

As part of the Journey in Faith process, the Archdiocese of Dubuque released a set of Liturgical Norms in June. This is a great blessing, providing clear guidelines and expectations that support our goals of trust, transparency, and consistency. While any one of the following changes may seem small on its own, adopting them together will take time, practice, and patience before they become second nature.

Thank you for your patience as we work through these logistics and continue the process of standardizing Mass preparation and participation in our new Pastorate community. We will share more information in the coming months, but we hope this is a start to explaining some of the things you are observing at Mass.

The Role of the Deacon

We are blessed to have six permanent deacons in active ministry throughout our Pastorate, along with several retired deacons who continue to serve. A deacon will be present at nearly every weekend Mass. The deacon's proper liturgical responsibilities include:

- Processing with the Book of the Gospels
- Leading the Penitential Rite
- Proclaiming the Gospel
- Leading the Prayer of the Faithful (General Intercessions)
- Preparing the altar and receiving the gifts of bread and wine during the Preparation of the Gifts with the assistance of Mass Servers
- Transferring the Blessed Sacrament from the tabernacle to the altar
- Distributing Holy Communion as an Ordinary Minister of Holy Communion (the blood of Christ)
- Purifying the sacred vessels after the distribution of Holy Communion
- Dismissing the congregation following the final blessing

How Lectors Approach the Ambo

The lectors proclaiming the first and second readings will now approach the sanctuary together, after the Opening Prayer and before the Liturgy of the Word begins. Chairs have been placed at the back of the sanctuary where they will remain seated when they are not proclaiming the Scriptures.

Reverencing the Tabernacle

We will reverence the presence of the Lord in the tabernacle whenever appropriate. In practice, this means that when the priest and deacon reach the foot of the altar during the entrance procession, they will turn toward the tabernacle and genuflect before approaching the altar. Parishioners are likewise encouraged to genuflect toward the tabernacle when entering their pew before Mass and again before leaving the church after Mass. When leaving your pew during Mass for another purpose, a bow to the altar is the appropriate gesture of reverence.

Children's Liturgy of the Word

This will continue to be offered at St. Ludmila on the first and third Sundays of the month, and during the school year at St. John the Baptist.

A Few Notes About Holy Communion

Once the Body and Blood of Christ have been consecrated, they are not to be poured or divided. Therefore:

- Wine for all chalices except the presider's chalice will be poured before Mass begins. The deacon/priest will pour wine into his own chalice before the Eucharistic Prayer.

- Unconsecrated hosts will be placed into the ciboria before the Eucharistic Prayer begins.

Low-gluten hosts will be available at every Mass and will be distributed by the priest. Those requiring a low-gluten host should receive Communion in the priest's line. The priest will carry a small pyx attached to, but separate from, his ciborium. There is no need to notify anyone before Mass if you require a low-gluten host.

At the Archbishop's request, Holy Communion (the Body and Blood of Christ) under both species (in forms of both bread and wine) will be offered at all Masses, including weekday, weekend, and weddings and funeral liturgies if possible.

It is also our goal that the hosts distributed during Mass are those consecrated at that same Mass. For this reason, fewer consecrated hosts will be reserved in the tabernacle. After Communion, any remaining consecrated hosts will be placed by the priest into the reserve ciborium and returned to the tabernacle.

Bringing Holy Communion to the Homebound

We are grateful to those who faithfully take Holy Communion to our homebound parishioners. This important ministry will continue. A blessing and dismissal of these ministers will take place following Communion at the following weekend Masses: 8:30 a.m. – St. John the Baptist // 9:00 a.m. – St. Pius X // 10:30 a.m. – St. Ludmila

Silence Within the Liturgy

Everything within the liturgy should flow from silence and return to silence. You will notice intentional periods of silence, especially between the readings, after the homily, and after the Communion procession has concluded. The Archdiocese also asks that silence be observed in the church for at least fifteen minutes before each Mass. Any communal devotional practices, such as the Rosary or the Divine Mercy Chaplet, should conclude before this period of silence begins. (There will be exceptions for Communion Meditations during select seasons of the Liturgical Calendar.)

Corporate Prayer

Because our priests now live in community, they are encouraged to pray and share meals together each week. Whenever possible, they will pray their weekly Holy Hour during regularly scheduled times of Eucharistic Adoration in our Pastorate churches. These opportunities will be announced through our regular communication channels, and all parishioners are invited to join them in prayer.

Children's Collection

Young children are invited to come forward with an offering. The priest will move to the floor in front of the altar to receive their offering. Children will receive a children's bulletin in return, pending availability at each mass location.

Metro Catholic Outreach Calling All Volunteers

Our volunteer shifts only last about two hours, morning or afternoon, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, or Thursdays.

Our pantry volunteers organize incoming donations, check expiration dates, stock shelves, bag up snacks, toiletries, produce, and pack the food boxes.

Our distribution volunteers add the fresh items to the food boxes on the dock, greet our clients as they arrive to pick up their groceries, and help load the cars.

Our volunteers in the office answer the door and phones, schedule clients for their food pick-ups, assemble and distribute the homeless bags, organize clothing donations and other supplies.

Be Not Afraid

Jesus retires to a quiet spot to pray. His disciples return to the boat and set out on a very rough sea. At the fourth watch of the night, the disciples see Jesus approaching the boat, walking on the water. They are terrified, thinking they are seeing a ghost. Peter wants to show Jesus his great faith. He starts to walk on the water himself, but he begins to sink.

Peter hears Jesus telling him and his friends to have faith and not to be afraid. It is a message Jesus has delivered over and over. What a wonderful gift to give your children: faith that can overcome any fear! Unfortunately, you can't gift wrap it or let them swallow it like a vitamin. What you can hand on to your children, though, is the story of faith, giving them a glorious sense of power and worth by making sure they understand their part in that story. If I had to tell this story in a hundred words or less, this is what I would say:

When God made the world he had a plan—everything and everyone together in peace and harmony. Right from the beginning, we messed up, but God stayed with us. He sent prophets to call us back. Finally, God sent his own son, Jesus, who lived the plan with every breath he took. Jesus shared his life with everyone he touched. He died and rose again to share that life with us. We are God's children, and God will give us whatever we need so that we can work together to make the plan of God happen.

That's who we are. We have God with us and in us. We've got important things to do. We have to take the love and life Jesus shares with us to everyone we meet. We are part of God's plan. Sometimes it can be scary to step out, but when we remember who we are, we won't let fear stop us.

FAMILY RESPONSE

Read the hundred-word story about God's plan for your children. Ask them to help you describe what the world would be like if you lived the plan of God. Have everyone mention one way he or she can make the plan of God happen.

PERSONAL RESPONSE

How can you make your home environment look more closely like the plan of God? What do you want to remember from last week? What are you looking forward to next week? What are your concerns?

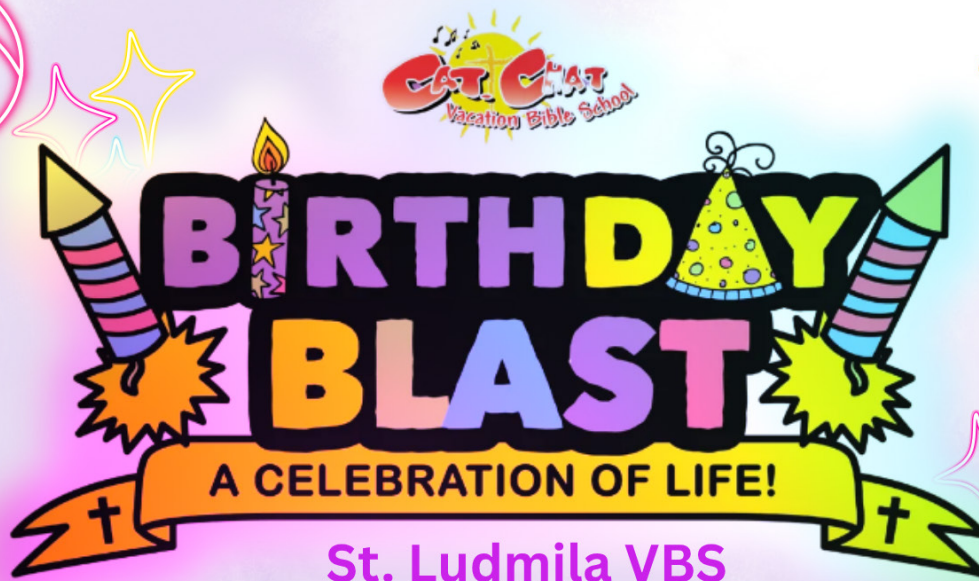
